ocms as K. Martin has asked me to write an account of my comings and goings, and my doings and undergoings at the Torcon. Well, here goes - but, first, a few words of gentle proof to you all who didn't go.



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MANUSCRIPT BUREAU REFORT

I'm happy to report that things are picking up. In fact, during the past week or two I've even had a backlog of material. Before that I was forced to merely take stuff out of incoming mail and eram it into outgoing envelopes--domand was greater than the supply. Joe Kenmedy broke the jinx by (on his own initiative) shipping me a fat sheaf of stuff. We could use more fon like Joe.

During the socond quarter of 1948, the Bureau supplied 29 picces of material, which went to 12 different fanzines. Every aditor who requested material was sont something, although because of the limited supply of manuscripts in the Bureau there was solden much of a choice to be had.

There is a definite want for two types of material: (a) Artwork already stonciled; (b) Articles running about 500 words, on subjects connected with stf and/or fandom. There is little demand for fiction because many of the fanzines do not use it at all, and furthermore, every fan sooms to be a fiction-writer, whereas other types of matcrial are turned out by only a few fans.

If you are an artist, by all means familiarize yourself with the mechanical problems of putting out fanzines. The subtle shading of pencil drawings is almost impossible to reprodue on a mimoe stoncil especially if your work must be traced by someone with little artistic talent. There are several new hectograph fanzines springing up, and they could all use work done on smooth paper with hecto ink, but here again the problem of going over a pencil drawing with ink soldom gives satisfactory results.

The field of hecto artwork is wide open for experimentation ---the only person at present using the full possibilities of this medium is Bob Sycin, and I suggest that you study his work with a view to developing hecto techniques of your own.

I'm not too familiar with the roquirments of the photolith duplication process, but if your ambitions lie in that direction, the oditor of any fanzine published by that process will be glad to give you advice on what is required.

As for written work -- don't hesitate to write articles for fanzines just because you're a new fan. If you have a favorite author, for example, you could bat out an essay on what you like about his work, and why, Maybe no one agrees with you, but your opinions are

To The Members Of The NFFF:

The recent referendum has resulted in the overwhelming acceptance of the new constitution -- overwhelming that is in reference to the number of ballots cast. Paul Spencer informs me there are added delays in production of the Hart book due to printer's and printer's estimates. But he's probing himself a real citizen of the organization in working hard on this job which at the present time is the most heart-braking one in the organization.

We have not yet succeeded this year in getting fully set up the way we want to be but our efforts have resulted in increasing memberships and those can pave the way to projects next year.

We need more state representatives.

Lets get out the candidates: lets get out the vote in the coming election; next year we want to be able to say "we're doing fine in '49."

Then too the convention next year is in Cincinnati and I'd like to see all of you members in attendance. There's hardly any excuse for any one in the Midwest failing to make it.

It's a natural! the seventh world Science Fiction Convention in Cincinnati over the laber day week end. Sept. 3-4-5, 1949.
