Speculative Societies: Science Fiction Club News By Heath Row

From the front lines and far afield, this column reports on recent happenings among local science fiction clubs. This installment reports on events that occurred in recent weeks—and that are expected to happen in the near future.

If you're active in a local club, feel free to send me activity reports and other updates via email at kalel@well.com. And if you don't participate in a local club in the area in which you live, please consider joining! I would, if I lived there.

I'm especially interested in learning about university and college clubs. University sf clubs recently came up in the fanzines Beam and Sporadic, and have historically been a major influence and inspiration for newcomers to sf, fantasy, and horror. I'd like this column to help showcase college club activities as well, as a way to better integrate them into broader fandom, given interest from students.

In Aylesbury, England, the Aylesbury Sci-Fi/Fantasy Meet gathers monthly and will meet again Nov. 24 at the Charter, a Table Table pub. The Meetup tends to average about 15 participants regardless of visible RSVPs. (https://tinyurl.com/Aylesbury-club)

The Baltimore Science Fiction Society has an extremely active schedule planned for November. Members of the club are participating in National Novel Writing Month (Nanowrimo), gathering in person and online for group writing sessions every Sunday afternoon. The Balticon 57 planning meeting and BSFS business meetings will be held Nov. 12. Congratulations to Neffer Sam Lubell for being elected chair of Balticon 58 in 2024! A relatively new monthly workshop focusing on speculative poetry is held every third Thursday of the month. The next instance occurs Nov 17 via Zoom. The club's board gaming nights occur on the first and third Thursdays of each month, with the next planned for Nov. 17 and Dec. 1. A film night is scheduled for Nov. 19, featuring fan films and the 2018 superhero drama Fast Color. Nov. 24, Thanksgiving Day, the group will hold a potluck picnic event at the BSFS building. "[V]isit the family and then come on down to the Baltimore Science Fiction Society Building to recover," the organizers say. The BSFS book club will next meet Nov. 26 to discuss Macroscope by Piers Anthony. An anime social will also be held that day to screen the first three episodes of Shine on! Bakamatsu Bad Boys! and the first three episodes of The Girl from the Other Side before

continuing with Demon Slayer. Tabletop roleplaying returns Nov. 27 via Discord. Premade characters will be available. And the Writing Circle will next meet via Zoom on Dec. 8. The 15,000-item library is open during all in-person events. The group also offers a low-traffic Facebook group. (https://www.bsfs.org)

The California Bay Area Science Fiction Association continues to meet online. Discussion during meetings in October and early November focused on local events such as upcoming meetings of the Legion of Rasselon, a Bay Area Doctor Who fan club, and Fan Expo San Francisco; the online Or-E-Con 2; television series such as Doctor Who, Electric Dreams, House of the Dragon, The Lord of the Rings: The Rings of Power, and She-Hulk: Attorney at Law; and movies including Black Adam, The Cabinet of Dr. Caligari, Crimes of the Future, The Midnight Sky, The Northman, Under the Shadow, and Wendell & Wild. The group meets weekly and offers an active Facebook group. Minutes are frequently distributed via email and Facebook. (https://www.basfa.org)

The Birmingham Science Fiction Group in England featured its president, author Christopher Priest, at its Nov. 4 meeting. His most recent novel, Expect Me Tomorrow, was published this fall. The group's Facebook page recently featured humorous photographs, a mention of Kurt Vonnegut's 100th birth anniversary, a Ray Bradbury-focused podcast, book projects, and upcoming conventions. The October edition of the British Fantasy Society's Monthly Bulletin offered information about some changes the group is considering making to its membership structure and dues. Having recently adopted a revised constitution, the group intends to put itself on firmer legal and financial footing, diversifying its sources of income. A final Golden Jubilee event was held Nov. 12. The society seeks a new editor for the BFS Journal, as well as other volunteers for a number of positions. The current editors extended the deadline for its special issue on fantasy and games for select writers to the end of October. The society posts book reviews frequently to the Web site. The British Science Fiction Association's membership newsletter for October addressed the Clarke Awards event at the London Science Museum and winner Deep Wheel Orcadia by Harry Josephine Giles. The museum's science fiction exhibition is reportedly excellent. Nominations for the 2022 BSFA Awards are now open. The upcoming issues of Focus and Vector are at the printers and should be mailed soon. Reviews from The BSFA Review and articles from other club publications are frequently published online. With the first volume of Fission #2 published earlier this year, the second volume is currently being prepared. The first volume contains almost 20 short stories by a wide range of authors. The group also offers a friendly and fun Facebook group. (http://www.bsfa.co.uk)

Humber Speculative Fiction, also in England, will host an event Nov. 27 featuring Daniel Godfrey, author of New Pompeii, Empire of Time, and The Synapse Sequence; and Sunyi Dean, author of The Book Eaters. The group's Facebook page focuses mostly on club business. (https://humbersff.wordpress.com/)

The Kansas City Science Fiction & Fantasy Society held a Halloween party last month, featuring "some spooky readings." This month, the group will gather Nov. 19 for a Thanksgiving potluck. Local slipstream and horror author Sean Demory will present a reading. The club's Facebook group offered recent news and commentary about a local public sculpture, Kurt Vonnegut's 100th birth anniversary, military sf written by veterans, a new local sf/horror audio drama, the World Fantasy Awards, and other topics. The Los Angeles Science Fantasy Society hosted an event in late October featuring member Kevin Segall, who discussed the life and career of Mel Blanc through documents and ephemera. Members are turning their attention to the upcoming Loscon at the end of November, gathering for con planning committee meetings, to organize and prepare a storage unit for unloading, and other con business. The society will meet in person during Loscon. Several board members were recently elected to new or renewed positions on the board, and the

club's procedural positions come up for election next month. Rumors indicate that I plan to run for scribe. After-meeting hangouts continue online, and the club offers at least two active Facebook groups. (http://www.lasfs.org/)

The Minnesota Science Fiction Society will participate in Give to the Max day Nov. 17, and has planned a game party for Nov. 18 and 25, an outdoor fire circle Nov. 19, an online Minicon meeting Nov. 30, and its next club meeting Dec. 3. A member hosts a weekly game night in his home. The club's Facebook group mostly focused on the recent Halloween party at Dream Park (a local fan site), new members, local events such as a new roleplaying game convention, and other topics. Recent editions of Einblatt, the group's newsletter, promoted events held by other local groups such as the Gaylactic Network and the Rivendell Group, events at local bookstores, and member birthdays. 

A Memorial Tribute to Justin E. A. Busch



Justin Edwin Anton Busch, child of Norbert Aloysius Francis Busch and Jeanne Elizabeth Busch nee Staples, Editor of Fanfaronade and Films Fantastic, died peacefully in his sleep in the early evening of Friday, October 21, 2022. His death, while untimely, was not unexpected. Toward the end he had been moved from hospital to hospice care.

Busch's contributions to the N3F included his monthly column Fanfaronade, a thoughtful review of fanzines, and his editorship through four issues of Films Fantastic, the N3F film review zine. In recent years he produced several other fanzines, including Far Journeys: A Sercon Fanzine and Dreams Renewed.

Busch was a musician-composer of chamber music and a writer. His musical contributions with the Esperanze Ensemble can be watched on YouTube

Busch was widely respected among stfnal fans. Shortly before his death, he was given the First Fandom Merit Award, "Presented to Justin E. A. Busch for attaining excellence in his work." Turn on and tune in for this month's edition of "Rabid Ears: Ravings of a TV Fiend." This is an occasional column about the newest and most notable science fiction, fantasy, horror, and other genre television programming options. Let's see what's what—now, and next—on the old boob tube, shall we?

Congratulations to all of the Saturn Award recipients, as well as the nominees. It was a good year for genre TV.

Come to think of it, October was a good month! What will November bring us?

The cover of the Oct. 10-23, 2022, issue of TV Guide focuses solely on the premiere of THE WINCHESTERS. Calling it "a SUPERNATURAL love story," the cover promotes "the true tale of Sam and Dean's monster-hunting parents." Inside the edition, there's a three-page feature story about THE WINCHESTERS, a SUPERNATURAL prequel that's set in the 1970s. A sidebar introduces some of the new characters from the program, which premiered early last month on the CW. The issue also includes a two-page article on HBO's lost-in-space comedy AVENUE 5, which also premiered early last month. The program concentrates on the passengers and crew of an off-course luxury spaceship. I usually don't look so far back when writing these columns, but the cover photo and opening features seemed notable given the topic of this column.

THE WINCHESTERS also claims the cover of the Oct. 9-15, 2022, issue of TV Weekly. Cover lines for that edition also promote LET THE RIGHT ONE IN and an interview with horror host Svengoolie. Inside, there is a half-page feature on the SUPERNATURAL prequel. The half-page interview with Svengoolie focuses on the TV shows Rich Koz watched as a child, the first scary movie he ever saw—The Wizard of Oz, which will air on TBS on Nov. 19 and TNT on Nov. 24—and interactions with fen.

With its Oct. 24 to Nov. 6, 2022, edition, TV Guide offers its Halloween Special, which features GHOSTS on the cover, offering to go "behind the scenes of TV's most spirited comedy," as well as a list of 10 more "scary-good shows." Given that Halloween occurred not long ago, we might still be able to experience the waning days of the plethora of genre offerings aired in the spirit of the season. In fact, GHOSTS secured the No. 9 position in TV Insider's "25 Top Shows," claiming 6.5 million viewers tuning in the week of Sept. 26 to Oct. 2, 2022. In the ranking in TV Guide's Nov. 7-20 edition, GHOSTS came in at No. 9 again, maintaining its 6.5 million viewers in the week of Oct. 10-16, 2022. The show remains the only genre program to consistently rank in recent months.

The issue's "Halloween Special!" feature rounds up 11 new Halloween-themed episodes of shows including QUANTUM LEAP, THE SIMPSONS, and others. A two-page article focuses on GHOSTS, concentrating on its Halloween episode, which featured a seance. And Damian Holbrook's "Cheers & Jeers" column gave a Cheer to "TV's new wave of bloodsuckers," lauding AMC's ANNE RICE'S INTERVIEW WITH THE VAMPIRE and Showtime's LET THE RIGHT ONE IN. He also gave a Jeer to THE HANDMAID'S TALE for a plot misstep, and to HOUSE OF THE DRAGON's overly grisly Oct. 9 episode, which reportedly makes GAME OF THRONES' Red Wedding look downright tame.

In TV Guide's Nov. 7-20, 2022, issue, Holbrook's column offers a Cheer to THE WINCHESTERS for cross-casting several characters from SUPERNATURAL and a Jeer to AMERICAN HORROR STORY: NYC for trafficking in stereotypes: "[T]he scariest part about Season 11 of FX's horror show is how it reduces the 1980s LGBTQ community to archaic cliches."

In TV Weekly's Oct. 23-29, 2022, edition, the "Ask Matt" column includes a question from undead fan Mark—if that even be his real name—who asked, "Why are they still making new WALKING DEAD shows? THE WALKING DEAD and FEAR could have had great legacies if they'd stopped when they should have." Answer man Matt Roush responded, saying that even though the fan base for the franchise remains strong, the shows were "once-upon-a-time riveting" and THE WALKING DEAD is "a classic example of a network milking a successful premise to death." While Roush expressed skepticism of the many spin-off series, he recalled fondly "how the episodes found different tones and approaches to spin stories within the zombie apocalypse, TWILIGHT ZONE-style." He especially recommends the TALES OF THE WALKING DEAD's episode "Amy/Dr. Everett."

The finale of THE WALKING DEAD also earned a cover line and half-page feature in the November 2022 issue of Channel Guide. The brief piece celebrates the show's 10 years and 177 episodes. That issue also

includes a feature story titled "Happy 50th, HBO," which lists 50 of the cable channel's most notable offerings. Genre options include FRAGGLE ROCK (No. 47, 1983-1987), TALES FROM THE CRYPT (No. 38, 1989-1996), ANGELS IN AMERICA (No. 32, 2003), WESTWORLD (No. 31, 2016-present), TRUE BLOOD (No. 22, 2008-2014), TRUE DETECTIVE (No. 16, 2014-present), THE LEFTOVERS (No. 13, 2014-2017), WATCHMEN (No. 11, 2019), and GAME OF THRONES (No. 3, 2011-2019).

Channel Guide's "The Top 15" for November includes MANIFEST on Netflix (Nov. 4), the forthcoming WEDNESDAY also on Netflix (Nov. 23), the animated KRAPOPOLIS on Fox (Nov. 27), and the forthcoming WILLOW on Disney+ (Nov. 30). The WILLOW series is set in the world of the 1988 movie, and Warwick Davis and Joanne Whalley will return to their roles as Willow Ulfgood and Sorsha.

There were a few noteworthy premieres, finales, and cancellations in recent weeks. GUILLERMO DEL TORO'S CABINET OF CURIOSITIES premiered on Netflix on Oct. 25. STAR WARS: TALES OF THE JEDI began on Disney+ on Oct. 26. STAR TREK: PRODIGY debuted on Paramount+ on Oct. 27. THE BASTARD SON & THE DEVIL HIMSELF launched on Netflix on Oct. 28. THE DEVIL'S HOUR premiered on Prime Video on Oct. 28. Meanwhile, STAR TREK: LOWER DECKS aired a finale on Paramount+ on Oct. 27. And VAMPIRE ACADEMY crawled into its coffin on Peacock on Oct. 27.

Netflix canceled its GRENDEL adaptation of the wonderful comic books by Matt Wagner, Showtime canceled THE MAN WHO FELL TO EARTH, and Prime Video canceled PAPER GIRLS. Similarly, Netflix canceled RESIDENT EVIL after its first season, and THE UMBRELLA ACADEMY will end after its upcoming fourth season.

Renewals include ANNE RICE'S INTERVIEW WITH A VAMPIRE, which has already secured an eight-episode second season on AMC. A second season of MOONHAVEN will air on AMC+. FOR ALL MAN-KIND will offer a fourth season on Apple TV+. HARLEY QUINN will also see Season 4 on HBO Max. And THE HANDMAID'S TALE's sixth and final season will air on Hulu.

In recent days, you might have missed some quality television. TV Weekly named the Oct. 24 episode of QUANTUM LEAP on NBC a Best Bet. GUILLERMO DEL TORO'S CABINET OF CURIOSITIES is a new anthology series streaming on Netflix since Oct. 25. Del Toro introduces each of the eight episodes, and two of them adapt H.P. Lovecraft stories: "Dreams in the Witch House" and "Pickman's Model." The program earned a half-page feature in the Oct. 23-29, 2022, issue of TV Weekly. Del Toro created and executive produced the anthology but didn't direct any of the episodes. THE WINCHESTERS' Oct. 25 episode earned a TV Weekly Best Bet recommendation. MANIFEST's fourth and final season has moved from NBC to stream on Netflix since Nov. 4. (The show earned a cover line for the November 2022 issue of Channel Guide.) Season 6 of the adult animation BIG MOUTH began on Netflix on Oct. 28. THE DEVIL'S HOUR began streaming on Prime Video on Oct. 28. A new animated series, ABOMINABLE AND THE INVISIBLE CITY, launched on Hulu recently. The animated STAR WARS: TALES OF THE JEDI has been available on Disney+ since Oct. 26.

The Travel Channel's Oct. 28 GHOSTS OF FLIGHT 401 paired an investigator with a medium to contact the spirits of passengers killed in a 1972 plane crash. Decades aired all 14 episodes of the 1974 TV series PLANET OF THE APES beginning Oct. 29. (Did any Neffers catch that marathon? I'd have gone ape!) The season finale of Epix's WAR OF THE WORLDS aired Oct. 30. On Halloween itself, Oct. 31, FETV aired six episodes of BEWITCHED, Decades offered a 1987 NEWHART episode featuring an alien invasion, and Rewind TV showcased six Halloween episodes from SABRINA, THE TEENAGE WITCH. Cozi TV featured three seasonal episodes of FRASIER, as well as two frightful ROSEANNE eps.

TV Weekly gave LA BREA's Nov. 1 episode on NBC a Best Bet recommendation. It did the same for DC'S STARGIRL's Nov. 2 outing on the CW. That program won one of the recent Saturn Awards as detailed above. Season 4 of TITANS started streaming on HBO Max on Nov. 3. And MANIFEST's Nov. 4 episode on Netflix earned a TV Weekly Best Bet.

Pencil these in your calendar, fen and fellow freaks: ZOOTOPIA+, six animated shorts based on the film Zootopia, will debut on Disney+ on Nov. 9. Hulu's finale of THE HANDMAID'S TALE will air Nov. 9. WARRIOR NUN will premiere on Netflix on Nov. 10. TV Guide highlighted the Nov. 10 episode of GHOSTS on CBS. The 10-episode animated series TRANSFORMERS: EARTHSPARK will become available on Paramount+ on Nov. 11. ANNE RICE'S INTERVIEW WITH THE VAMPIRE will air a finale on AMC on Nov. 13, earning a Channel Guide Best Bet notice. Nov. 14's AVENUE 5 episode on HBO earned a TV Guide mention. A second reboot of TELETUBBIES will premiere on Netflix on Nov. 14. (Personally, I think the original is outre enough!) AMERICAN HORROR STORY: NYC on FX will wrap up Nov. 16, earning a Channel Guide Best Bet. A new original Christmas-themed limited series starring Tim Allen, THE SANTA CLAUSES, will premiere on Disney+ on Nov. 16. Also on that day, the 10-episode series HAUNTED SCOTLAND will premiere on Discovery+.

The animated DRAGONS: THE NINE REALMS will return to Hulu and Peacock on Nov. 17. The creators of the absolutely fascinating DARK will offer a new program titled 1899 on Netflix beginning Nov. 17. AMC's THE WALKING DEAD will air a finale Nov. 20, earning a Channel Guide Best Bet. (But don't worry, because Pluto TV recently introduced a new channel dedicated to the series. There are, after all, almost 180 episodes.) WEDNESDAY will premiere on Netflix on Nov. 23. On Nov. 25, Nickelodeon will air SPONGEBOB SQUAREPANTS PRESENTS THE TIDAL ZONE, the first universe crossover involving SPONGEBOB SQUAREPANTS, THE PATRICK STAR SHOW, and KAMP KORAL: SPONGEBOB'S UNDER YEARS. There's also a sneak preview of KRAPOPOLIS on Fox on Nov. 27.

The November 2022 issue of Remind focuses on "Wild West Heroes," but there are still a few items of interest to frenetic TV fen. The piece on Yul Brynner addresses his turn as Gunslinger in the 1973 movie Westworld, precursor to the TV series. The article included a fun fact: "Gunslinger's thermal vision includes the first use of computer digitized images as part of a feature film. It took eight hours to produce every 10 seconds of footage from the Gunslinger's pixelated POV shots."

The Time Capsule "Back in 1964" includes ABC's BEWITCHED among the top TV shows of the year. The roundup also addresses notable premieres and finales that year. VOYAGE TO THE BOTTOM OF THE SEA (ABC, 1964-1968) premiered Sept. 14, 1964. BEWITCHED (ABC, 1964-1972) premiered Sept. 17. THE ADDAMS FAMILY (ABC, 1964-1966) premiered Sept. 18. THE MAN FROM U.N.C.L.E. (NBC, 1964-1968) premiered Sept. 22. THE MUNSTERS (CBS, 1964-1966) premiered Sept. 24. And UNDERDOG (NBC, 1964-1967) premiered Oct. 3. THE TWILIGHT ZONE, which premiered in 1959, aired its program finale June 19, 1964. In addition, popular books in 1964 included Lloyd Alexander's The Book of Three and Roald Dahl's Charlie and the Chocolate Factory.

From across the Big Pond, a few recent British magazines included articles of potential interest to Neffers. Infinity #54 features the second part of Mark Phillips's article about TIME TUNNEL. Brian J. Robb contributes a five-page feature on Gerry Anderson's FIREBALL XL5. Richard Molesworth's "Musings" column is a daft dismissal of Jodie Whittaker's stint as the 13th DOCTOR WHO.

"[T]here is not one thing I can point to, not one story that was worth telling, not one single aspect of the 13th Doctor's time on the Tardis that is worth applauding," he wrote. "I feel sorry for Jodie Whittaker. ... [S] he's been completely let down by the scripts, by the vision, and by the complete lack of any creative direction...." When Molesworth turned his attention to the show's "wokery," I rolled my eyes. Regardless, Molesworth places all blame at the feet of showrunner Chris Chibnall, suggesting that the entire 13th Doctor "should be wiped away." What think you, Neffers?

The issue also includes a Blu-ray and DVD review of the TALES OF UNEASE collection, OBI-WAN KE-NOBI on Disney+, and the THE WALKING DEAD: World Beyond—Final Season Blu-ray. Add to that a feature story on the almost forgotten program MEN INTO SPACE and the 1996 TV movie DOCTOR WHO:

THE MOVIE, and it's quite an excellent issue. If you don't regularly read Infinity, I strongly recommend the periodical.

The Dark Side #236 features an article titled "Simply Fantastic!" about the Festival of Fantastic Films. The piece mentions the Delta SF Group, an sf club in Manchester, England, that focused its activities on producing fan films and low-budget movies. Active between 1957-1970, members of the club went on to found the festival, which has been running since 1988.

The cover of the December 2022 edition of SFX (#359) features WILLOW, along with cover lines show-casing LET THE RIGHT ONE IN, THE PERIPHERAL, STAR TREK: PRODIGY, ANDOR, TITANS, WE ARE NOT ALONE, and WEDNESDAY. Inside, there are short pieces about LET THE RIGHT ONE IN, the animated STAR TREK: PRODIGY, and TRANSFORMERS: EARTHSPARK. There are also longer feature stories focusing on THE PERIPHERAL, which adapts the William Gibson novel; TITANS; the two-part WE ARE NOT ALONE; WEDNESDAY; and WILLOW.

Richard Edwards interviews ANDOR's Ben Bailey Smith, and reviews touch on THE BASTARD SON & THE DEVIL HIMSELF, Stephen King adaptation CHAPELWAITE, THE DEVIL'S HOUR, DOCTOR WHO: THE POWER OF THE DOCTOR, THE LORD OF THE RINGS: THE RINGS OF POWER, THE MIDNIGHT CLUB, THE SCHOOL FOR GOOD AND EVIL, SHE-HULK: ATTORNEY AT LAW, the DVD release of TALES OF UNEASE, WEREWOLF BY NIGHT, and WRECK. But the edition's highlight is the brief book review of Garth Marenghi's Terrortome, which collects three stories written by the fictional horror hack behind GARTH MARENGHI'S DARKPLACE. There's also a page-long interview with Marenghi. If you haven't watched DARKPLACE yet, put this clubzine down and get to the nearest computer or television. It is amazing.

And Total Film #330 (November 2022), while mostly movie related, also includes some genre TV tidbits. Shorter pieces in the front of the book concentrate on THE DEVIL'S HOUR and THE SCHOOL FOR GOOD AND EVIL. Jordan Farley's column in the back of the book asks "Is It Just Me, or Should Most Miniseries Be Movies?" It's a fair question. "[S]tudios don't think they can turn a profit at the cinema any more," he wrote. "[S]hows ... are financed by content-hungry streaming services instead, produced on a small-screen budget and timeframe with one expectation: keep as many people subscribed to their service for as long as possible."

Farley contended that OBI-WAN KENOBI, for example, could have been a two-hour movie instead of a six-hour miniseries. I've long thought that movies that go straight to streaming are the direct-to-video movies of our era. On the other hand, some streaming series (primarily translated imports) are truly premium TV, and some are over-long expansions of what could have been a very good movie. "[T]he stories that could restore a healthy, varied theatrical slate already exist, they're just being made for the wrong medium." He's not wrong.

SANTA CLAUS, one of the most enduring fantasy figures of all time makes his traditional appearance on December 24th every year.

To quote directly from his Wikipedea entry---[Santa Claus, also known as Father Christmas, Saint Nicholas, Saint Nick, Kris Kringle, or simply Santa, is a legendary character originating in Western Christian culture who is said to bring children gifts during the late evening and overnight hours on Christmas Eve of toys and candy or coal or nothing, depending on whether they are "naughty or nice".

He supposedly accomplishes this

with the aid of Christmas elves, who make the toys in his workshop, often said to be at the North Pole, and flying reindeer who pull his sleigh through the air.

The modern character of Santa is based on folklore traditions surrounding Saint Nicholas, the English figure of Father Christmas and the Dutch figure of Sinterklaas.

Santa is generally depicted as a portly, jolly, white-bearded man, often with spectacles, wearing a red coat with white fur collar and cuffs, white-fur-cuffed red trousers, red hat with white fur, and black leather belt and boots, carrying a bag full of gifts for children. He is commonly portrayed as laughing in a way that sounds like "ho ho ho". This image became popular in the United States and Canada in the 19th century due to the significant influence of the 1823 poem "A Visit from St. Nicholas". Caricaturist and political cartoonist Thomas Nast also played a role in the creation of Santa's image. This image has been maintained and reinforced through song, radio, television, children's books, family Christmas traditions, films, and advertising.]

So powerful is this image of holiday good will and gift giving to children that it has been adopted into other cultures that have no long standing Christian traditions to support it, including Japan and Korea, where it is seen as an opportunity to have a family holiday and give sweets and gifts to children.

In addition to the zillions of stories about him that have appeared in prose, verse, visual and audio media of all kinds, the character has been the subject of serious scientific studies including weighty examinations of the potential psychological effects Santa Claus can have on young children happily accepting everything they hear about him as factual.


Despite being relentlessly commercialized, the traditional image of Santa retains his appeal, easily overcoming critics, cynics, disbelievers, and would-be distracters. Grumps and Scrooges are no match for the venerable legend who embodies the very spirit of good will and happiness.


