## The Foundation of a Holiday

February 11 is celebrated in Japan as *Kenkoku Kinenbi*, National Foundation Day. On that day in 660 BCE, it's said, the first emperor *Jimmu* descended by heavenly mandate and took his earthly throne on the island.

I suppose it's a bit like July Fourth in that it symbolizes the founding of the country, with some Christmas thrown in because *Jimmu* was a deity and not only the head of state but the center of the Shinto religion. Like all emperors of Japan, he was descended from the sun goddess *Amaterasu*. At least, that's what the early histories tell us – the story is told in the *Nihonshoki* (or *Nihongi*) and the *Kojiki*, texts produced by the Japanese imperial court in the eighth century.

Many scholars now believe these histories to be, like similar narratives in the Bible or the Hebrew Book of Judges, mostly legendary because there isn't enough archeological evidence to support them.

### Meiji Neo-Traditionalism

But as old as this holiday sounds, it wasn't formally established until the late nineteenth century. During the grand period of myth-making in the Meiji Restoration (1868-1912), the government decided to return to those legends to re-establish the glory and power of the imperial throne. The rituals surrounding the divinity of the emperor became formalized as emperorworship was enfolded into the daily life of Japanese citizens. As part of this effort, in 1872 the Meiji government celebrated the coronation of *Jimmu* as "Empire Day" (*Kigensetsu*).

The savvy oligarchs of the Meiji period were smart marketers. They knew they had to modernize and industrialize, but also to unify the people after a period of civil war and conflict. The decided to use the imperial house as the center of Japanese political and spiritual feelings. They invoked the name of the emperor for all kinds of purposes – for industrialization, modernization, and colonial expansion.

The celebration of *Kigensetsu* was a way to transmit imperial values to the people and invite their participation in the empire through festivals honoring the country and its history. The emperor was rebranded by Meiji officials as the father of the nation, but a *modern* ruler. Even though the aim of Meiji oligarchs was to look back to the past, they re-fashioned it to fit the Western world that Japan wanted to join. That's why scholars term this "neotraditionalism".

This was the modern beginning of *tennosei*, or the Emperor System.

### **Expansion of the Japanese Empire**

During the fascist militaristic period of Japan, roughly 1910-1947, *tennosei* reached its height of power and influence. Opposition was silenced through force or intimidation. Anyone who criticized the emperor, or by extension anything done in the name of the emperor, was blacklisted as a traitor.

In the name of the divine moral emperor of Japan, soldiers were sent to conquer China and Korea and the Pacific southwest, starting a devastating conflict that still has repercussions today. The emperor was the embodiment of virtue; as in the philosophy of *jihad*, as long as your heart was in line with the divine you could do no wrong, no matter what atrocities you might commit. This twisted thinking is what led ordinary Japanese men to commit horrific acts of cruelty as for example during the seven-week occupation of Nanjing.

But in the late fifties grassroots organizations from the right began to lobby for re-establishment of the holiday, and in 1966 the LDP, despite strong opposition from citizens claiming that such an action would be unconstitutional, pushed through legislation that declared February 11 once again a national holiday: *Kenkoku Kinenbi*. Interestingly, and not, I think, coincidentally, the first postwar economic boom



1954-57 was christened the "*Jimmu* boom". There are signs now that the Emperor System is far from dead, especially among certain right-wing groups and conservative societies. But just as certainly, there remain a great deal of people who oppose emperor-worship, and they stage a symbolic protest on February 11.

For schoolchildren and business people, perhaps it's just another day off, a wellearned break from routine; but delving into the history of how *Kenkoku Kinenbi* was established highlights the complex tensions in modern Japanese society and helps shed light on a complicated cultural past that reverberates in many citizens still.

As an example, material intended for the August issue should be submitted to me by July 25. *If it doesn't get to me – the Editor – in time, <u>it goes in the next issue</u>. Watch for updates on this information. I may change the deadline on you. \*wink\** 

For *The MANGAVERSE's Fanzine of DOOM* submissions are currently due on May 1st, 2005. Watch for updates since this information is subject to change.
