

2012 N3F Amateur Short Story Contest

Story Contest Rules and Entry Blank

- 1. This contest is open to all amateur writers in the field, regardless of whether they're members of the National Fantasy Fan Federation. For the purposes of this contest, we define an amateur as someone who has sold no more than two (2) stories to professional science fiction or fantasy publications.
- 2. Stories entered in the contest must be original, unpublished, not longer than 8,500 words in length—and must be related to the science fiction, fantasy, or similar genres in the opinion of the judges.
- 3. Manuscripts should be typed, single sided on 8 1/2"-by-11" white paper, double spaced, with pages numbered. The name of the author should not appear anywhere on the manuscript to ensure impartial judging. Photocopies are acceptable, if they are of good quality. Computer printouts must be legible. Email attachments of Word documents are also acceptable.
- 4. Contestants can enter any number of stories, provided that each is accompanied by a separate entry blank and fee. Enclose a self-addressed, stamped envelope (SASE) if you would like your story returned at the end of the contest. Do not send your only copy in case of accidental loss; we are not responsible for lost manuscripts. Stories will not be returned without an SASE.
- 5. The entry fee is \$3 per story for N3F members in good standing, and \$5 for non-members. The extra \$2 is for printing and publicity, which will be paid for using N3F funds. The basic \$3 is for judging expenses and prizes. While N3F members are encouraged to enter the contest, members will not receive any

- preference in judging. Because of a long-standing agreement with the British Science Fiction Association, BSFA members can pay the same fee as N3F members.
- 6. Cash prizes totaling \$100 will be awarded as follows: First prize is \$50, second \$30, and third \$20. Honorable mentions and semi-finalists will receive a certificate of award.
- 7. Send all manuscripts, accompanied by SASEs, entry forms, and fees to the contest manager: Jefferson Swycaffer, P. O. Box 15373, San Diego, CA 92175-5373; n3f.story.contest@gmail.com. Make checks payable to William Center. Well-concealed American cash (dollar bills is also acceptable. All entries must be received or postmarked no later than Dec. 31, 2012.Email entries will be accepted, but no quar-
- 8. The judge is a published science fiction professional. All comments and critiques are solely the judge's opinion, but he promises to be constructively critical and polite.

9. The N3F assumes no publishing rights or obligations. We want to encourage professional sales, not fan publication. All entries will be returned after the contest is over, if accompanied by an SASE. Winners will be notified as soon as the judging is completed. Announcements and notifications of winning entries will be made in March 2013.

Please take your time and submit your best work. You can resubmit stories previously entered. All entries will be kept confidential and will be judged fairly and anonymously. The deadline for all entries is Dec. 31, 2012. Good luck



Jack Robins granted Life membership


The third quarter of the N3F was rather busy as four motions passed: three regarding memberships, including a proposed constitutional amendment, and a separation of powers issue.

All motions are listed in a box on the following page.

Perhaps the most celebratory news to come out of the directorate is that of granting our first Life Membership in decades to longtime N3F member, Jack Robins on September 25, 2012.

"I am overwhelmed at being elected a life member. At 93 and 1/2 years of age, I am not sure how much life I have left, but I will enjoy all," Jack said upon hearing of the award.

Jack also recently was named to the First Fandom Hall of Fame (who proudly self-proclaim themselves as "The dinosaurs of science fiction fandom.") - David Speakman



Directorate Motions

PASSED: July 10, 2012

Motion 2012-04: Speakman:; Amended: Row

The President shall not hold the office of Secretary or Treasurer, except on a temporary basis not to exceed 4 weeks - due to vacancy or emergency. If the president fails to appoint a replacement within three weeks of an office vacancy of either the Secretary or Treasurer, the Directorate shall move on its own to appoint a replacement for the vacant office.

PASSED: September 25. 2012

Motion 2012-05: Speakman (Via suggestion by member, Ruth Davidson)

Amend Bylaws in the appropriate place(s) to include:

- The following activities are reserved solely to paid members: holding elected office; holding the office of Secretary, Treasurer, Publisher or Official Editor; voting for elected office; receiving printed copies of club publications paid for by the treasury.
- Members of the general public may fully participate in all N3F activities except for those reserved solely to paid members.

PASSED: September 24. 2012 **Motion 2012-06**: Speakman

.PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT to bring constitution in line with current practice.

Membership ratification vote: Sept. 2013.

Current Language

Article 1 - Membership:

3. Joint memberships are available to two persons residing in the same household. A joint membership will include The National Fantasy Fan Federation(TNFF) and all rights such as voting and club activities. The dues shall be more than a single membership but less than a double, to be set by the Directorate.

Proposed Amendment: (Changes in *bold italic*)
Article 1 - Membership:

3. Household memberships are available to persons residing in the same household but eligible to receive only one print copy of the Official Organ. A household membership will include membership in The National Fantasy Fan Federation (TNFF) and all rights such as voting and club activities for each paid member of the household included in the membership. The dues shall be one single membership at full price with each additional individual household membership dues added, as set in the Bylaws

PASSED: September 24. 2012

Motion 2012-07: Speakman

- 1. Update Life Membership rules to allow the appointment of 5 memberships or 1 percent of the total membership of the N3F, whichever number is greater.
- 2. Grant Life Membership to Jack Robins.

[Below are the amended Bylaws with changes set out in 1. bold italics]

The Bylaws of the National Fantasy Fan Federation

I. Authority

Under the authority implied in Article II, Section 3 of the Constitution of the National Fantasy Fan Federation, the Directorate shall establish certain Bylaws to regulate the affairs of the organization, such Bylaws to be effective when approved by a majority vote of the Directorate as set forth in Article II, Section 4, of the Constitution. The secretary of the N3F shall keep a permanent record of the Bylaws, and current Bylaws shall be published in the Official Organ of the N3F not less often than once a year.

II. The Directorate

- The Chairman of the Directorate shall report to the membership all measures passed by the Directorate. The Chairman of the Directorate shall maintain updated copies of the Bylaws, distribute them to the Directorate, President, Secretary, Treasurer, and Official Editor of The National Fantasy Fan (TNFF), at the beginning of the year and whenever changed, and turn them over to his/her successor.
- Copies of all official Directorate correspondence shall be sent to the President, Secretary, and Treasurer.
- Each Directorate shall adopt standing rules of procedure, which shall remain in force for the Directorate of the following year, until such time as the new Directorate shall vote to accept them or adopt new rules.
- 4. A Director who has not voted or participated in Directorate discussion or correspondence in any period of three consecutive months may be declared inactive by the Directorate, and may be removed by the President for this cause only, without prejudice.

- The Secretary may bill the Treasury, as needed, for expenses incurred in the discharge of the office, including the purchase of supplies for new members, the sum not to exceed \$100 per year.
- The Secretary will maintain a current membership roster, and will report new memberships, renewals, and changes of address to the President, Treasurer, Official Editor, Chairman of The Welcommittee, and such other officers as the President may direct, not less often than once a month.
- 3. The Treasurer will prepare a yearly report of all income to the N3F Treasury and an itemized list of expenditures. Also included in this report will be a listing of items which will require additional outlays, in the forthcoming year from the Treasury, and have been approved by the Directorate, but have not yet been paid. This report will be prepared for the first issue of TNFF to appear in the year following the year which the report covers.
- 4. The President shall not hold the office of Secretary or Treasurer, except on a temporary basis not to exceed 4 weeks - due to vacancy or emergency. If the president fails to appoint a replacement within three weeks of an office vacancy of either the Secretary or Treasurer, the Directorate shall move on its own to appoint a replacement for the vacant office.

IV. Elections

- All candidates must, by the filing deadline of August 15 of each year, have paid their dues for the year in which they will hold office if elected, and agree to serve if appointed under Article II, Section 5 of the Constitution.
- In addition to the regular candidates listed on the ballot, members may write in the name of any member in good standing as a candidate for any elective office. Any candidate so elected must submit a written statement of his willingness to serve plus the dues for the year in which he will serve, to

reach the Secretary within 14 days of his notification of election. In the event of non-compliance with the foregoing, the election will be voided and the candidate receiving the next highest number of votes for that office will be declared the winner.

3. Annual election platforms are to be printed in the September issue of TNFF. The election ballot will either be printed in the September issue of The Fan or mailed to members separately. Members may submit either a photocopy of the election ballot or vote from an email account previously registered with the secretary rather than the ballot itself. Each paper ballot shall include space for the N3F member to write their name in print, provide their signature and also the date the ballot was completed. Ballots for Constitutional amendments and other membership referendums may also be sent out with TNFF.

V. Publication

- Regular publication of the N3F. The N3F has one regular publication, the Official Organ, which shall be provided free to all N3F members in good standing. The Official Organ, currently titled The National Fantasy Fan, is published in March, June, September, and December. The Editor and Publisher is appointed by the President.
 - a. The Publisher shall print enough copies to send to every member of the N3F as of the date of publication, plus extra copies for the President, Secretary, and head of Recruiting, and any other extra copies that the President may direct the Publisher to print.
 - b. In the event a Regular Publication does not appear as scheduled and the President appoints a Stand-by Editor to publish it, this Editor will be reimbursed as if he were the regular Editor if the magazine is mailed within two months after the appointment by the President.
 - c. The Official Organ shall contain a list of new members and renewals, as reported by the Secretary; the Constitution and Bylaws of the N3F in the

- June issue, and the Roster of the membership in the March and September issues.
- d. Deadlines for material submitted to TNFF shall be the 15th of the month preceding the month of publication. Any deviation from this date must be announced in the previous issue.
- e. No single issue of TNFF may exceed 36 pages, without Directorate approval. The Publisher will notify the Chairman of the Directorate of receipt of any issue not conforming to this page limitation, before printing.
- f. Advertisements in N3F publication is free, restricted to N3F members, and are subject to space limitations in the judgment of the editor.
- g. The N3F Roster, while available for membership use, is not for sale as a mailing list to anyone.
- Others. Publications issued by subordinate Bureaus of the N3F and not sent to the entire membership shall be sent to the Secretary for information and record. In the case of N'APA that shall be construed to mean the Alliance Amateur or other official business publication and not the entire bundle. The cost will be borne by the Treasury of the N3F upon presentation of an itemized bill to the Treasurer.
- Neffer Amateur Press Alliance. All N'APA members must be members in good standing of the N3F.
- Exchange Agreements. The President can authorize exchange agreements with other publishers who will receive all N3F publications, and the President or other designated person will receive all their publications.

VI. Rescissions

Directorate motions in the nature of Bylaws passed prior to the original compilation and publication of these Bylaws and not included among them, are rescinded.

VII. Amendments

Amendments to these Bylaws may be made with approval of a majority of the Directorate.

VIII. Dues

- Membership dues are payable annually and include receiving one copy of the Official Organ
 (paper or electronic). Individual memberships are
 \$18 per year. Additional memberships at the same
 household address, with no additional copies of
 the Official Organ, are \$4 per year per person.
- The number of Life or Honorary members created by Directorate vote may not exceed 5 memberships or 1 percent of the total membership of the N3F, whichever number is greater. This rule shall not operate to reduce the number of existing Life memberships at any time

IX. Member Benefits

- The following membership benefits are reserved solely to dues-paying members ("paid members"): holding, running for, or being appointed to any elected office; holding the office of Secretary, Treasurer, Publisher or Official Editor; voting for elected office; receiving printed copies of club publications paid for by the treasury; and representing the organization in any official capacity.
- Life Members appointed by the Directorate are granted the same membership benefits as Paid Members, regardless of whether they pay dues or not.
- Members of the general public may fully participate in all N3F activities except for those reserved solely to paid members.

CALL FOR NOMINATIONS

Neffy Award Bureau shall coordinate the annual NFFF Speculative Fiction Awards (Neffy Awards) to promote the goals of the National Fantasy Fan Federation (N3F, NFFF).

RULES:

- 1. All entries for and winner of the NFFF Speculative Fiction Award must have appeared for the first time in the United States or had significant original content published in the previous calendar year. If both a copyright and publication date exist, the publication (cover issue date) will take precedence.
- 2. Any fan may nominate works or cast official ballots for the awards.
- 3. A call for nominations will be in two forms: Publication in the December issue of N3F's publication, "TNFF." In addition, the Neffy Awards Bureau will send out an email via the official NFFF email list during the month of December. All member nomination entries will be due by January 31, of the following year. Nomination may either be by email or by postal service (with postmark of January 31 or earlier).
- 4. Nominations: Each member shall be allowed five nominations in each category. Duplicate nomina-

tions by the same member shall be counted as one vote. Nominations for nonsense, ineligible candidates or "no award" shall be disregarded. Nomination votes shall be tallied by the Neffy Awards Bureau in time for publication of an official Neffy Awards Ballot in the March issue of "TNFF". The Bureau also will mail an electronic version of the ballot to the N3F mail list and post it on the organization's web site.

5. The Ballot: In each category, the five nominees with the most nominations shall be listed on the ballot. In a case of a tie for the fifth slot on the ballot, all nominees with that number of votes shall be listed on the ballot. If a category does not get at least three nominees, no award will be given in that category that year. Voting ballots will be due by May 20 via email or postal service (postmarked May 20 or earlier). Each member shall be allowed one vote in each category. Write-in votes will be disregarded.

6. Results will be announced on the Saturday before Memorial Day on the NFFF web site, email list and the September issue of "The Fan." In addition, the Neffy Award Bureau may choose to announce the awards at a speculative fiction fan convention which is held during Memorial Day weekend.

- 7. The Award. The Neffy Award is one of honor and recognition. Each winner will be presented (or mailed) a printed certificate denoting the individual achievement. A list of all winners will be permanently displayed on the N3F web site.
- 8. Those not eligible: Members of the Neffy Award Bureau, members of their immediate family, close associates or closely-affiliated works of bureau members are not eligible for an award or nomination.

PROFESSIONAL AWARDS:

- · Achievement in art Artist. A speculative fiction work of art first published or shown within the previous calendar year. (a.k.a. "Best Artist")
- Achievement in Animated Film . An animated work of speculative fiction made for the cinema first released in the United States within the previous calendar year. (a.k.a. "Best Animated Film")
- Achievement in live Action Fantasy Film. A speculative fiction motion picture first released within the previous calendar year. (a.k.a.

"Best Fantasy Movie")

- · Achievement in live Action SF Film. A speculative fiction motion picture first released within the previous calendar year. (a.k.a. "Best SF Movie")
- Achievement in live Action Fantastic Horror Film. A speculative fiction motion picture first released within the previous calendar year. (a.k.a. "Best Dark Fantasy Movie")
- Achievement in Live Action SF Television. A speculative fiction made-for television film or serialized television program first broadcast within the previous calendar year. (a.k.a. "Best SF TV")

Avalon Hill's old railroad game "1830" has been re-released by Mayfair Games. The new version has some very good new variant rules. Mayfair also released a game called "1853" which uses the same game system as "1830".

Fantasy Flight Games is working on a new version of 'Merchants of Venus', an old Avalon Hill game. A second game company also claims to own the copyright for this game, and now this mess will perhaps be resolved in the courts.

'March Madness', another old Avalon Hill game, is now being sold by Game Cabinet, a company in Britain. Game Cabinet recently bought the rights to 'Wrasslin', Avalon Hill's simulation of professional wrestling. Game Cabinet does not market in America.

Mayfair Games recently released 'Nippon Rails'. They made some rules changes that made the game less cutthroat. In the original version one of the victory cities was on the island of Hokkaido, but there were only three routes into Hokkaido. The was a real problem in a four or five player game. The new edition has five routes into Hokkaido.

One last bit of information about my game "Hoops". I have an artist working on a set of professional looking cards but he has run into problems. The design project is stalled."

Wesley reports that he is now working on a railroad game covering the same terrain as 1830. He is also publishing his SF magazine, Nova SF.



Books

Alien in the Family, by Gini Koch (DAW, 2011)

This is part of the author's Alien series of novels, but it's definitely not necessary to have read any of the two previous books. The book is a light read, being a somewhat humorous tale, seemingly written with tongue firmly in cheek. In the series' universe, aliens from Alpha Centauri have come to Earth to live among us. They look human but have slightly different anatomy, certain psychic abilities, and superhuman strength. There are also other alien races in the Centauri system that don't look human.

Katherine "Kitty" Katt is in love with one of the men from Alpha Centauri and plans to wed Jeff Martini. She's not very good at organizing or planning but fortunately has friends who are. While all the planning is going on, there is an alien invasion by those aliens not friendly with the humanoids from Alpha Centauri. As members of a sort of Earth defense force, Kitty and her friends must tackle that problem without forgetting about the wedding plans.

This is a highly entertaining book and is recommended for anyone looking for light reading. (RLT)

Courts of the Fey, edited by Martin H. Greenberg and Russell Davis (DAW, 2011)

This is an anthology of a dozen stories about the fey. The stories vary in quality from just passable to very good. Fortunately, there are more good ones than not. Bear in mind, this is just my opinion. Reader reactions may vary.

My favorites were "An Answer from the North" by Sarah A. Hoyt, "The Song of the Wind" by Paul Crilley, "Mushroom Clouds and Fairy Rings" by J. A. Pitts, "Hunting the Unicorn" by Jane Lindskold, and "Anne" by Michelle Sagara.

Hoyt's fairly lengthy story is a touching account of two factions of fey who couldn't live together without destroying one another. "The Song of the Wind" is a touching, poetic piece. The story by J. A. Pitts is a touching post-holocaust story. "Hunting the Unicorn" is about the fey overcoming their natural competitiveness. And "Anne" is a very good and touching story hinging on the childlessness of the fev.

There was only one story that I felt was sub-par. That was

Ron Thurman's "First Ball... Last Call," which was about the end of times.

Other stories include "Gallow's Rescue" by Lilith Saintcrow, "Goodhouse Keeping" by Mary Robinette Kowal, "Beauty" by Jenifer Ruth, "Pennyroyal" by Kerrie Hughes, "Unlocked Gate" by Dean Wesley-Smith, and "The Green Man" by Amber Benson.

Taken together, the book will provide entertainment for readers who like shorter fiction about the fey. (RLT)

Man Plus, by Frederik Pohl (Orb, 2011)

This book was originally published in 1976, but it isn't dated. The story takes place in a future in which the Earth is on the brink of a devastating war. The United States has a program to modify a human to survive in the Martian environment. The first man to be so modified comes to a sad end. After studying that failure, changes are made in the program and a second man undergoes similar modifications. The characters are depicted very well and Pohl gives much background information for the main players. Man Plus is ready for the trip to Mars. There are unmodified people on the trip as well, and they construct a human-friendly habitat and start planting food crops therein.

I found this book very interesting. The book is as relevant today as it was when it was written, as we continue to tackle problems that might make the colonization of Mars something to be considered seriously. Pohl also considers the larger question of what makes humans what we are. Back in its day, this book won a Nebula Award. Pohl has considered hard science, and he has done a good job of writing the novel to make it interesting to read. (RLT)

Shadow Valley, by Steven Barnes (Del Rey, 2009)

I found this book confusing and difficult to get into, mostly because of the strange names the characters have. It takes place in Africa in the early days of the human race. The characters have names such as Frog and Fire Ant. It doesn't help that some characters have more than one name. I had to reread the beginning after I finished the book.

There are apparently three types of humans existing at the same time. We mostly follow the Ibandi, who migrate in two groups after the eruption of Father Mountain (Kilimanjaro). Their enemies, the Mk*tk, are a larger and more ruthless people; they frequently kidnap members of the Ibandi group and assimilate them – or try to. Later, we meet another group called the Vokka who have tamed dogs.

It's an interesting story, but I can't really say I enjoyed it. It's a look into the lives of a very different culture. This is a sequel to a book titled Great Sky Woman. Possibly, this book would have made more sense if I'd read the other one first, but I believe it makes a book weaker to depend on the reader having read a previous book. It reminds be a bit of Robert Silverberg's A Time of Changes, which also explores a different culture. (RLT)

For the next hundred Earth years, she simply worked as much as her self-recharging battery power enabled her. But the base population kept increasing, and eventually Alora realized that she needed assistance. 

The History of Tightbeam

In the beginning, N3F did not have a letterzine. The fledgling club could hardly afford to publish one zine, let alone two; and letter, if any, appeared in *Bonfire*, or *The National Fantasy Fan*, its successor.

In 1949, Art Rapp, the editor of Spacewarp, a popular fanzine, decided to put out a letterzine for the N3F, calling it Postwarp. This was available on subscription, at 10 cents a copy (the usual price in those days) which paid for itself. It contained letters on all subjects, but mainly discussed the N3F, and not being official, could be free to criticize (as continues to this day, even when edited by the President). When Art left, others took up Postwarp, with varying success, continuing to 1960, when Alan J. Lewis (not to be confused with Albert J. Lewis) has problems and Postwarp did not appear regularly or on time.

By now the zine was financed by the N3F, and the officers, understandably, wanted it to appear before they paid for it. Lewis, on the other hand, could not promise anything and claimed he needed the money in advance. This impasse went on for some time, and caused various new rules to be made, to no avail, so they decided to go around the delinquent editor by doing another letterzine, letting him delay *Postwarp* as long as he pleased. So, in a sense, *Postwarp* and *Tightbeam* (which was not quite the name of the new zine) were not related.

Walter Coslet volunteered to do the first issue, and named it *Hyperspace Tightbeam*. Another reliable, Art Hayes, did the next and Marion Zimmer Bradley (no less) edited the third issue, and

promptly renamed it *Tightbeam*, a more sensible name which described the activity, that of serving as a medium for inter-member communication. So the first few editors rotated, setting a precedent, though sometimes it was more efficient to have a semi-permanent editor, who could control the contents of the issue to fit the pages allowed.

But, as you know, no job in N3F is permanently occupied, so we have alternated between long-time and one-issue editors. It always works out, somehow, and *Tightbeam* has gotten to its 200th issue without a break or great changes in content. With that number, I can't even begin to summarize the editors we've had, you will have to wait for the complete checklist of N3F publications I will finish Real Soon Now. Suffice it to say that *Tightbeam* is always enjoyable, at least from my viewpoint, one whose favorite reading matters is letters, whether in fanzines or prozines.

Now we are about to lose our current editor, and a replacement must be found. (Note the neutrality of that word, "replacement." A "pinch-hitter" is better, and a "substitute" not as good.) If you think you can do an issue or so, why not volunteer? Just think; you can have your own fanzine without paying for it! Where is there an opportunity like this? Doing a letterzine, with other material to stimulate the letters, can be easy or hard. And it can be fun!
