

## INSIDE VIEWS

Dear Neffers,

I would like to be able to write percenally to each of you, to give an inside view of both N3F and fandom at large as seen from here. The job you gave me by votinge me to this job as President of N3F does invoive lots of correspondence, but besides that there are phone calls and sometimes I've had a chance to meet som me about the death of E. Mayne Hull, after an illness that was quite apparent for months). Another was from Beth Slick velling me Tightbaem was ready to be run off Fred Patten concerning his project, an illustrated history of world cons.

The reason I mention these here is that I felt it would be best to pass along any information I get to members at once, as is my habit. If I had the news earlier I could pass it along to Sheryl Birkhead, as Head of the Neffer News Bureau As second-best, I've labeled it with the Neffer News Bureau heading for you to read.

Sheryl asked me to write an article for the first free publication we did to be distributed at a worldcon (Torcon II) a few years ago. For the second issue I did another article, and Sheryl has now a third item by me for the third is not drifting along; Sheryl continues to be a most active Neffer, and it is appreciated.

But I have wanted to encourage others to help, and to consider themselves g'reperters' for news they can locate (or create, in the case of projects and the like). But 'reporter' may be too formal a term: it may turn some people off. So I suggest YOU consider yourself a 'correspondent' and send Sheryl messages with news of any sort—about a regional con you attended or are involved in planning, with the details of date, prices and addresses to join or attend; or the same for any other itmes of news. Who does what, where, and how can a fan get more information about it?

Sheryl has written about news getting: it can be a problem. So-are you Sheryl's friend? If so, how about sending her news (information that a fan, a reader of SF, a collector or any other type of SF-fantasy enthusiast) can appreciate. Sheryl is the focus point of locating usable news for us. She isn't a trained 'journalist'-and while we do have such members (Harry Warner and Don Thompson for example), fans are noted as fully able to pass along simple information to each other and NO journalistic degree is needed to write down what is happening will happen, or has happened.

News should appeal to us, if it touches our interests in fandom. So could I suggest you consider typing Sheryl's name and address on a postcard, and either type or pen news whenever shomething that interests you shows up? after that MAIL IT TO SHERYL--for without the act of mailing, the news will never get to the editor to use.

Some fans are habitual cardwriters—which is fine. News needn't be written tediously—in fact, getting it down on paper or card is fine. But the important thing is to visualise doing it, then acting.

## THE NEW BOOK REPORT

Ballantine is going all out this Spring, with a new sf logo and a special book store display rack filled partly with re-issues of old classics (new covers--and new prices) and partly with nice new titles. Warm Worlds and Others, by James Tiptree (Ballantine, February, \$1.50), is a volume of twelve elegant stories, the best of which is "Love Is the Plan, the Plan Is Death." But all are a cut above the average. Farthest Star, by Frederik Pohl & Jack Williamson (Ballantine, February, \$1.50), is really two interconnected novellas. Both depend on a method whereby talented people can produce exact replicas of themselves, sending one on a risky venture or to almost certain death while the other stays behind as a reserve, in safety. Undemanding but entertaining adventure. The Man Who Awoke, by Laurence Manning (Ballantine, February, \$1.50), is the first book publication of a 1933 serial from WONDER STORIES. It's aged very well, and echoes of Olaf Stapledon are discernible. The plot is an early--but well-handled--treatment of immortality-by-cryogenics and the successive futures in which the hero awakes. As a devotee of Cordwainer Smith from way back, I am delighted to see the publication, at long last of Nostrilia (Ballantine, February, \$1.50), a long and extraordinarily beautiful novel about the rich hayseed who buys Old Earth. It originally appeared in the '60s, in jumbled form, as "The Planet Buyer" and "The Underpeople," but this new version restores cuts and straightens everything out.

In Phoenix Without Ashes (Fawcett, February, 95¢), Harlan Ellison relates a long and harrowing tale about the job the Hollywood meat-grinder did on his award-winning pilot script for "The Starlost." Then Ed Bryant does a very good novelization of the original story. Fans of Davy will like Edgar Pangborn's new book Company of Glory (Pyramid, January, \$1.25) which has approximately the same setting, starring Demetrios, a village storytellar and janitor in a whorehouse. Pangborn obviously has a lot of fun with literary allusions . . .

Unpopular Planet, by Evelyn E. Smith (Dell, January, \$1.25), is a too-long jaunt which nevertheless has a lot of sparkle for a first (?) novel. Nick, an Entertainer (musician and male geisha), is haunted by a guardian angel who kidnaps him and packs his off to a planet where he manages to become king-for awhile. In The Shockwave Rider (Harper, January, \$8.95), John Brunner acknowledges his debt to Toffler's Future Shock for the background of a 21st Century America controlled by electronic government. Mostly this involves a marathon chase through a society of paranoics. Too disjointed to be First-Class Brunner.

Robert Hoskins edits The Liberated Future (Fawcett, December, \$1.50), a good reprint anthology covering the '50s and '60s mostly, and evidently aimed at the classroom. A more than ordinarily stimulating theme (liberation from everything almost) and not a bad one in the bunch. Dan Morgan's Inside (Berkley, December, 95¢) is competent space operatic adventure about psychopathic rehabilitation experiments on Mars, with plots and sabotage abounding, lots of action, and some ingenious plot twists.

It has been estimated that probably 90% of sf readers are male. Pamela Sargent has edited a very good reprint anthology which bids for the other 10%, but should be read by all--Wemen of Wonder: Science Fiction Stories by Women About Women (Vintage, February, \$1.95). In addition to the long and fascinating introduction, the twelve stories included stretch the limitations of both writers and characters. The Best of Planet Stories #1, edited by Leigh Brackett (Ballantine, January, \$1.25), is a surprisingly readable collection of less familiar stories originally published between 1940 and 1955. Barry Malzberg's Out from Ganymede (Warner, December, \$1.25)

is a collection -- to be consumed in small bites only -- of his rather too facile short stories.

The Wilk Are Among Us, by Isidore Haiblum (Doubleday, January, \$5.95), is a considerable disappointment. Leonard, a supposedly superior alien studying inferior creatures in our neck of the galaxy, is impossible to empathize with: one hardly knows what he is, much less where he is or what he's doing. It's all very confusing. Fans of Thomas B. Swenn will probably like The Not-World (DAW, February, \$1.25), but those who gag on his coy and sentimental Disneyfication of ancient and once-dignified myths should be forewarmed: this one is cuter than ever. Bambi beware! Future Corruption (Warner, January, \$1.25) is one of Roger Elwood's better anthologies, though (as usual) some of the stories have little to do with the theme. Those by R.A. Lafferty and Jerry Sohl are probably the best.

Hock #1: Whirlpool of Stars, by Tully Zetford (Pinnacle, January, \$1.25), is another of those "hero" series for which this publisher has become infamous. This one introduces a nifty new sci-fi idea: replacing some of the hero's fallible human parts with much better man-made ones. The Rover Boys in a rocket ship. Pretty childish.

Finally, here's one I've been rather eagerly awaiting: Joanna Russ' The Female Man (Bantam, February, \$1.25). There will probably be some question whether this really qualifies as "science fiction," though Bantam calls it that. It's certainly avant garde, surreal, and phantasmagoric. It's also fiercely and relentlessly feminist. The four women--some from alternate Earths--who form the basis of the story are difficult to understand and comprehend at times, but I strongly recommend you make the effort. This will undoubtedly make the Hugo list.

He already has copies of program books. Official business, highlights behinds scenes, and similar material is meant to be included.

#### NEW MEMBERS AND ENTHUSIASM

When a new members joins they may not expect what they get in N3F. You may want to investigate the club's amateur press group, and writing Frank Balazs will be simple because the name is listed in TNFF. If you want more information on a Bureau than the few words on the Bureau listing page, you can write your Welcommittee correspondent or write directly to the person in charge of the bureau. It's as easy as writing a letter.

But of course some people hesitate to write-they're shy. They may not have written many letters before-and many who are now regular corespondents may have been only occasional writers a short time ago. Well, don't worry. The other person is in the same boat with you-as far as sharing interests goes, at least. So even though everyone is an individual, there is so much in common between you that there is no reason not to write anyone.

Enthusiasm is the key to fandom--that and knowning that you share an interest. In N3F, every member (including officers) are members with enough interest in others and mutual affairs to keep in touch.

That is why many people who never corresponded more than a few times, or in more than a few sentences, may find they write a page, or several pages, in a short time. There is more to comment on. There's individual views to express, too and the other person will read is what you say and consider it. Age may be a barrier in some relationships, but it is much less a barrier in fandom. But unless there is some sort of involvement (writing or talking), the result is non-communication.

The club is capable of thriving when there is enthusiasm displayed by members.

New members are apt to display enthusiasm

Therefore, we should cultivate new members, if we are old members.

And we should appreciate the members, for what they are. And they are individuals that have much in common with us.

You may think, if you're new to N3F, some of the members lack enthusiasm; and perhaps some have more than others. Not everyperson laughs at the same joke, or appreciates equally with you a specific story. But if there was no enthusiasm, a person would just stop being a member. So, if you're new or old---why not write someone?

There is a cash award of \$10.00, a years free DUES.


A certificate of award, Two hard cover books and many other items for the winner, this year, of the K-A.
