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Science Fiction & Fantasy. I even sent Bjo Trimble a birthday card and letter to help celebrate her 90th birthday this month.

This is a change for me—fanac with other fen, not just by myself through the written word. There's still plenty of writing and pubbing my ish, however. I recently bundled all of my apazines into a new monthly periodical, The Stf Amateur, which is available via eFanzines online, or from yours truly. Just let me know if you'd like to be on the distribution list. (Fanzines lead to fanzine fan friends, which are fine friends indeed.)

I forget who said it, but I occasionally encounter a quotation along the lines that fanzines are what we publish when we can't be fen together. I think that's true, and if there's a way for me to help bring people together, to encourage new friendships, and to help make something happen, it's of interest to me. Fanzines are not enough, though they're fun punctuation between in-person or online activities, shared experiences, and hanging out.

Members of the N3F have the opportunity to be active fen (an actifan), not just passive fen (a passifan). There's a reason why con participants are considered members rather than attendees. (And cons aren't the only way to express your fandom.) Fandom in all its forms is what we make it, and the most rewarding approach is to put something into it—to interact with other fen—not to approach it as a consumer, expecting for someone else to do something for you, or waiting for something to happen. Frankly, that's boring.

In last month's "The Directors' View," Judy Carroll offered a handy map of Littleton to Neffers. You might have also seen my Bingo-like game Neffo. Both can be useful tools to explore the fandom in which we find ourselves—and to identify what form of activity best suits you. Activity becomes easier—second nature, even—if you find friends to hang out with.

Will you go to Artists Keep? Will you take a hike through N'APA Woods? Will you take a stroll down Writers Way? Regardless of where you choose to go, look around to see who else is also

there. Introduce yourself. Ask them a question about where you are and what you're doing. Find out what they're interested in, what they like—who they are. That way, you'll look forward to seeing them the next time you visit Littleton. You'll find a friend with whom to engage in activities. And you'll meet a fellow fan with whom you can share interests and experiences.

While volunteering for Loscon, I spent quite a bit of time with John Hertz and Eylat Poliner. I now count them among my friends, and my LASFS activity is all the richer for it. While organizing Marty Cantor's fanzine collection for donation to Eaton, I've been able to actively remember and learn more about my much-missed friend Marty and get to know fellow LASFS member Nick Smith better. Hosting the Audio and Tape Bureau events helped me meet Janine Follett, who's often the only other participant for the film and video screenings, and OTR shows. I look forward to seeing her every single time. And participating in the Travelers round robin, I've enjoyed the weekly company and conversation of Judy Carroll and Mike McLain—neither of whom I'd know so well had I not participated. I look forward to our next TV show! (In fact, I miss you already.)

Not only do I know my way around Littleton better, I've made some good friends—and learned more about fandom as a whole. That will lead to new maps, new experiences, and even more new friends.

So if someone hosts a party—asking for letters of comment, organizing a relaxacon, or proposing a book discussion group—accept the invitation. No matter what it is, even if it's not entirely up your alley. Do something, even just to respect the invitation and be invited next time. Similarly, if someone mentions a book, story, movie, or TV show that interests you, check it out. See if you like it. Tell a friend—online or offline. Step up and show up. Who knows who else will be there, or what fun you'll have?

I and the other directors will see you on the streets of Littleton. We might even ask you for directions.

Women Genre Writers: Kit Reed by Jon D. Swartz, Ph.D. N3F Historian

Lillian Hyde Craig Reed (June 7, 1932 – September 24, 2017), was an author of science fiction (SF), mainstream fiction, and psychological thrillers, usually under the name of Kit Reed.

Personal Life

Reed was born Lillian Hyde Craig in San Diego, California. She was the daughter of schoolteacher Lillian Hyde and U. S. Naval Officer John R. Craig (who was later lost at sea). She was nicknamed "Kitten" at an early age and later legally changed her name to Kit Reed. She grew up on and around military bases in Connecticut, Florida, Hawaii, and elsewhere.


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By age 12, she had written a series of books about a stand-up bunny rabbit. At the College of Notre Dame of Maryland, nuns let her write short stories instead of a research paper for her senior thesis, thus allowing her "to avoid the research she hated."

She served as a professor and resident writer at Wesleyan University for decades. She met her husband, film professor and artist Joseph Reed, on a blind date in St. Petersburg. She and Reed had three children together including Kate Maruyama, who later also became a genre author. Reed died at age 85, after being diagnosed with an inoperable brain tumor.

Reed's first short story, "The Wait" (1958), was published by editor Anthony Boucher in The Magazine of Fantasy & Science Fiction (F&SF).

Her stories appeared in venues ranging from F&SF to The Yale Review and The Kenyon Review, and were widely anthologized. Many of her stories were published as feminist SF.

Reed was nominated for the James Tiptree Jr. Award three times. In 2005 her novel, Thinner Than Thou, was given the Alex Award by the Young Adult Library Services Association, a division of the American Library Association.


She was a Guggenheim Fellow (1964) and recipient of a five-year grant from the Abraham

Woursell Foundation (1965). In 1976, she was awarded an Aspen Institute Rockefeller Fellowship.

She worked as a journalist for a number of years, including stints at The St. Petersburg Times and The New Haven Register. She won awards for a series of articles about juvenile courts in Connecticut, and

twice was named the New England Newspaperwoman of the Year.

Pseudonyms



In addition to Kit Reed, she published under the names Kit Craig and Shelly Hyde.

The New York Times Book Review had the following to say about her short fiction in 2006: "Reed has a prose style that's pure dry ice, displayed in dystopian stories that specialize in bitterness and dislocation."

The Wall Street Journal reported: "The title of Kit Reed's [2013] selection of her own short stories, The Story Until Now (Wesleyan), reminds us that although she has been writing award-winning fiction for some 50 years, she's still accelerating. The scope of these 35 stories is immense, their variety unmatched."

Concluding Comments

During her career she published over thirty books and more than a hundred short stories.

Both The Story Until Now (2013) and her 2011 collection What Wolves Know were Shirley Jackson Award nominees in 2011 and 2013, respectively.

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

I enjoyed the Travelers Round Robin. I had not heard of Travelers before this, and thought it was a fun show. It was complex enough to be involving, and imaginative enough to be fun. I would likely not have found it without the RR. The advantage of watching this show as part of the RR is that I watched it much more closely than I might have otherwise. Plot points were often advanced through a seemingly random remark, or a camera shot that only lasted a couple of seconds. Because I was writing my responses to the show as part of the RR, I watched it much more closely, including turning on subtitles, which often helped clear up who was speaking or what was happening in the background. The weekly emails with my fellow RR members were always fun, as the other members often noticed things I did not, and would interpret some things differently than I had, opening up new possibilities in the show. All in all, it was a lot of fun, and I look forward to the next one.

Regardless, this episode was not a rush job by the cast and crew aware of a cancellation. It did not leave viewers hanging midseason without resolution, no future episodes or seasons to air. It was a studied, intended conclusion for the program.

The Netflix Streaming Round Robins work like this:

- 1 A member chooses the series he/she wishes to watch.
- 2 When they have decided which series they wish to watch they contact me and I will tell them whether there are enough members to begin the RR
- 3- When there are 2 members, and the Robin Master, the RR will begin.
- 4 The Robin Master (RM) emails the Netflix Streaming Round Robin (NSRR) members with a schedule. Two episodes a week are recommended when starting the RR. However, more episodes a week can be considered if the members choose to do so. ALL members must agree to the number of episodes watched in a week. We want this to be a fun adventure. Not a cumbersome one.
- 5 Once the required episodes for that week have been viewed, that member will email each member in a joint email with their comments. At the top of the email the episodes viewed should be listed.
 6 Repeat steps 4 & 5 each week until the series
- 6 Repeat steps 4 & 5 each week until the series ends.

Postal Mail

Postal Mail is the traditional Round Robin (RR). Members who have chosen the same topic discuss their likes and dislikes. Each RR needs at least three

2023 N3F Amateur Short Story Contest Story Contest Rules and Entry Blank

Now and then, it has been suggested to open the N3F Amateur Short Story Contest to professional writers, writers who have had one or two sales. I've never favored this. It is my opinion that we want new blood. We want to reward the new kids on the block. To be blunt, we want writing that is not that good. We want stories from people who don't know their object from their subject, who don't know where commas go, and who use apostrophes to denote plurals -- but who have a story to tell. I want stories from guys nobody's ever heard of...but in the years ahead, we will. Those who are already successful don't need the encouragement of our little contest. If they were to enter the contest, the danger is that they'd win, every time, and crowd out the promising newcomer.

- 1. This contest is open to all amateur writers in the field, regardless of whether they're members of the National Fantasy Fan Federation. For the purposes of this contest, we define an amateur as someone who has sold no more than two (2) stories to professional science fiction or fantasy publications.
- 2. Stories entered in the contest must be original, unpublished, not longer than 8,500 words in length—and must be related to the science fiction, fantasy, or similar genres in the opinion of the judge.
- 3. Email attachments of Word documents are acceptable for submission. Manuscripts on paper should be typed, single sided on 8 1/2"-by- 11" white paper, double spaced, with pages numbered. The name of the author should not appear anywhere on the manuscript to ensure impartial judging. Photocopies are acceptable, if they are of good quality. Computer printouts must be legible.
- 4. Contestants can enter up to three stories. Enclose a self-addressed, stamped envelope (SASE) if you would like your story returned at the end of the contest. Stories will not be returned without an SASE. Do not send your only copy in case of accidental loss. We are not responsible for lost manuscripts.
- 5. Email entries will be accepted. Send to Jefferson P. Swycaffer at abontides@gmail.com. No guarantee can be made of email receipt. Privacy and property rights will be absolutely respected. No one other than the Short Story Judge will ever see the submission.

6. There are no entry fees.

- 7. Cash prizes totaling \$100 will be awarded as follows: First prize is \$50, second \$30, and third \$20. Honorable mentions and semi-finalists will receive a certificate of award.
- 8. Send all manuscripts to the contest manager: Jefferson Swycaffer, P. O. Box 15373, San Diego, CA 92175-5373; abontides@ gmail.com. Emails with the story attached in word format are preferred. Paper manuscripts are acceptable. All entries must be received or postmarked no later than Dec. 31, 2023.
- 9. The Short Story Judge is a published science fiction professional, and also a loving fan of the sf and fantasy genres. All comments and critiques are solely the Short Story Judge's opinion, but he promises to be constructive and polite
- 10. Stories will also be reviewed by the Editor of the N3F Fiction zine Eldritch Science; authors of suitable tales will be invited to submit their tales for publication in our zine. This review and invitation will only occur after contest winners have been announced, so it can have no effect on the contest outcome.
- 11. The NSF may want to publish an electronic book including top entries from one or more years of publication. You will not be contacted about this until after the contest is over and prizes have been awarded. If we want to publish your story, you will have to sign over to us first world serial rights. Your willingness to sign over rights cannot affect whether or not you win the contest. Winners will be notified as soon as the judging is completed. Announcements and notifications of winning entries will be made by March 2024. Please take your time and submit your best work. You can resubmit stories previously entered if they did not win previously. All entries will be kept confidential and will be judged fairly and anonymously. The deadline for all entries is Dec. 31, 2023. Good luck!
