Kaymar Awards

The 2023 Kaymar Awards for 2023 have been given to Will Mayo and Justin E. A. Busch. This year's awards are unique twice. First, both of the Award winners passed away in 2022, so the awards are being given posthumously, which has never before been done. Second, in the two-way contest to choose an award winner, there was an exact tie, each man receiving precisely the same number of votes.

The Kaymar Award is given in April (or close) every year, supposedly because the N3F was organized in the month of April. The selection is made by a committee consisting of previous winners who are still in the club, from nominations submitted by members.

The award, unlike many other awards in fandom, can be awarded only once. It is not given for talent or for popularity, but for work — work for the benefit of the club and its members. The award is a memorial to K. Martin Carlson [1904-1986], who originated, maintained, and financed it for 25 years. Carlson was a long-time N3F member who held many positions in the club, including club Historian. He went by the fan name of Kaymar.


Director's View ...Kevin Trainor

Radio Science Fiction: X Minus One by Jon D. Swartz, Ph.D. N3F Historian

X Minus One was broadcast on NBC from April 24, 1955, until January 9, 1958, for a total of 125 programs. Dimension X (DX) had been off the air since 1951, and television was replacing radio in many homes – so X Minus One came as a happy surprise to many listeners, especially those who were science fiction (SF) fans and had listened to DX.

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TNFF

The first several episodes of X Minus One were new versions of DX episodes; but the remainder were adaptations by NBC staff writers who had also adapted many of the programs on Dimension X (DX).

The new programs broadcast were SF stories by leading writers in the field in the 1950s, with some original scripts by Ernest Kinoy and George Lefferts, who had also provided stories for DX. Prominent SF writers such as Ray Bradbury and Robert Heinlein, whose work had been featured on Dimension X, also had their stories aired on X Minus One (X).

Episodes

The first story broadcast was "No Contact" by George Lefferts & Ernest Kinoy (a remake of a story broadcast twice on DX). The stories broadcast on X were as follows:

Some Concluding Comments

X Minus One was more popular than its predecessor, Dimension X, even though it had a smaller budget, perhaps because SF was more popular in the mid- to - late 1950s than it had been earlier. In addition, more of the stories broadcast had originally been published in Galaxy Science Fiction – which had taken over as the nation's most popular SF magazine.



This deserves much wider recognition, and an award or two on its own.
