Speculative Societies: Science Fiction Club News

From the front lines and far afield, this column reports on recent happenings among local science fiction clubs. This installment reports on events that occurred in recent weeks—and are expected to happen in the month to come. (We took a month off earlier this summer because Bob Jennings's "This Afternoon I Sat in on the Worcester Library's SF Book Club Interview with Robert Sawyer" ran instead of the usual column in August; we then published the August installment in September.)

If you're active in a local club, feel free to send me activity reports and other updates via email at kalel@well.com. And if you don't participate in a local club in the area in which you live, please consider joining! I would, if I lived there.

In Aylesbury, England, the Aylesbury Sci-Fi/Fantasy Meet gathers monthly and will meet again Oct. 27 at the Charter, a Table Table pub. The Meetup tends to average about 15 participants regardless of visible RSVPs. (https://tinyurl.com/Aylesbury-club)

The Baltimore Science Fiction Society is increasingly holding in-person events at the BSFS building, encouraging vaccination and masks. (If you have COVID-19 symptoms, please attend online.) Oct. 8, the group will hold a memorial for recently fallen BSFS members and friends. Unable to organize such memorials over the last few years, the group will recognize multiple local deaths, including those of fen Donna Dearborn; Mike Hakulin, Sr.; Rikk Jacobs; Phyllis Kramer; Priscilla Newham; Barry Newton; Michele Rosenberg; Ted Ros-

enberg; Larry Sands; Bonnie Schupp; Steve Stiles; and Dalroy Ward. The club will also hold a movie night Oct. 15 featuring a Harry Potter fan film and a recent movie about a nordic deity. Oct. 22, the anime social returns with the first three episodes of Toilet Bound Hanako-kun and two episodes of Demon Slayer: Kimetsu no Yaiba. The BSFS book club also returns Oct. 22 focusing on Robert Louis Stevenson's The Strange Case Of Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde in person as well as on Zoom. The club also offers two sf- and fantasy-themed board gaming nights on the first and third Thursdays, Oct. 6 and Oct. 21. And the Writing Circle will continue to meet online on the second and fourth Thursdays: Oct. 13 and Oct. 27. The library is open during all in-person events. The group also offers a low-traffic Facebook group. (https://www.bsfs.org)

The California Bay Area Science Fiction Association continues to meet online. Discussion during meetings in September focused on local events such as dances, game nights, lectures, and a local Renaissance Fair; members' healthcare situations and summer travel; books such as Andy Weir's Project Hail Mary; television shows including the animated Amphibia, Andor, The Boys, Cosmic Love, The Expanse, The Legend of Vox Machina, The Lord of the Rings: Rings of Power, Max Headroom, Obi-Wan Kenobi, Resident Alien, She-Hulk: Attorney at Law, and Westworld; movies such as I Am Mother and Moon Man; ChiCon participation; and an upcoming BASFA room party at the furry convention PawCon in November. BASFA also held a barbecue party in mid-September. Oct. 9, KellieCon will celebrate the life of Kellie Gower with a potluck gathering. The group meets weekly and offers an active Facebook group. Minutes are frequently distributed via email and Facebook. (https://www.basfa.org)

The Birmingham Science Fiction Group—also known as the Brum Group—met early in September with author, games developer, and creative consultant Gav Thorpe, who used to work for Games Workshop. The club, which began meeting in person again in April, also held a book discussion late in September. The October events have not yet been announced. Members receive a monthly newsletter, and the group offers an online list of the "100 Greatest Science Fiction Novels." The editors of an upcoming edition of the British Fantasy Society's BFS Journal are planning a special issue on fantasy and games; they are seeking submissions, and the deadline is Oct. 15. Current issues of Horizons and the Journal were at the printer in September and can already be downloaded by members. Fantasycon was held in mid-September, offering two days of programming. Running Fantasycon took most of the club's attention and energy in recent months. Congratulations on what I'm sure was an excellent event! Upcoming BFS plans include the launch of a new Web site, two more publications by the end of the year, and another Golden Jubilee online event. The society's posting of book reviews slowed via email—but not online—as the summer progressed. (https://www.britishfantasysociety.org)

New issues of the British Science Fiction Association's Focus and Vector were being finalized in September. The club recently changed to pro-rata membership, with all memberships moving to a standard renewal date of Oct. 1. (I had to check mine to see whether I was affected!) The association also sponsors online Orbit writing groups and offers writing resources. Online, the group frequently offers book reviews. The BSFA is currently looking for an assistant events officer to help the club's chief events officer with author interviews and other events. A special newsletter was sent to members at the end of September to announce the death of long-time fan and member Maureen Kincard Speller, former editor of Matrix and Vector. The collectively written tribute and other member memories—including contributions from global fandom—were touching and inspiring. (http://www.bsfa.co.uk)

Congratulations to Glasgow in 2024 for winning the Worldcon bid for 2024. The 82nd Worldcon will be held in Glasgow from Aug. 8-12, 2024. The city last hosted Worldcon in 1995 and 2005. Guests of honor will include Ken MacLeod and Nnedi Okorafor. (https://glasgow2024.org/)

Humber Speculative Fiction hosted an event Sept. 25 featuring R.J. Barker, author of the Tide Child trilogy

and the Wounded Kingdom trilogy; and Stephen Aryan, author of the Age of Darkness trilogy and the Age of Dread trilogy. An upcoming event is also planned for Nov. 27. The group's Facebook page focuses mostly on club business. (https://humbersff.wordpress.com/)

The Kansas City Science Fiction & Fantasy Society met in person at a member's home on Sept. 17. The club's Facebook group offered recent news and commentary about Archon 45 in Illinois, an Oct. 8 event hosted by the Kansas City Tolkien Society, Web development, the Hugo awards, Chicon 8, and other topics. The Los Angeles Science Fantasy Society hosted events in September featuring Larry Niven, a wide-ranging interview focusing on his career as a writer, writing process, and approach to characterization; and David Gerrold. The Oct. 20 meeting will showcase member Kevin Segall, a collector and preservationist. Member Glen Olson published a new sf novel, Desperate Endeavor, in early October. Also in early October, the club will entertain nominations for—and vote on—the 2022 Forrest J Ackerman Award for Service to Science Fiction. Almost 60 artists, composers, editors, fen, movie makers, and writers have been recognized for their service to the genre. APA-L's official collator Marty Cantor recently stepped down as OC for APA-L. Cantor will be succeeded by Heath Row (Full disclosure: That's me!)—and will continue serving as OC for LASFAPA. The club's after-meeting hangouts continue online, and the club offers at least two active Facebook groups. (http://www.lasfs.org/)

The Minnesota Science Fiction Society will hold its fall convention, Decongestant 5, Oct. 7-9. Decongestant is a small con geared mostly toward relaxation yet offering a full schedule of programming. The con will feature vampire guest of honor Brian Forrest. Supporting memberships are available! Also in October, the club will offer several game parties, a Minicon planning meeting via Discord, and a Halloween party. The club's Facebook group mostly focused on Decongestant planning and promotion, including COVID-19 testing; a recent graveyard tour and club party; and the return of local shops Uncle Hugo's Science Fiction Bookstore and Uncle Edgar's Mystery Bookstore in recent weeks. The Montreal Science Fiction and Fantasy Association returned to in-person meetings in mid-August, hosting a small but intimate picnic gathering at the end of the month. The group met again online in mid-September, discussing eBay auction strategies for books and related collectibles, and has scheduled a meeting for Oct. 15. On the group's Web site, as well as in its Facebook group, the club shares news about local events, science news, forthcoming books, and recently published fanzines and clubzines from other clubs. The Nashville Science Fiction Book Club gathered in September for a book discussion. Oct. 6, the group will meet again to discuss Douglas Adams's novel The Hitchhiker's Guide to the Galaxy. The New England Science Fiction Association's reading group will discuss John M. Ford's newly reprinted Growing Up Weightless on Oct. 7 online, or perhaps as a hybrid meeting held at the clubhouse. The deadline for the 2022 NESFA Science Fiction & Fantasy Short Story Contest passed Sept. 30. Winners will be announced at Boskone 60 in February 2023. Other upcoming events include a mid-month Boskone and NESFA business meeting and a game day near the end of the month. As a subscribing member, I recently received Instant Message #990 (September 2022), NESFA's member newsletter, which was accompanied by a detailed member roster. The newsletter primarily offers meeting minutes from recent official gatherings. Details focused on Boskone, bookmark distribution, officer and committee reports, NESFA Press publications, and awards. Not all clubs publish minutes like this; it's one of the best ways to keep on top of what a local group is doing—even if you're a local member. It's particularly important because NESFA's Facebook page has been relatively quiet for a couple of months. (http://www.nesfa.org)

The North Alabama Science Fiction Association met Sept. 17, holding an auction to raise funds. During the next meeting, Oct. 15, the group will continue preparing for DeepSouthCon 60 near the end of the month. While supporting memberships aren't available, registration is still open. The group meets on the third Saturday of each month in Huntsville, Ala. (https://tinyurl.com/NASFA-club)

The Northwest Science Fiction Society in Seattle didn't meet actively over the summer but remains active in its Facebook group. Recent discussion focused on whether Vanguard or the Nameless still meet, recent books, local events, and other topics. (http://www.nwsfs.com/)

Members of the Orange County Science Fiction Club discussed Robert J. Sawyer's alternative history The Oppenheimer Alternative in September. TIME FOR A CHAT? by Claire Brialey

Before the Covid-19 pandemic and virtual conventions, Corflu was streaming its programme items to members around the world and occasionally enticing people at the con to vaguely say something in the direction of a video camera lurking around their social space.

Every year, fanzine fans who couldn't attend the con in person would enact the tradition of trying to work out how to log onto the streaming platform, remember their password if they'd used it before, and find where they could type in text comments to chat to other people watching the programme items live. But no one who was watching the items on catch-up later could see the comments or join in the conversation. Even now that most of us are used to Zoom, you can't read or add comments later; once the meeting is closed, the comments have gone. And people watching in real time over Zoom still can't chat with people watching in the room, unless they try to open the Zoom too. (Don't try this over hotel Wi-Fi. Really. Don't!)

Now, however, we've got Discord for all your text chat needs. If you're an attending or supporting member of Corflu Pangloss who's got Discord installed on a computer, tablet, or phone, you can join the Corflu Discord server and post comments there on any subject that you want to chat about, at any time from now onwards. (After this year's con I imagine that the Corflu Craic committee would rather you did so in their channels instead, but they can tell you all about that later.)

There are a lot more details back in PR3 about getting to grips with Discord – although we do respect tradition and so you might still have the chance to try to remember a password – but once you've got an account working you can go to https://discord.gg/cMKZy5axAS to join the Corflu server.

Attract our attention when you arrive, and we'll make sure you can see all the Corflu Pangloss chat channels. You can also change your Discord display name, just for the Corflu server, so that it's a name we'll recognize: your Corflu badge name, in effect. (If you don't, we might need to ask who you are to let you in, and then we'll all get embarrassed for not recognizing one another. You see, it is just like being there in person.) Just type '/ nick' followed by the name you want us to know you by, as you would any other text comment, and you will be renamed.

So far in Discord we've had discussions about programme ideas as those develop, about the auction (download the catalogue and send your bids to Andy in advance), about opting out of the Guest of Honor selection, about getting into Canada and what's around the con hotel, and about what fan activity we're not quite managing to get on with. You know, all the usual sort of stuff that people talk about a few weeks before a convention; I don't think anyone's shared their packing list yet, but that might or might not be an incentive to come and join in.

Very soon we'll have a channel for each programme item, which will give a reminder of the item description, participants and timing but mainly offer a space for people to add comments and suggestions before, during and after the item – including putting questions to the participants, although remote viewers at the time can type those in Zoom too. Try not to pre-empt the item itself in text chat!

But you can check whether a particular topic is likely to come up in discussion, say hi to an old friend you've realized is in the audience, ask whether anyone else caught the title of the recommendation a panelist just gave, or follow up a reference someone made to your fanzine with a link so people can read it – whether or not you're watching the item live or later. And even if you're in the room at the time you can do the text equivalent of whispering to your friends during the bits you aren't really following, only without disturbing anyone else who is listening. (Don't snark too hard, though. This is part of the con, and in public, and we don't want anyone being gratuitously rude. Even when that, too, might seem like tradition.)

I'm heading back to the #con-suite for now. Although you might need to summon me out to #help-desk.

Getting to the Hotel:

When leaving the Airport, stay in the 2 Left lanes and follow the signs for "Vancouver" As you leave the Airport you begin to cross the Arthur Laing Bridge
On the Bridge watch near the end for sign "Granville Street – City Centre", Exit Right
Follow Granville Street for (5 miles/8kms) and cross the Granville Street Bridge into Downtown
Turn Left on Davie Street, which is the 2nd street after the Bridge
Drive 10 blocks to 1755 Davie St and you will see the entrance to the Sands on your
right

From USA Border Crossing "Peace Arch": 1 hour (37 miles/58 kms)

- Take the I-5 Freeway to the Peace Arch Border Crossing
- After crossing the border, the I-5 becomes Highway 99
- Follow Hwy 99 through the George Massey Tunnel then across the Oak Street Bridge
- Follow Oak Street to 41st Ave and turn Left on 41st Ave
- Drive 5 blocks to Granville Street, the next Traffic Light and turn Right
- Follow Granville Street for (2.5 miles/4 kms) and cross the Granville Street Bridge into Downtown
- Turn Left on Davie Street, which is the 2nd street after the bridge
 Drive 10 blocks to Bidwell, the street just before 1755 Davie St; turn right into Bidwell, then left into the Lane
 (Alley) named "See-EM-IA", which runs behind the hotel. Their lots are on two levels. If you miss Bidwell, and



Rabid Ears: Ravings of a TV Fiend

Rabid Ears: Ravings of a TV Fiend By Cathode Ray

Turn on and tune in for this month's edition of "Rabid Ears: Ravings of a TV Fiend." This is an occasional column about the newest and most notable science fiction, fantasy, horror, and other genre television programming options. Let's see what's what—now, and next—on the old boob tube, shall we?

The Sept. 26 to Oct. 9, 2022, issue of TV Guide opens with a "Your Feedback" letter of comment from a fan of the fantastic, Tyler—if that even be his real name. "As much as I like the incredibly funny GHOSTS on CBS, I feel sorry for the actors playing the ghosts," writes our supernatural scribe. "Imagine having to wear the same costumes for the next five to seven years without a change (or in the case of Trevor, a pair of pants)!" Oh, we're imagining! But really, who changes their clothes these days? Khakis? Check. Convention T-shirt? Check. Perhaps the actors own multiple sets of their matching ensembles. Except for Trevor, that is.

Speaking of GHOSTS, the program made this issue's "25 Top Shows" list. Tying at 20th place with CELEB-RITY WHEEL OF FORTUNE, the CBS series drew 2.8 million viewers the week of Aug. 29 to Sept. 4. GHOSTS was also featured in a half-page article in the Sept. 25 to Oct. 1, 2022, issue of TV Weekly. In the piece, showrunners Joe Port and Joe Wiseman touched on a few things fen of spooky humor should know about the new season.

TV Guide gave a Cheer to WHAT WE DO IN THE SHADOWS for giving a platform to the comedy of Kristen Schaal in that program's fourth season. The magazine's "Cheers & Jeers" column also gave a Jeer to the TELETUBBIES reboot on Netflix—and toxic fans: "Before dragging Prime Video's THE LORD OF THE RINGS: THE RINGS OF POWER ... and Disney+'s OBI-WAN KENOBI for casting people of color, how about you realize it's all make-believe anyway? Let's leave the trolls to Middle-earth, OK?" Hear! Hear!

The cover of the October 2022 edition of Channel Guide highlights one of the main reasons for the Halloween season: The excellently eerie increase of genre-related programming—shows and movies alike—screening on TV. Refer to "Celluloid Sapience" for Turner Classic Movies' and Svengoolie's October lineups, as well as the month's healthy wealth of horror movie releases. Cover lines promote "Top 50 Creepy-Good Movies," THE WALKING DEAD and its final eight episodes this month, "TV's Most Enduring & Beloved Horror Host"—Svengoolie, no less—and ANNE RICE'S INTERVIEW WITH THE VAMPIRE.

In that issue of Channel Guide, querulous correspondent AnnaBeth—if that even be her real name—writes a letter of comment asking about what's next for THE WALKING DEAD and its many spin-offs, including a six-episode conclusion to Rick and Michonne's storyline, a spin-off featuring the character Daryl Dixon, and THE WALKING DEAD: DEAD CITY. The magazine's interior includes a five-question interview with Rich Koz, eponymous host of MeTV's SVENGOOLIE, as well as candid photographs of cast members from ANNE RICE'S INTERVIEW WITH THE VAMPIRE, ARCHER, GHOSTS, THE LORD OF THE RINGS: RINGS OF POWER, RESIDENT ALIEN, THE SANDMAN, TALES OF THE WALKING DEAD, and THE WALKING DEAD.

A "Creepy-Good TV" feature story addresses notable horror programming this month including the series ANNE RICE'S INTERVIEW WITH THE VAMPIRE (AMC, Oct. 2), GUILLERMO DEL TORO'S CABINET OF CURIOSITIES (Netflix, Oct. 25-28), LET THE RIGHT ONE IN (Showtime, Oct. 9), THE MIDNIGHT CLUB (Netflix, Oct. 7) and REGINALD THE VAMPIRE (Syfy, Oct. 5), as well as additional genre programming on Discovery+, the Food Network, and the Travel Channel.

Channel Guide's "The Top 18" showcases THE WALKING DEAD (AMC, Oct. 2) and THE WINCHESTERS (The CW, Oct. 11), suggesting that while the month of October brings a boom in genre programming—ka-boom!—ongoing non-streaming series might be more rare. (I don't know that that's actually the case, but Halloween is certainly a special month for genre fare. It's easy to forget it's not like this every month.)

There were a couple noteworthy premieres, finales, and cancellations in recent weeks—as well as in the weeks to come. LA BREA premiered on NBC on Sept. 27. And GHOSTS returned to CBS on Sept. 29. THE WALK-ING DEAD returned to AMC on Oct. 2. Netflix's THE MIDNIGHT CLUB, a new horror series based on Christopher Pike's young adult novel and other writing, will become available Oct. 7. GHOST BROTHERS: LIGHTS OUT will return to Discovery+ on Oct. 7. Netflix's teenage vampire drame FIRST KILL was canceled after just one season. Meanwhile, HBO's HOUSE OF THE DRAGON was renewed for Season 2. According to Channel Guide, the GAME OF THRONES prequel's debut in August drew the largest audience ever for a new original series on HBO.

In recent days, you might have missed some quality television. BOB'S BURGERS' season premiere aired on Fox on Sept. 25, earning a TV Weekly Best Bet. QUANTUM LEAP's Sept. 26 episode on NBC was recommended in TV Guide's "What's Worth Watching." (Additionally, QUANTUM LEAP secured the cover of the Sept. 18-24, 2022, edition of TV Weekly.) LA BREA's season premiere aired on NBC on Sept. 27, also earning a Best Bet. RESIDENT ALIEN's season finale—another Best Bet—was broadcast on Syfy on Sept. 28. GHOSTS's Sept. 29 season premiere on CBS earned a Best Bet. LOS ESPOOKYS on HBO was recommended for Sept. 30. ELI ROTH PRESENTS: MY POSSESSED PET aired a series premiere on the Travel Channel on Sept. 30. QUEER FOR FEAR, a four-part docuseries considering the impact of the LGBTQ community on

the horror genre, started streaming on Shudder on Sept. 30.

CONJURING KESHA's series premiere on the Travel Channel on Oct. 1 earned a Best Bet. The new ANNE RICE'S INTERVIEW WITH THE VAMPIRE series premiered on AMC on Oct. 2. (That program was promoted with a cover line in the Oct. 2-8, 2022, edition of TV Weekly, as was THE WALKING DEAD.) Incidentally, ANNE RICE'S INTERVIEW WITH THE VAMPIRE and THE WALKING DEAD both received a Best Bet recommendation for their Oct. 2 episodes. JACK OSBOURNE'S HAUNTED HOMECOMING began streaming on Discovery+ on Oct. 2, as well. The series finale for LEONARDO aired on the CW on Oct. 4. (Already?) The season premiere of CHUCKY debuted on Syfy and USA on Oct. 5. That episode earned a Best Bet recommendation. REGINALD THE VAMPIRE also offered a series premiere on Syfy on Oct. 5.

Pencil these in your calendar, fen and fellow freaks: A new episode of GHOSTS will air on CBS on Oct. 6. A new season of GHOST BROTHERS: LIGHTS OUT will become available on Discovery+ on Oct. 7, with new episodes streaming on Fridays. SVENGOOLIE'S HALLOWEEN BOONANZA kicks off on MeTV on Oct. 8. In addition to the horror hosts' weekly, well, screamings as detailed in "Celluloid Sapience" in this issue, MeTV will also air Halloween-themed classic TV shows and marathons of programs including THE ADDAMS FAMILY (Oct. 9), ALFRED HITCHCOCK PRESENTS (Oct. 23), KOLCHAK: THE NIGHT STALKER (Oct. 30), and THE TWILIGHT ZONE (Oct. 16).

Oct. 9, MeTV will air a COLLECTOR'S CALL episode titled "Meet Alyssa Mayerik—Horror/Monster Toys." THE WINCHESTERS, a prequel to SUPERNATURAL, debuts on the CW on Oct. 11. HOUSE OF THE DRAGON's season finale is scheduled for Oct. 23 on HBO. Oct. 29, MeTV will air a special episode of SVENGOOLIE screening Fiend Without a Face, accompanied by the companion series SVENTOONIE. On Oct. 30, MeTV will also air Halloween episodes of THE ANDY GRIFFITH SHOW, CAROL BURNETT AND FRIENDS, FULL HOUSE, and other classic TV series.

Additional upcoming shows of note include SPIRIT RANGERS, an animated series focusing on Native American stories (Netflix, Oct. 10); THE BASTARD SON & THE DEVIL HIMSELF, which concentrates on the teenage son of the "world's most dangerous witch" (Netflix, Oct. 28); THE PERIPHERAL, an adaptation of William Gibson's novel (Prime Video, Oct. 21); Season 3 of PENNYWORTH: THE ORIGIN OF BATMAN'S BUTLER (HBO Max, Oct. 6), and Disney+'s WEREWOLF BY NIGHT special (Oct. 7). (Is it a movie? Is it a TV show? We shall see!)

The October 2022 issue of Remind is, as always, Halloween themed. THE MUNSTERS are featured prominently, with cover lines dedicated to exclusives featuring Butch Patrick and Rob Zombie; features on horror hosts Vampira, Svengoolie, and Elvira; and the 1964 cult classic, THE MUNSTERS. Inside, the edition includes content touching on THE ADDAMS FAMILY, BEWITCHED, THE MUNSTERS, Bobby Pickett and "Monster Mash," TV horror hosts (including Joe Bob Briggs and Morgus the Magnificent!), and the forthcoming WEDNESDAY.

The magazine's "Back in 1984" roundup showcases the premiere of HIGHWAY TO HEAVEN (NBC, 1984-1989) and the finale of FANTASY ISLAND (which premiered in 1978). Popular books that year included Stephen King and Peter Straub's novel The Talisman, which is wonderful. Popular toys included G.I. Joe, Gremlins-themed products, He-Man, and Transformers.

Delirium #31, house organ for the movie studio and streaming service Full Moon Features, includes a three-page piece by Laura Lefko titled "The Slayer Revisited." The article dissects BUFFY THE VAMPIRE SLAY-ER, "one of the most important genre TV shows of all time." The story considers the TV show's influence on language and dialogue in the context of other contemporary movies and programs, and highlights the episodes "The Body," "Buffy vs. Dracula," "Forever," "The Gift," and "Help."

Filmfax #162 (August-October 2022) offers two articles of interest to TV fiends. Part two of Ron Miller's

"Femaliens on Film" draws on TV shows such as 3RD ROCK FROM THE SUN, A FOR ANDROMEDA, LOST IN SPACE, THE MANDALORIAN and other Star Wars-related series, SPACE 1999, and STAR TREK and subsequent series, including STAR TREK: THE ANIMATED SERIES. Presley Reese's piece "WAR OF THE WORLDS: The Canadian Sequel" considers the 1988 TV series that picked up where the 1958 movie ended.

While Monster Bash #48 mostly focuses on films, Leonard Hayhurst's "Famous Falling Stars" column includes obituaries for Virginia-based horror host Rick Clark, who played the Keeper of the Chamber for CHAMBER THEATER between 1984-1986; and Nichelle Nichols, who played Nyota Uhura on STAR TREK and STAR TREK: THE ANIMATED SERIES; Nichols also did voice work for TV series BATMAN: THE ANIMATED SERIES, THE GARGOYLES, and SPIDER-MAN. Ron Adams's "Reel Reviews" in that issue touches on the Blu-ray release of NIGHT GALLERY Season 2. Trufen can be relied on to join the Monster Bash Creepy Club. I know I did. (That's one of my T-shirts!)

Rue Morgue #28 (September/October 2022) considers the impact VHS tapes had on horror movies; reviews the Los Angeles-based interactive VHS art exhibit, Slashback Video; and rounds up 25 of the "ghastliest music videos" of the past 25 years. And Mad #28 (December 2022), the 70th anniversary issue, reprints the STAR TREK parody "Star Blecch," which originally appeared in Mad #115 (December 1967). Of lesser interest, the issue also includes "The Bathroom," a parody of the 2022 movie The Batman.

From across the Big Pond, a few recent British magazines included articles of potential interest to Neffers. Infinity #53 includes a news item on the late-night TV legend EUROTRASH; a piece on DOCTOR WHO comics in Countdown, TV Action, and TV Comic; features on HIGHLANDER: THE SERIES, THE TIME TUNNEL, and strange soaps such as THE COLBYS, CROSSROADS, and EMMERDALE; and a review of the Bluray release of RESIDENT ALIEN. The Dark Side #235 features a review of the Bluray release of Sky's THE MIDWICH CUCKOOS and a feature on Ian McCulloch, who appeared on DOCTOR WHO (including "Warriors of the Deep"), as well as SURVIVORS.

SFX #357 (October 2022) sports cover lines highlighting ANDOR, CHUCKY—the cover image—HOUSE OF THE DRAGON, THE LORD OF THE RINGS: THE RINGS OF POWER, QUANTUM LEAP, and STAR TREK. The issue also includes brief pieces on ANDOR, THE MAN WHO FELL TO EARTH, and STAR TREK: PRODIGY; an obituary of Nichelle Nichols from STAR TREK; and feature stories focusing on CHUCKY, FATE: THE WINX SAGA, THE LORD OF THE RINGS: THE RINGS OF POWER, and QUANTUM LEAP. SFX also features a one-page interview with Steve Toussaint from HOUSE OF THE DRAGONS and reviews of FOR ALL MANKIND Season 3, THE GIRL IN THE MIRROR Season 1, LOCKE AND KEY Season 3, THE ORVILLE: NEW HORIZONS, SURREALESTATE Season 1, WESTWORLD Season 4, and a new Big Finish audio set featuring classic companions of the tenth DOCTOR WHO. Total Film #329 (October 2022), on the other hand, focuses very little attention on genre TV this month—other than a one-page piece about SOUTH PARK.

The Sept. 26 TV Guide crossword, Puzzle #1448, offered the following fannish bits of tantalizing trivia: 2 Down is "Guinness of Star Wars." 3 Down is "Riddler portrayer Paul." 4 Down is "Miss Piggy's nose." 27 Down is "Bill Nye's subject (abbr.)." And 41 Down is "BATTLESTAR GALACTICA commanding officer." Send in your best guesses care of this clubzine.

The focus of TV Guide Magazine Puzzler Vol. 3 #2 is "TV Sidekicks." The issue includes one or two pages each of puzzles and information on Robin from BATMAN, Tonto from THE LONE RANGER, Agent 99 from GET SMART, Dr. John Watson of SHERLOCK, and Tattoo from FANTASY ISLAND.

NOVEMBER 2022



On 21 November, 1931, the movie titled Frankenstein was released by Universal Pictures, immediately becoming a cultural icon of both horror and science fiction. An instant critical and commercial success, the movie was inspired and largely based on a stage play of the same name written by British author Peggy Webling, which was itself based on the novel by Mary Shelley. Ms Webling's play was not well regarded by critics but audiences were fascinated by the basic theme. It ran two years on tour before coming to the London stage for 72 performances in 1930.

The massive financial success of their Dracula film has convinced Carl Laemmle Jr., head of production and son of the Universal Studios owner, that well produced horror movies could become box office hits. Universal purchased the unproduced American version of the play, and make some major chances while turning it into a movie.

Robert Florey was initially given the job of director, and helped rewrite the play into something suitable for filing, but his vision of the Monster as a soulless killing machine did not jibe with either the play or the original

novel. Bela Lugosi was originally considered for the role of the monster, but he was not interested in the kind of character Florey was planning. James Whale asked for the film, and took over as director.

Production of the movie was accelerated as fast as reasonably possible with an eye toward hitting the Christmas season market, where theater attendance traditionally peaked. Creating the sets took longer than expected, and the makeup used to turn Boris Karloff into the Monster took hours to apply. The makeup was so heavy and uncomfortably that often less than an hour of actually shooting time could be obtained each day. Still, Whale was an enthusiastic director known for getting the best out of his actors and from his production crew, and everyone knew they were creating something unique.

The film had a budget of \$262.000, considered barely adequate for the kind of top grade production feature the studio wanted, but it was shot, edited, and came in within the budget. Editing the rushes and splicing in the new original music composed by Bernard Kaun brought the movie in at around 72 minutes, and more important, prints could be stuck in time to hit the holiday season.

Frankenstein opened in New York City on December 4, 1931. Within a week it has grossed \$53,000. By the end of its initial run the picture has produced a gross of \$1.4 million. Universal declared an "official" profit of \$708,871. The original film was rereleased several times both domestically and overseas in the following decade. By the end of 1953 Universal reported that the picture had produced an estimated profit of twelve million dollars.

The picture was not received without controversy. Many cities and some states demanded censorship cuts, particularly regarding the death scene where the Monster inadvertently drowns the little girl Maria, but the film's strong publicity, plus Universal's special team assigned to deal with local censorship boards directly, were able to blunt and divert a number of the censorship issues. Even so the film was banned overseas in Ireland, Sweden, Italy and Czechoslovakia. This was not the first time the novel "Frankenstein" had been turned into a movie. The Edison Company had produced a 16 minute silent version in 1910, and an Italian silent was made in 1921. But this film, Universal's 1931 adaption, a motion picture that was not true to the novel, and not true to the play, this film, has become the definitive version of the classic, and it established forever the concept of the artificially created monster as an iconic cornerstone of the science fiction and horror cinematic tradition
