story that was "mainstream," having no fantastic element. (Nominally, stories for the contest should be SF or Fantasy, but this isn't always an ironclad rule. We're happy to receive good stories!) There were happy endings, and tragic endings, and a few mystery endings where no one knows, for sure, if it's happy or sad. There were first-person narratives and third-person narratives. There were stories that were "experimental" in style, going beyond the conventions of modernday prose fiction, and there were stories that follows the "Strunk and White" rules of elemental style.

And always, there was a stirring of the emotions, a true depth of feeling, an involvement, a sharing and communion between the author and the reader. These are stories to make you think -and these are stories to make you feel. You will shiver in horror, thrill with adventure, mourn with sympathy, and laugh with joy.

Thank you, very much, every participant. Four of you have won prizes, but all of you are winners, in my view, for you have undertaken the wondrous creative step of having written and completed a story. ...Jefferson Swycaffer

If you would like to join an ERR or If you want to be paired with more than one member, or you have any questions - please let me know.



Many thanks for two issues of The National Fantasy Fan, the November and December issues. It's time for me to catch up, and respond to both.

November... Well done on the elections. It is obvious that more people need to participate in them. Perhaps for each person that votes in future elections, their memberships will be advanced for three months? Looks like more people need an incentive to take part; this might be a solution.

Also, well done on all the available zines. I hope the membership is reading them, and enjoying them. With luck, some might even participate and submit their own articles. I have always enjoyed seeing my name in print; proof that I took part, and helped to make the issue what it is.

Hey, a great letter column! In my own loc, I mentioned that I had acted as a proofreader/copy editor for issue 2 of the revived Amazing Stories, and that issue is now out in actual paper magazine format. Now I can say I have done the same for issue 3. I don't know when that will see publication. We have done all our shows for 2018, and we might not have anything until May 2019, so we have five months to work on creating new merchandise.

December... I really have no interest in anime and manga, but Toronto is home to one of the biggest anime conventions on the continent, Anime North. So, I know many people who do like it. My niece likes some anime, but one show she really likes is a CGIed series produced by interests in South Korea and France, entitled Miraculous: Tales of Ladybug and Cat Noir. I have seen a few episodes now at her urging, and I can see the appeal, especially for fans of superheroes and young teenagers. I did a little poking around to see the extent of the fandom, and it is huge. Wikis, websites, social media, Miraculous is everywhere, and its fandom is worldwide. Perhaps an article on Miraculous would be well-received in Mangaverse, I think.

Thanks to Jon Swartz on the article on John Millard. I did meet John once. He was at one of the very first meetings for the Toronto in 2003 Worldcon bid in 1998, and as said in the article, he died not long afterwards. I have never heard of the conventions in Toronto called Secondary Universe; the earliest ones I'd heard of were the Fan Fairs. I time my own entry into fandom in December of 1977, which means I can now claim 41 years in fandom.

Now that it is only a few days away from Christmas as I write, we hope all members of the N3F had themselves a wonderful Christmas, and may 2019 be so much better for all of us. I know few people who said 2018 was a good year for them. Take care, all, and see you in the LoCs again soon.

#### Sercon

N3F Founding Members: Nicholas E. Kenealy by Jon D. Swartz, Ph.D. N3F Historian

Nicholas E. (Nick) Kenealy was an early science fiction (SF) fan from California.

His SF story in the January, 1940, issue of Thrilling Wonder Stories ("Conquistadores from Beyond") was a short story prize winner when Kenealy was in the U. S. Army and stationed in Hawaii. His brief biography was published with his story, and stated that he was a longtime reader of Thrilling Wonder Stories and that his favorite SF artist was H. W. Wesso (1894 - 1948), who did many illustrations for Amazing Stories.

Kenealy also had a letter published in the October, 1941, issue of Amazing that he signed as Sgt. Nick Kenealy. In this letter, under a heading of "EDITORIAL BLAST" he wrote:

"Your editorial blast at a certain section of the fan magazines has me standing up and cheering. Itt appears to me that the fan editors never got humps in their back until an editor has rejected a few of their stories. That seems to bring out the literary critic in them. You have rejected a story or two of mine, in fact, who hasn't. But I still like your magazine.

Why don't you quote circulation figures? That should prove something. Is the promise of Bok just

an idle hope. He is more suitable to a science fiction magazine than Finlay. Nice to see Coblentz. He conjures the atmosphere that made stf what it was 15 years ago. How about L. Taylor Hansen, Gelula, Harl Vincent? We could use more of that solid stuff. A Morey cover would not hurt either."

Of course, Kenealy was also one of the founding members of our club, The National Fantasy Fan Federation, founded in 1941.

#### N3F Archives: 1945 - 1984 Issues of TNFF Added by Jon D. Swartz N3F Historian

This past month, the N3F historian was able to acquire the following back issues of The National Fantasy Fan (TNFF) for the club archives.

January, 1945; October, 1947; December, 1952/January, 1953; December, 1961; April, 1963; April, August, November, 1964; October, 1984; October, December, 1984; October, 1985.

Some facts about these issues:

This January, 1945, issue belonged to Art Widner, one of our club's founders. At the time he was an army private with an address at the Climatic Research Laboratory in Lawrence, Massachusetts, and he contributed an article on fanzines to this issue. "Successor to BONFIRE" was printed on the cover. Karl Blackley contributed a list of "fantasy films for home use" that offered for rent such films as The Wolf Man (starring Lon Chaney, Jr.) and Invisible Agent (starring Jon Hall). When I was growing up, Hall was the only other person I knew of who spelled his name as I did. I didn't find out until much later that "Jon Hall" was his stage name, and his birth name was Charles Locher. But I saw all his movies when I thought of him as Jon Hall! "The Wolf Man" and "Invisible Agent" rented for \$17.50 each. Other contents of this early issue included a president's message (from E. Everett Evans), an article on

1944 genre awards, a report on the reorganization of the club's Welcoming Committee, and a couple of LoCs, including one from BNF Bob Tucker, who was vice-president at the time and later succeeded Evans as president. The issue was 12 pages in length, counting covers.

The October, 1947, issue was an official Election Issue and had Dale Tarr running for president, Henry Georgi running for vice-president, K. Martin Carlson running for secretary-treasurer, and Paul Spencer, Vernell Coriell, Andy Lyon, Rick Sneary, Ray C. Higgs, Les Croutch, Henry Spelman, Fred Ross Burgess, Stanley Mullen, Benson Perry, Harry B. Moore, John Koestner, and Dean Boggs running for the directorate. Most presented lengthly platforms. At this time the treasury boasted a balance of \$106.12. The issue was 14 pages in length, counting covers, and had a full page ad for David H. Keller's The Sign of the Burning Hart, the first hardcover book to be published by the club. My personal copy of this book is signed by Dr. Keller, and will eventually become part of the club's archives.

In the 1952/1953 issue, the editor was Ray C. Higgs, who listed the members by name who voted in the 1952 club elections! The outgoing president was K. Martin Carlson and the incoming president was Bill Venable. The new Directorate consisted of Wood, Carr, Higgs, Carlson, and Woolston. Wood was the new chair of the directorate, as determined by his total number of votes in the election! The remainder of the issue consisted of a report on a UK con and LoCs. The total issue was 16 pages,  $8 \frac{1}{2} x$ 11 inches, but only 14 had text and/or illustrations on them.

In the December, 1961 issue, the editor was Ralph M. Holland, the president was also Holland, and the members of the directorate were Nancy Rapp, Alma Hill, Albert J. Lewis, Howard DeVore, and Don Franson. Contents consisted of various reports; a message from the editor/president; Lewis's Public Relations Department; an In Memoriam for a club member, Carl Carter, who had been killed in an accident; and reports on the club's Manuscript Bureau (by Ed Ludwig), the club's Round Robins (by Seth Johnson), the Recruiting Bureau (by Richard Finch), the Secretary-Treasurer's Report; and lists of new members and changes of address. The issue

ended with an announcement of the next editor of Tightbeam. At the time, the editorship of Tightbeam was different each issue. The total issue was 10 pages, counting the front cover.

The April, 1963, issue showed Don Franson as president, with a directorate of Albert J. Lewis (chair), Howard DeVore, David G. Hulan, Arthur H. Rapp, and Roy H. Tackett. At the time TNFF was published six times a year. This issue consisted of 16 pages. The contents that caught my eye were the club's new Information Bureau (that had nothing to report for its first year), and what was called the Follow-Up Bureau. This last Bureau apparently existed mainly to relieve the president of some of his responsibilities. There was also a short section on the Kaymar Award, a NFFF Trader page, and – what interested me most – a brief "History: NFFF" section that reported on the past October and December, 1947, issues of TNFF.

The three issues from the 1960s were very similar and all included a president's message, a NFFF Trader (where members listed items they had for sale, their want lists, etc.), Bureau Reports (including an Overseas Bureau and the previously mentioned Follow-Up Bureau), lists of officers and bureau heads, LoCs, other NFFF History sections, announcements, etc. In addition, the April issue had a list of club members by state (with California and New York in the lead, which came as no surprise) and foreign countries. At this time the club also had a Lending Library that boasted many SF books and magazines. The August issue published the club's Constitution and Bylaws, announced the establishment of a new Games Bureau, and included a list of current fanzines. The November issue had in addition a list of paperback and hardback publishers that used SF, a report on the "Neffer Amateur Press Alliance," and platforms of members running for office. Two of the three issues had covers by Elaine Wojciechowski.

All the issues from the 1980s were quite similar, but some new additions and format changes from previous years appeared. While all previous issues described were the size of a standard sheet of paper, the 1980 bi-monthly issues were all smaller in size (approximately 7 x 8.5 inches), but had many more pages. Moreover, familiar names began to appear, including that of our current president, George Phillies, as head of the club's Games Bureau, and Bob Jennings, as Head of the Tape Bureau. In addition, comic strips and references to superheroes began appearing, and all three issues had membership application forms that greatly resembled the one we use today. The October issue listed all club members, headed by Forrest J Ackerman (a life member). I didn't count them, but it was stated at the end of the list that 268 labels had been printed for the recent mailing. In 1984 Owen K. Laurion was president, David Heath, Jr. was editor, and Howard DeVore was publisher. Three people were needed to do what our current president does all by himself! The December issue had Don Franson's "Trash Barrel," a column that gave reviews of current fanzines. According to Franson, if they were not prozines, they were eligible to appear in his column.

The October, 1985, issue (that, according to the mailing label, was Ackerman's copy) had many of the same features as the other issues of the 1980s, with almost the same cast of characters, but was 60 pages in length! Different from the others was a convention calendar, multiple illustrations (several related to comic books and some by Jose Sanchez, who has done covers for Tightbeam recently), a Computer Bureau Report by Mike Peralta, with De-Vore as the official election teller as well as the publisher, and there was also a "Space Penguin" comic strip by Dan Duval.

These are interesting additions of The Fan for our growing club archives.

For those of you looking for novels to read for the 'review everything' project, here is a list of novels brought out in December by Smashwords. The list also gives an impression of current pricing and word count length. There are far more novels out there.

Box Set Heroes United (Six Superhero Books) by Alquir Black Price: \$12.52 USD. Words: 348,210.

The McClane Apocalypse Book Ten by Kate Morris Price: \$5.99 USD. Words: 140,440. Incursion: Taylor Neeran Chronicles #2 by J J Mathews . Price: \$2.99 USD. Words: 142,210. 

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# 2019 N3F Amateur Short Story Contest

### Story Contest Rules and Entry Blank

Now and then, it has been suggested to open the N3F Amateur Short Story Contest to professional writers, writers who have had one or two sales. I've never favored this. It is my opinion that we want new blood. We want to reward the new kids on the block. To be blunt, we want writing that is not that good. We want stories from people who don't know their object from their subject, who don't know where commas go, and who use apostrophes to denote plurals -- but who have a story to tell. I want stories from guys nobody's ever heard of...but in the years ahead, we will. Those who are already successful don't need the encouragement of our little contest. If they were to enter the contest, the danger is that they'd win, every time, and crowd out the promising newcomer.

1. This contest is open to all amateur writers in the field, regardless of whether they're members of the National Fantasy Fan Federation. For the purposes of this contest, we define an amateur as someone who has sold no more than two (2) stories to professional science fiction or fantasy publications.

2. Stories entered in the contest must be original, unpublished, not longer than 8,500 words in length—and must be related to the science fiction, fantasy, or similar genres in the opinion of the judge.

3. Email attachments of Word documents are acceptable for submission. Manuscripts on paper should be typed, single sided on 8 1/2"-by- 11" white paper, double spaced, with pages numbered. The name of the author should not appear anywhere on the manuscript to ensure impartial judging. Photocopies are acceptable, if they are of good quality. Computer printouts must be legible.

4. Contestants can enter up to three stories. Enclose a self-addressed, stamped envelope (SASE) if you would like your story returned at the end of the contest. Stories will not be returned without an SASE. Do not send your only copy in case of accidental loss. We are not responsible for lost manuscripts.

5. Email entries will be accepted. Send to Jefferson P. Swycaffer at abontides@gmail.com. No guarantee can be made of email receipt. Privacy and property rights will be absolutely respected. No one other than the Short Story Judge will ever see the submission.

6. There are no entry fees.

7. Cash prizes totaling \$100 will be awarded as follows: First prize is \$50, second \$30, and third \$20. Honorable mentions and semifinalists will receive a certificate of award.

8. Send all manuscripts to the contest manager: Jefferson Swycaffer, P. O. Box 15373, San Diego, CA 92175-5373; abontides@gmail.com. Emails with the story attached in word format are preferred. Paper manuscripts are acceptable. All entries must be received or postmarked no later than Dec. 31, 2019.

9. The Short Story Judge is a published science fiction professional, and also a loving fan of the sf and fantasy genres. All comments and critiques are solely the Short Story Judge's opinion, but he promises to be constructive and polite.

10. Stories will also be reviewed by the Editor of the N3F Fiction zine Eldritch Science; authors of suitable tales will be invited to submit their tales for publication in our zine. This review and invitation will only occur after contest winners have been announced, so it can have no effect on the contest outcome.

101 The NSF may want to publish an electronic book including top entries from one or more years of publication. You will not be contacted about this until after the contest is over and prizes have been awarded. If we want to publish your story, you will have to sign over to us first world serial rights. Your willingness to sign over rights cannot affect whether or not you win the contest. Royal-ties will be divided evenly among all contest writers once publishing costs are covered. Winners will be notified as soon as the judg-ing is completed. Announcements and notifications of winning entries will be made by March 2020. Please take your time and submit your best work. You can resubmit stories previously entered. All entries will be kept confidential and will be judged fairly and anonymously. The deadline for all entries is Dec. 31, 2019. Good luck!
