

It is the fact that 16 August 84 sees the 100th anniversary of his birth that we commisioned Neffer artist Catherine Mintz to render the wonderful cover for us. It is after a photo of an old TNFF cover done 17 years ago on Hugo's death. We might go so far as to proclaim this the year of Hugo Grensbach and certainly we would like to dedicate this issue of TNFF to that thought.





In the absence of a Kaymar Award this April, due to Martin's illness, the Directors decided to make the award anyway, at least for this one year, so that no year would be missed. The 1984 award was voted to:

K. MARTIN CARLSON

This is for long years of service to the N3F and fandom, including participation in all major offices and most activities; but especially for initiating and continuing for 25 years the Kaymar Award itself, an award for service and devotion to the club. The N3F needs this award, on a continuing basis, as inspiration to its members.


Kaymar Award, continued.

-CONSTITUTIONOFTHENATIONAL-
FANTASYFANFEDERATION

<u>PRFAMBLE</u> - The activity that centers around science fiction and fantasy has grown to require organization in order that desirable objectives, beyond the achievement of single individuals, may be attained through united effort. Under this Constitution, the National Fantasy Fan Federation is established as an association of persons interested in promoting the progress of science fiction and fantasy, and in furthering its enjoyment by themselves and others.

ARTICLE I - MEMBERSHIP.

1. Membership, including any benefits created by the organization, and all rights such as voting, is gained by paying dues as set forth in the Bylaws. Dues change may not go into effect until two(2)months after publication in the Official Organ and shall be further delayed until the completion of voting if the Official Organ receives a petition for submission as set forth in Article V Section 1 for reversal, unless the change is the result of vote on petition.

2. An organization may become a member of the NFFF upon payment of dues as defined in Section 1 and is entitled to all the rights and benefits of membership as outlined in this Constitution except that said organization may not vote or hold elective office.

3. Joint memberships are available to two persons residing in the same household. A joint membership will include one set of TNFF and TB and all rights such as voting and club activities. The dues shall be more than a single membership but less than a double, to be set by the Directorate.

ARTICLE II - OFFICERS.

1. A President conducts the affairs of the organization. His appointments, suspensions, and removals from office,

whether the office concerned is elective or appointive, are subject to the review and approval of the Directorate, as are also his methous of procedure.

2. If, for any reason, the office of President becomes vacant, the Directorate appoints a President to complete the unexpired term. Any interim administrative duties are performed by the Chairman of the Directorate, during which time he may not vote in his capacity as Director except on motions of appointment.

3. A Directorate, composed of five members, regulates the affairs and controls the finances of the organization, and may define the duties of any office or official of the association.

4. Decisions of the Directorate are by majority of its five members except in the following instances:by unanimous vote the Directorate may refuse membership to any person;expel any member by refunding the balance of his dues; and may remove the President from office.

5. Vacancies in the Directorate, whatever the cause, are filled by majority vote of the remaining Directors. If fewer than three Directors remain, the President shall appoint one or more up to the minimum of three.

 Any person designated as Treasurer or otherwise empowered to keep or convey the funds of the organization must be over twenty-one years of age.
 The Treasurer shall also have free dues as long as he or she holds office.

ARTICLE III - ELECTIONS.

1. The President and five members of the Directorate are to be decided by the membership in an annual election of those officers. Ballots for the election are to be distributed before October 10th and the elected candidates take office on the following January 1st. Any member may seek office by complying with the official requirements which are to be published in the official organ

at least two months previous to the filing deadline.

2. No person may hold two elective offices at the same time.

3. Each member may cast one vote for each of the five candidates of his choice in the election of the Directorate. The five candidates receiving the largest number of votes are elected. Ties are resolved by majority agreement of those elected candidates not included in the tie. 4. Of the candidates for Fresident, the one receiving the largest number of votes is elected. In case of a tie, the elected Directorate chooses a President from the tied candidates.

ARTICLE IV - OFFICIAL ORGAN.

The association issues a publication of at least bi-monthly schedule which carries in addition to other material, a quarterly statement of the financial status of the organization, together with a listing of new members and their addresses.

ARTICLE V - PETITIONS & AMENDMENTS.

1. Petitions of whatever purpose, endorsed by five percent of the members or twenty-five members, whichever is less, must, within sixty days after the Directorate receives them, be submitted to the membership for decision unless the Directorate has already taken the indicated action. Petitions looking towards the revision, reversion, or setting aside of any action of the President or the Directorate must be submitted within two calendar years following such action, or such petition is invalid and without force.

2. Any motion by Directorate approved for presentation to the membership to alter or amend the Constitution must be printed in the next TNFF, and in no event, not less than two months prior to actual voting date, if not the result of action under Section 1 of this Article. Amendment's to the Constitution shall require 2/3 of the votes cast to be approved. All other decisions by the membership shall be by a majority of the votes cast.
 Any alteration or amendment of the Constitution will be presented to the membership for vote exactly as it is to be entered, or the alteration or amendment is invalid and without force.
 The power to alter or amend the

Constitution is invested solely in the membership.

BYLAWS OF THE NATIONAL FANTASY FAN FEDERATION

<u>I.AUTHORITY</u>. Under the authority implied in Article II, Section 3 of the Constitution of the NFFF, the Directorate shall establish certain Bylaws to regulate the affairs of the organization, such Bylaws to be effective when approved by a majority vote of the Directorate as set forth in Article II, Section 4 of the Constitution. The Secretary of the NFFF shall keep a permanent record of the Bylaws, and current Bylaws shall be published in the Official Organ of the NFFF not less often than once a year.

II. THE DIRECTORATE.

1. The Chairman of the Directorate shall report to the membership all measures passed by the Directorate. The Chairman of the Directorate shall maintain updated copies of the Bylaws, distribute them to the Directorate, President, Secretary, Treasurer, and Official Editor of TNFF, at the beginning of the year and whenever changed, and turn them over to his successor.

2. Copies of all official Directorate correspondence shall be sent to the President, Secretary, and Treasurer.

3. Each Directorate shall adopt standing rules of procedure, which shall

remain in force for the Directorate of the following year, until such time as the new Directorate shall vote to accept them or adopt new rules. 4. The Directorate representative to N'APA shall have the following duties: a.To bring before the Directorate any items of business regarding N'APA which need Directorate attention. b.To act as a trouble-shooter in cases where there has been an actual or alleged dereliction of duty on the part of the Official Editor of N'APA.

5. The number of Life or Honorary memberships created by Directorate vote may not exceed 1% of the total membership of the NFFF. This rule shall not operate to reduce the number of existing Life memberships at any time.

6. A Director who has not voted or participated in Directorate discussion or correspondence in any period of three consecutive months may be declared inactive by the Directorate, and removed by the President for this cause only, without prejudice.

III. THE SECRETARY & TREASURER.

1. The Secretary may bill the Treasury, as needed, for expenses incurred in the discharge of the office, including the purchase of supplies for new members, the sum not to exceed \$35 per year.

2. The Secretary will maintain a current membership roster, and will report new memberships, renewals, and changes of address to the President. Treasurer, Official Editor, Chairman of the Welcommittee, the Editor of TIGHTBEAM, and such other officers as the President may direct, not less often than once a month. 3. The Treasurer will prepare a yearly report of all income to the NFFF Treasury and an itemized list of expenditures. Also included in this report will be a listing of items which will require additional outlays, in the forthcoming year from the Treasury, and have been approved by the Directorate, but have not yet been paid. This report will be prepared for the first issue of TNFF

to appear in the new year following the year which the report covers.

IV. ELECTIONS.

1. All candidates must, by the filing deadline of August 1st each year, have paid their dues for the year in which they will hold office if elected, and agree that if they are not successful.they will serve if appointed under Article II, Section 5 of the Constitution. 2. In addition to the regular candidates listed on the ballot, members may write in the name of any member in good standing as a candidate for any elective office. Any candidate so elected must submit a written statement of his willingness to serve plus the dues for the year in which he will serve, to reach the Secretary within 14 days of his notification of election. In the event of noncompliance with the foregoing, the election will be voided and the candidate receiving the next highest number of votes for that office will be declared the winner.

V. PUBLICATIONS.

1. REGULAR PUBLICATIONS OF THE NFFF. The NFFF has two regular publications, the Official Organ, and the Letterzine, which shall be provided free to all NFFF members in good standing. The Official Organ, currently titled THE NATIONAL FANTASY FAN, and the Letterzine, currently titled TIGHT-BEAM, are published in February, April, June, August, October and December. The publishers of these two publications are appointed by the President.

The publisher of either of the regular publications will be reimbursed for his expenses in publishing the magazine (1)a maximum of 53¢ per member per issue plus the cost of postage, postage to be paid for at no more than the "third class"rate and the 53¢ to include only the actual expenses necessary to publish the issue, (2) if it is mailed in the month it was scheduled to appear, and (3) if the publisher submits an itemized bill to the Treasurer. Any unused

portion of the 53¢ allocation may be permitted to accumulate for the purpose of paying for an unusually large issue.All unused funds shall revert to the Treasury at the end of the year.

The publisher shall print enough copies to send to every member of the NFFF as of the date of publication, plus extra copies for the President, Secretary, and head of Recruiting, and any other extra copies that the President may direct the publisher to print. These extra copies shall also be paid for at the rate of up to 53¢ each, plus the actual costs of mailing them to the proper persons.

If a Regular Publication of the NFFF does not appear within the month it was scheduled, the sum allocated for its publication will revert back to the Treasury and may not be allowed to accumulate. However, if the Directorate agrees with the publisher that the reason for the delay was compelling, the Dire ctorate <u>may</u> vote to pay for any issue that does actually appear, however late, upon petition by the official editor.

In the event a Regular Publication does not appear as scheduled and the President appoints a Stand-by Editor to publish it, this editor will be reimbursed as if he were the regular editor if the magazine is mailed within two months after the appointment by the President and the other criteria have been met.

The Official Organ shall contain a list of new members and renewals, as reported by the Secretary; annual publication of the Constitution of the NFFF; and semi-annual publication of a roster of the membership. 2. PUBLICATIONS SUREAU. The Publications Bureau shall

a.publish or supervise the publication of all NFFF publications not of a recurring nature and not published by a bureau of the NFFF,

b.distribute publications that may be of interest to the membership, for a price and on request, that have been approved by the Directorate.

c.furnish to the Treasurer, not less than bimonthly, an accounting of all funds received and disbursed by this bureau, in such a form as the Treasurer may specify,

d.furnish to the Directorate at the first of the year a list of all the publications that have been approved by the Directorate during the previous year and a report on their publication status(published, written, etc. 3. OTHERS. Publications issued by subordinate bureaus of the NFFF and not sent to the entire membership shall be sent to the Secretary for information and record. In the case of N'APA that shall be construed to mean the ALLIANCE AMATEUR or other official business publication and not the entire bundle. The cost will be borne by the Treasury of the NFFF upon presentation of an itemized bill to the Treasurer. 4. NEFFER AMATEUR PRESS ALLIANCE. All N'APA members must be members in good standing of the NFFF. 5. EXCHANGE AGREEMENTS. The President can authorize exchange agreements with other publishers who will receive all N3F publications, and the President or other designated person

VI. RESCISSIONS. Directorate motions in the nature of Bylaws passed prior to the original compilation and publication of these Bylaws and not in-

will receive all their publications.

VII. AMENDMENTS. Amendments to these Bylaws may be made with the approval of a majority of the Directorate.

cluded among them, are rescinded.

VIII. DUES. Dues are \$8 per year, starting from the first of the month after received by the Secretary. Joint memberships for two persons residing in the same household and receiving one set of TNFF and TB are \$12 per year.

The Tapes Bureau provides collecting and trading services to N3F members who have an interest in spoken science fiction records; such as interviews with authors, convention reports, in old time radio drama, and science fiction history on tape. Classics such as Dimesion-X or Halls of Fantasy, and SF writers explaining how they created Hugo-Winning novels.

N'APA still has empty slots, which means we need YOU to join and participate in what is rapidly shaping up as one of the best APAs going in science fiction fandom.




N3F at LAConII - by Donald Franson.

THE CARE AND FEEDING OF NEWS

N3F has a news bureau. You can use it to convert publicity into news, and feed it to the TNFF, and mention it in TB also. Just do what comes naturally.

When you make news (start a fanzine project or meeting) tell others. Write it down and send it to Stan Woolston's news column or direct to the TNFF editor. TB can use news also in the form of letters.

Of course if you get a letter from a friend with news you can send it in too. Make items brief, but detailed enough so others can respond if they like. A special publication may draw requests for a copy. To find news, ask friends, then write it down. It will fill a need. In areas you like, look for news and tell us. Tell me and I'll thank you.

MEMBERSHIP ACTIVITIES

(Remarks from Stan in a dup letter to Don Franson and others commenting on the Kaymar award and the fact that most of the membership may not be aware of his numberous contributions to the club).

What has Kaymar done for N3F? What activities has he been involved in? When? How many times and when was he a Director? When President? I didn't even know he was Vice-President.These are things we should all know

This could be a good excuse for long time members to send in antedotes or items on him to put in TNFF (maybe in a guest History-of-N3F column with your Info Bureau page on him). I'd make a question of it; Don if I or others sent anedotes on Kaymar to you, would you shape a "column" on it in TNFF for other issues this year?...


...A history page (is) well worth continuing, the history might at times be to answer specific questions about this club's past. Like: How many books were proposed for N3F to publish (Life member David Keller gave us our first. Postcards drawn by many fans. No, it wasn't reported in TNFF.) Such a book would have taken much time and we didn't have it. I was Prez when this occurred. And another time I got Sheryl Birkherd to hand Kaymar a Kaymar Award, sent a photostat to TNFF, and he got a special award. But it's not mentioned in the listing of the annual awards, so that ommision will be avoided voting this 1984 award. I like that!

Brian Garfield answered my letter seeking clues on how to discover an individuals involvement possibilities in fandom. He wrote:

"OKay, what's going on with the membership?

I'm sure some poeple have written to you asking what areas of activity they wish to check into. Sure, it's fine for those members who can drop you a letter or a postcard that lets you know what areas they are interested in checking into, but what about us people who simply want to get involved and don't know in what area?"

Brian suggests I start a newsletter to list ideas for activities so the fans like himself can respond. I like the idea. Maybe he will volunteer to publish such a newsletter with me, getting material from others.

Actually this type of material could go into a column in TNFF, no extra newsletter would be needed. Write me about areas you have an interest in, or ask questions that might lead to possibilities.

I wrote Brain, but I've much more I could say about how a new fan might get ideas on involvement the individual could do alone. I would call this Do-It-Youself fanactivity, because it might be described as a self-interview to get clues on the process each individual might find more productive for themselves.

To start a self-interview, use pad and pen or a sheet of paper in the typer or WP. Think up ways you might get ideas. from others; by letters between two individuals or a round robin group. Or think of things you may write well (a letter, review, questions to ask would all be in this area) then ask questions on how you might get started . An interview is a way to encourage others to talk to you, and you don't have to break into query to reply, but you can get a flow of ideas to put down that way to suggest a line of thought that may lead to decisions to act on. You can do this without a second party to get the dialog going.

If you like to play Dungeon and Dragons, you might use role-playing to get new ideas. But if you interview yourself and decide to write about the possibility of editing a specialty fanzine, or writing reviews or articles, you could scan listings of what bureau managers in N3F write and go on with the thought that comes to mind.

If you buy SF throught the mail, from lists of materials sent to you in the mail, you can imagine how Manuscript Bureau or TB or even TNFF might use a page or so of material from you (yes lord !! - your editor -). So why not use TB to discuss thoughts you glean on your involvement in N3F? It might lead to others writing you, and that's a good way to find your own activity. And if you get an idea not in a certain bureau now, why not write to suggest it be included? You could send an ad in to David Heath, David seems to have less condensed ads than the classified types "Kaymar " Carlson used for years, when space is used up with more people with ads the classified brevity may return. So why not use a less condensed stlye now? Any editor should be able to concentrate info when space is a premium.

If you want to write rules for a sf or fantasy game and get others to play it, you might write the game bureau maanger or write the ad on an TB letter, And if anything you do (water coolers, Craft, sf bookends) could be used in an article, remember faneds quite often use brief material (a page or so)and at times writers seem to send in items longer than that. You could write a how-to article for the manuscript bureau and get fanzines to read also,which might lead to starting a fanzine yourself.

And Brian, you might volunteer to help with membership activities. Actually write interviews by mail, or actually after being a habitual self-interviewer fanzine writer, RR participant, etc. You'll gain confidence and find many ways to become involved in N3F.

Welcoming new members is a possiblity, or reaching out to become active in a bureau, maybe starting one (get a discussion going in TB, speak on how a certain approach to fandom interests you and others may give you support). Invite letters, and maybe the resulting developement will lead to an outpouring of a specific interest that would be as important as other activities are!

Anyone is invited to start a line of thought that might reveal a geyser of ideas too. Why not write?

Thank you for your inquiry about a new, updated STAR TREK CONCORDANCE. I wish that I could announce an interested publisher and a publication date for such a book, but unfortunately, no one <u>licensed</u> to publish Star Trek books has shown an interest in such a project, yet.

I have sent suggestions to Pocketbooks, which has the license to publish ST novels, but they have not shown any interest in many months. A plea to Paramount Studios' legal and to the merchandising departments has gotten no answers about taking the CON-CORDANCE to another publisher. I am at a total loss to explain this apathy, considering that the Ballantine edition of my STAR TREK CONCORDANCE sold over 120,000 copies!

By the way, the reason it was not reprinted is that every publisher seems to think that the Star Trek "craze" will end any day, now, and leave them with thousands of unsold books. The fact that Star Trek fandom has not died out in 15 years does not seem to have sunken in, yet!

I am, however, continuing to rewrite, update and make corrections on the book, as well as add the three movies. So when I do find a publisher, I'll be ready!

If you have any additions, corrections, or other input, let me know, please. I just hate hearing this information after the book is published!

Artwork for the book is also needed. I am collecting clean, sharp black & white ink (no ballpoint pen, no pencil, no washes) drawings of <u>any</u> phase of any of the episodes, animateds or films. These must be ORIGINAL work, not tracings of comics or other plagarism. Though, of course, any artwork based on the line-work of the animated Star Trek episodes must necessarily look very close to the original.

The original "fan-published" edition of THE STAR TREK CONCORDANCE was printed in two books: the first two seasons of the TV series were covered in the CONCORDANCE which was issued in 1969, while THE THIRD SEASON SUPPLEMENT was published in 1973. These "fan" editions, lavishly illustrated with professional-quality fan art, are totally Out-Of-Print, and will never be reprinted.

Ballantine Books published THE STAR TREK CONCORDANCE in a large-format soft cover edition, in 1976, with the addition of the animated series. It sold over 123,000 copies, but nobody felt there was enough interest in STAR TREK to reprint the book, so this CONCORDANCE edition is Out-Of-Print, as well. Thus far, we have had no success in finding a publisher interested in printing a new edition of the CONCORDANCE with additions, corrections, and an update to include the 3 movies. So, until further notice, these two CONCOR-DANCE editions are the <u>only</u> ones available.

MEGAMART was a short-lived but excellent fanzine published by fans who ran out of money to continue publishing. Articles cover everything from outer space to costuming, with great artwork and cartoons; lots of good reading.
