Short Story Contest Results

Results of the 2022 National Fantasy Fan Federation Amateur Short Story Contest!

The First Prize goes to "From Invention Springs Necessity" by Sean Jones. This is a "Dungeons and Dragons" style crypt crawl, with a locked chamber and a truly frightening adversary. There seems to be no hope for our intrepid band of adventurers. The solution is inventive and unexpected!

The Second Prize goes to "After the Siege" by Clint Stevenson. This is a military fantasy, with a small army trapped in a fortress by a larger army. Surrender is out of the question...or is it? How do you win when winning is impossible?

The Third Prize goes to "Book of Memories" by A.C. Cargill. A haunting little fable of remembering...and forgetting. What really matters: truth or our emotional attachment to it? Is remembering the same as reliving...or relieving?

The Honorable Mention goes to "The Candlestick Maker" by Guy Lillian. Here we have a Frankensteinian fable...or fairy tale...wherein a brilliant scientist tries to create perfection. The result is, inescapably, a tragedy.

There were fifty-five entries this year, the most in decades! The entries came to us from Sweden, Britain, Pakistan, Canada, and dozens of U.S. states. About a third of the stories were classical fantasy; about a third were avante-garde fantasy, of the "magical realism" school; and the remaining third were classical science fiction.

Late in the year, one of the contestants wrote to ask that her stories be withdrawn from consideration for the contest. This, of course, was sad to hear...but the reason for it is delightful: the author had sold a number of stories professionally, and was no longer eligible for our "amateur" short story contest! I hope that many more of our contestants succeed and make a name for themselves, moving onward and upward in a challenging and competitive literary world!

The stories were all -- every single one! -- clever and inventive and imaginative. The art of creativity is strong in this collection, and the ideas are stunningly original and novel. The presentation is good throughout all the entries, with a lot of very polished prose and very fluent dialogue. The emotional tones ran the gamut from horror, tragedy, and sorrow to laughter, love, hope, and redemption. The stories are about fascinating protagonists in astonishing circumstances. The classical "Sense of Wonder" is rich in all of these stories, and it is reassuring for those of us who love to read that the future is assured a rich, vibrant, and energetic cadre of writers who will sit with us and tell us stories. It is an honor to select the winners of this contest, but for those who did not win a prize, take heart: your stories are beloved, and you are all triumphant in your creativity. ... Ray Nelson Remembrance

Jon D. Swartz, Ph.D., N3F Historian

Radell Faraday Nelson was born on October 3, 1931 in Schenectady, New York, the son of Walter Hughes Nelson and Marie Reed Nelson. He briefly attended The University of Chicago, studying theology, and then married Perdita Lilly, a fellow science fiction (SF) fan, and his second wife.

Ray was a SF fan as a teenager, living in Cadillac, Michigan, who published cartoons at an early age. He later became a professional author and wrote several books, including his first novel, The Ganymede Takeover in 1967 (coauthored with Philip K. Dick). Other Nelson SF novels were The Ecolog, Then Beggars Could Ride, and TimeQuest; he also wrote an historical mystery, Dog-Headed Death. He was presented a Philip K. Dick Award, Special Citation, in 1982, for his novel The Prometheus Man. In addition, he wrote four "sex" novels under a pseudonym.

He is known by many today for his 1963 short story "Eight O'Clock in the Morning," which was later used by John Carpenter as the basis for the 1988 movie They Live.

He married Kirsten Enge in 1957 in Paris, France -where their son, Walter Trygve Nelson, was born in 1958. While living in Paris he met many of the icons of The Beat Generation.

Ray belonged to several genre organizations, including the National Fantasy Fan Federation (N3F), the Golden Gate Futurians, the Detroit S-Fantasy League, SAPS, Little Men, ISSFS; and he believed he was the last surviving member of Claude Degler's famed Cosmic Circle. For years he was a member of the Carboniferous Amateur Press Alliance (CAPA), and spoke of the other members, including yours truly, as "his people." The titles he used for his CAPA contributions included "Beret," "Cafe Boheme," "L'il Poo," "Ray Nelson's Existential Eye," and "Raven," among others.

Ray published the fanzines Universe and Stupefying Stories (1950), and wrote and did cartoons for many other fanzines over the years.

He is credited in SF fandom with originating the beanie with a propeller on top as a fan symbol.

His son Walter, a professional web designer, created a website on the Internet that describes his father and his work. This site is still active.

Ray used several pseudonyms in his work, including R. Faraday Nelson, Ray Faraday Nelson, Frank Amitage, Jeffrey Lord, R. F. Nelson, California Ray, and the Old Beatnik.

When he died on November 29, 2022, he was living in El Cerrito, California with his fourth wife, Dr. Helene Knox, a Fulbright scholar and poet. During his later years, Ray also wrote a lot of poetry.

His last publications appeared in First Fandom's 2022 annual, First Fanthology.

Ray was a member of First Fandom, and was voted into the First Fandom Hall of Fame in 2019.

In 2006 he rejoined the N3F. He will be missed by all who knew him.

I'll inevitably have more to say about this in the February issue (#62) of This Here... I should also point out that the voting period does not end "soon" - ballots are accepted until March 10.

As is also the case, I feel bound to correct the statement that work, or individuals get "nominated". The FAAns are a free vote with the only stricture being that work should be first

published in the prior calendar year which, in the 'Special Publication' category, includes compilations of older material. The Incompleat Register is published as a voters' guide and not as a list of "eligible" work - a descriptor I do try to avoid, preferring "qualifying". I will, however, continue to thank faneds and organizations, including N3F, who help with awareness, as long as they get it right...

Hear! Hear! The N3F is what we make it, and it's good to see members engaged in fandom outside our halls and walls.

In the spirit of exploring more of what the N3F has to offer I entered the short story contest for the first time this year, after drawing on the support of the Writers Exchange Bureau. While I did not win—I'm sure I fell far short— Jefferson Swycaffer's feedback was helpful, as was the input of the Writers Exchange. I enjoyed the experience and will consider taking advantage of both as I continue to explore writing fiction. As in previous issues, the bureau's promptdriven writing exercise this month is intriguing, and I shall see what I can make of it.

Angela K. Scott's piece of art, "Sight of the Unicorn," was intriguing, especially because the unicorn wasn't the primary focus of the artwork—and that alluring redhead wasn't actually looking at the mythical beast! Regardless, it's a wonderful study in color, which reproduced relatively well for printing. Wait a minute... hold the phone! While the tear almost gets lost in the printed edition, the colors in the PDF—and the meaning of the piece—are much more clear. How delightful. The tear adds a layer of meaning I missed initially.

Personally, I think Judy Carroll's idea for the Netflix Streaming Round Robin is an excellent innovation. I've emailed her separately, and I'd like to raise my hand to watch Travelers. I've never seen the program before, but the description I read online sounds promising. Not only does the show focus on time travel, but it seems to build on some of the ideas explored in Quantum Leap. At least there's more people involved in the, well... travel. (On that note, I recently read Tim Powers' short story "Salvage and Demolition." Now there's a story about time travel!)

The Correspondence Bureau also seems to be promising, with a handful of participants now stepping up, including new members Steve Comfrey, whom I've also recently encountered through the Los Angeles Science Fantasy Society (Hi, Steve!), and Mick Taylor, whose name is familiar to me from the early- to mid-2010s—including the old Babylon 5 and time travel round robins! Good to see you're still kicking around, Mr. Taylor; perhaps I can interest you in the Travelers email round robin? Also, building on my remark about Powers above, I've sent you some commentary I published in a recent apazine via email.

Finally, Jon D. Swartz's "Science Fiction on Radio: Flash Gordon" showcased an old-time radio show that might also be worth exploring together. Are there any Neffers who'd be interested in an OTR email round robin in which we listen to the same OTR shows and share comments? There's a number of episodes we could choose from available for free online at https://tinyurl.com/Flash-OTR. The comic strip continues to this day, with Sundays by Jim Keefe available via Comics Kingdom at https://comicskingdom.com/flash-gordon.

And an idea for The Fan: While each issue offers a lot of opportunities for members to get involved, I'd welcome more examples of the resulting activity—similar to Carroll's publication of Neffers' writing in response to prompts. Given the increasing options for round robins, it might be fun and helpful to publish some of the resulting discussion in an edited form—to share that content with other members... and perhaps draw even more people into the conversation. I know that if an OTR round robin kicks off, I'd readily offer whatever I wrote for others.

Gosh, it's fun to be a fan. Putting it on a tight beam, Heath Row

Justin, We Hardly Knew You By John Hertz



Justin Edwin Anton Busch (1959-2022) left for After-Fandom in October 2022, on the first day of Corflu XXXIX (a fanziners' convention usually held in the Spring, most recently Oct. 21-23, 2022). He had been living in St. Paul, Minn., and was a member of Stipple-Apa. His own fanzines were Far Journeys and Dreams Renewed. Active in the National Fantasy Fan

Federation, Busch contributed a monthly fanzine review column titled "Fanfaronade" to FanActivity Gazette and edited Films Fantastic. The First Fandom organization had just given him a Merit Award, which it does not present often.

He had two books published by McFarland, The Utopian Vision of H.G. Wells (2009) and Self and Society in the Films of Robert Wise (2010). Wise directed The Day the Earth Stood Still (1951) and the first Star Trek movie (1979). The publisher and titles might suggest academia: A good inference; Busch had a Ph.D. in philosophy from Queen's University in Kingston, Ontario, Canada).

He was also a composer. A 2008 audio compact disc from TraumSpiel includes Busch's "Destiny and Desire," "Consent," "Meditations," and "Obsessions," as well as works by Anton Rubinstein (1829-1894). Its notes say that Busch's

compositions ... have been performed internationally ... a chamber opera, two sinfoniettas ... six string quartets ... works for choral ensembles, and dozens of songs and piano solos. Several dance and theatre groups have commissioned him to create new music for their productions. He is a past prizewinner of composition contests held by the Anchorage Flute Society and Zeitgeist, a St. Paul, Minnesota, new music ensemble... [Wine columns in two separate independent magazines ... writings on music, film, and philosophical topics [in] The Clarinet (U.S.), Wagner (U.K.), CineAction (Canada ["The Centre Cannot Hold: Betrayals in Alfred Hitchcock's Topaz", #66, 2005]), and Aspekt (Slovakia)... . [fiction in Hooligan Follies and Challenging Destiny ["In the Sight of Eternity", #12, April 2001].

About himself, Busch wrote (William Breiding's Portable Storage 5, pp. 6-7):

I've been fascinated by the fact of print for pretty nearly as long as I have memories.... [pleasure in the tactility of books.... Before I was ten I'd read The Rise and Fall of the Third Reich, Lord of the Rings, Catch-22, The Scarlet Letter, and War of the Worlds.... I read Sam Moskowitz's The Immortal Storm before 1974. I didn't know about Harry Warner's fan history books until years later. I attended Discon II [the 32nd World Science Fiction Convention].... Practically every SF book or story before Star Wars is obscure to modern fans. The idea of doing [Dreams Renewed] as miniature pamphlets was inspired by Jack Speer's fanzine A, although I needed a bit more space than [his] 1×1.5 inch size.

About his use of "Fanfaronade", he wrote in the November 2021 Fanactivity Gazette:

So far as I can ascertain, the first person to use the title was Jeff Wanshel ... three issues ... #1, dated 1960; #2, dated April 1961; #3, dated July 1961.... Terry Carr attached it to a single column, "Fanzine Fanfaronade," in the April 1964 issue of The Magazine of Fantasy and Science Fiction.... Carol Kennedy's column, "Fanfaronade" ... ran in Mnstf's clubzine Rune from issue 51 (1978) to issue 61 (1980).... In Rune 61 [she wrote,] "I prefer to live in a world in which people draw the lines they think are beautiful, rather than a world in which everyone draws the lines I think are beautiful." Further comment would be otiose. Here are some of his notes on fanzines:

Corflu = mimeograph correction fluid, once indispensable; First Fandom = those active at least as early as 1936, or maybe the first World Science Fiction Convention in 1939, also a club in their honor founded in 1953; fillos = fill-in illustrations (or other drawings); lettercol = letter column; Mnstf = The Minnesota Science Fiction Society; stf (pronounced "stef") from Hugo Gernsback's word "scientifiction"; SerCon = serious and constructive (sometimes a compliment); Stipple-Apa, an amateur press association based in Minneapolis and St. Paul; WAHF = we also heard from (correspondents whose letters weren't printed).

Science Fiction on Radio: Dimension X By Jon D. Swartz, Ph.D. N3F Historian

Dimension X is considered to be the first important adult science fiction (SF) program on national radio. Before Dimension X, only one other adult-oriented SF radio show had appeared, Two Thousand Plus (Mutual, 1950 – 1952). Dimension X had a decided advantage, however, as wellknown SF writers such as Ray Bradbury (10 programs) and Robert Heinlein (7 programs) were involved.

With these writers' famous stories featured, Dimension X had almost instant credibility with fans. Radio was an excellent medium for SF in the 1950s. It was easy to visit

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other planets or travel in a space ship in your imagination. It wasn't so easy to bring to life on TV in the 1950s.

The NBC program was sponsored for at least one season by Wheaties, but for the most part Dimension X was sustained.

Dimension X first aired on April 8,



1950, and completed its run on September 29, 1951 -- including a five-month hiatus in the middle. There were 50 episodes during the run of the program. Since some of the programs were re-broadcast during the run, however, there were really only 45 different stories broadcast.

Actors who worked regularly on the show included Joe De Santis, Wendell Holmes, Santos Ortega, Joseph Julian, Jan Miner, Roger De Koven, John Gibson, Ralph Bell, John Larkin, Les Damon, and Mason Adams. The program was usually directed by Fred Weihe or Edward King. The narrator was Norman Rose.

Ernest Kinoy and George Lefferts

NBC staff writers Kinoy and Lefferts were responsible for adapting most of the original Dimension X stories into radio scripts, and even provided some original scripts of their own.

Kinoy (1925 – 2014) was a writer, screenwriter, and playwright who won Emmy Awards for his work in television. Lefferts (born 1921) is a writer/producer/director whose productions have won six Emmy Awards and two Golden Globes.

First Program

The first program aired was a story by Graham Doar, a writer who wrote little SF, but whose story "The Outer Limit" was very popular, and was broadcast on other radio shows – and even a TV program!

The popularity of this story was thought by some to be because it had originally been published in The Saturday Evening Post, a prestigious "slick" magazine and not in one

of the "pulp" SF magazines. Also, the timeliness of the plot for a 1950 audience was emphasized.

Aired on April 8, 1950, the cast included Joseph Julian, Wendell Holmes, and Joe De Santis. The plot: An experimental rocket plane disappears for ten hours despite having only ten minutes of fuel left. The pilot tells a story of alien contact that warned him the earth would be destroyed if it goes ahead with experiments involving atomic weapons.

The pilot's superiors feel he is suffering from fatigue due to his experience, but he takes a space ship and holds it hostage unless all atomic tests are stopped. His superiors agree, but after the pilot is taken from the ship we learn that the tests are going ahead as planned.

Some Concluding Comments

Some of my best memories as a young SF fan were Dimension X broadcasts. My friend Charlie and I often listened together, and we didn't speak at all while the programs were on; we just listened intently.

2023 N3F Amateur Short Story Contest Story Contest Rules and Entry Blank

Now and then, it has been suggested to open the N3F Amateur Short Story Contest to professional writers, writers who have had one or two sales. I've never favored this. It is my opinion that we want new blood. We want to reward the new kids on the block. To be blunt, we want writing that is not that good. We want stories from people who don't know their object from their subject, who don't know where commas go, and who use apostrophes to denote plurals -- but who have a story to tell. I want stories from guys nobody's ever heard of...but in the years ahead, we will. Those who are already successful don't need the encouragement of our little contest. If they were to enter the contest, the danger is that they'd win, every time, and crowd out the promising newcomer.

1. This contest is open to all amateur writers in the field, regardless of whether they're members of the National Fantasy Fan Federation. For the purposes of this contest, we define an amateur as someone who has sold no more than two (2) stories to professional science fiction or fantasy publications.

2. Stories entered in the contest must be original, unpublished, not longer than 8,500 words in length—and must be related to the science fiction, fantasy, or similar genres in the opinion of the judge.

3. Email attachments of Word documents are acceptable for submission. Manuscripts on paper should be typed, single sided on 8 1/2"-by- 11" white paper, double spaced, with pages numbered. The name of the author should not appear anywhere on the manuscript to ensure impartial judging. Photocopies are acceptable, if they are of good quality. Computer printouts must be legible.

4. Contestants can enter up to three stories. Enclose a self-addressed, stamped envelope (SASE) if you would like your story returned at the end of the contest. Stories will not be returned without an SASE. Do not send your only copy in case of accidental loss. We are not responsible for lost manuscripts.

5. Email entries will be accepted. Send to Jefferson P. Swycaffer at abontides@gmail.com. No guarantee can be made of email receipt. Privacy and property rights will be absolutely respected. No one other than the Short Story Judge will ever see the submission.

6. There are no entry fees.

7. Cash prizes totaling \$100 will be awarded as follows: First prize is \$50, second \$30, and third \$20. Honorable mentions and semi-finalists will receive a certificate of award.

8. Send all manuscripts to the contest manager: Jefferson Swycaffer, P. O. Box 15373, San Diego, CA 92175-5373; abontides@ gmail.com. Emails with the story attached in word format are preferred. Paper manuscripts are acceptable. All entries must be received or postmarked no later than Dec. 31, 2023.

9. The Short Story Judge is a published science fiction professional, and also a loving fan of the sf and fantasy genres. All comments and critiques are solely the Short Story Judge's opinion, but he promises to be constructive and polite.

10. Stories will also be reviewed by the Editor of the N3F Fiction zine Eldritch Science; authors of suitable tales will be invited to submit their tales for publication in our zine. This review and invitation will only occur after contest winners have been announced, so it can have no effect on the contest outcome.

11. The NSF may want to publish an electronic book including top entries from one or more years of publication. You will not be contacted about this until after the contest is over and prizes have been awarded. If we want to publish your story, you will have to sign over to us first world serial rights. Your willingness to sign over rights cannot affect whether or not you win the contest. Winners will be notified as soon as the judging is completed. Announcements and notifications of winning entries will be made by March 2024. Please take your time and submit your best work. You can resubmit stories previously entered if they did not win previously. All entries will be kept confidential and will be judged fairly and anonymously. The deadline for all entries is Dec. 31, 2023. Good luck!
