Report on TusCon 50 Mike McLain

TusCon 50 was held the weekend of 10-12 November 2023 at the Wyndham Viscount Suites Tucson East in Tucson, AZ. This was the first SF convention that my wife, Carolyn, and I had ever attended, so we weren't exactly sure what we were getting ourselves into. We didn't need to worry. TusCon focuses on the written word and artwork for the most part, although there was a bit of cosplay here and there), and is proudly known as "The Best Little Sci-Fi, Fantasy & Horror Convention in Arizona." And for good reason. Attendance is generally between 300-500, the guest list is fantastic, and the three day event had, by my count, 68 panels and events, not including ongoing things like the ConSuite and guest autograph opportunities. The special guests included:

Author Guest of Honor David Brin. David is the author of the Uplift Saga, *The Postman*, *Earth*, and many others, including the Hugo and Nebula award winner *Startide Rising*.

Artist Guest of Honor Chaz Kemp. Chaz is a Bram Stoker award finalist specializing in SteamPunk, CyberPunk, and Fantasy. His watercolor works portray a wide selection of culturally diverse characters.

Science Guest of Honor Geoff Notkin. Geoff is the Emmy award winning producer and host of three seasons of the Science Channel series *Meteorite Men*, as well as the educational series *STEM Journals* for Cox Media.

Special Media Guest Robert Kurtzman. Robert is an artist and special effects creator whose work can be seen in an insane number of movies and television programs, including *Dances with Wolves*, *From Dusk Till Dawn*, *Nightmare on Elm Street 5*, and on and on.

Toastmaster Eric Schumacher. Eric is an award-winning actor, multimedia producer, and director. He portrayed Wyatt Earp in Fox TV's *Legends and Lies*, and Doc Holliday in director Alex Cox's mocumentary film *Tombstone Rashomon*.

You'd Better Watch Out... Bob Jennings



SANTA CLAUS, one of the most enduring fantasy figures of all time makes his traditional appearance on December 24th every year. To quote directly from his Wikipediae entry:

Santa Claus, also known as Father Christmas, Saint Nicholas, Saint Nick, Kris Kringle, or simply Santa, is a legendary character originating in Western Christian culture, who is said to bring children gifts during the late evening and overnight hours on Christmas Eve of toys and candy or coal or nothing, depending on whether they are "naughty of nice". He supposedly accomplishes this with the aid of Christmas elves, who make the toys in his workshop, often said to be at the North Pole, and flying reindeer who pull his sleigh through the air. The modern character of Santa is based on folklore traditions surrounding Saint Nicholas, the English figure of Father Christmas and the Dutch figure of Sinterklass.

Santa is generally depicted as a portly, jolly, white-bearded man, often with spectacle, wearing a red coat with white fur collar and cuffs, white-fur-cuffed red trousers, red hat with white fur, and black leather belt and boots, carrying a bag full of gifts for children. He is commonly portrayed as laughing in a way that sounds like "ho ho ho". This image became popular in the United States and Canada in the 19th century due to the significant influence of the 1823 poem "A Visit From St. Nicholas". Caricaturist and political cartoonist Thomas Nast also played a role in the creation of Santa's image. This image has been maintained and reinforced through song, radio, television, children's books, family Christmas traditions, films, and advertising.

So powerful is this image of holiday good will and gift giving to children that it has been adopted into other cultures that have no long-standing Christian traditions to support it, including Japan and Korea, where it is seen as an opportunity to have a family holiday and give sweets and gifts to children.

In addition to the zillions of stories about him that have appeared in prose, verse, visual and audio media of all kinds, the character has been the subject of serious scientific studies including weighty examinations of the potential psychological effects Santa Claus can have on young children happily accepting everything they hear about him as factual.

Despite being relentlessly commercialized, the traditional image of Santa retains his appeal, easily overcoming critics, cynics, disbelievers, and would-be distracters. Grumps and Scrooges are no match for the venerable legend who embodies the very spirit of good will and happiness.

Santa Claus has been an icon of western civilization for centuries, but it is also clear that the need for a holiday of thanksgiving and gift giving in the midst of winter, a holiday positioned at or just after the Winter Solstice, is a long-standing tradition in most human cultures. The worst of winter might be still ahead, but the sun is returning and we, our families, our friends, and our neighbors will manage to survive. And Santa Claus is just the latest incarnation of this universal spirit of hope and thanksgiving.

Confronting Fear, not Fearlessness, is Part of the Hero's Journey Janelle Waz

There's been a lot of talk about what makes a good hero, and one of the things I keep hearing about (especially for recent heroes) is that a hero needs to be fearless... and that rubs me the wrong way. When I look at a lot of the heroes that populate our culture, they do indeed have fears and their journey is overcoming those fears to do the right thing. In fact, I would go as far as to say that fearlessness is actually detrimental, a tragic flaw. So today, I'm going to wax on about the hero's journey, that it's not being fearless, but doing the right thing despite internal fears, that makes a hero... a hero.

What Is Fear?

Let's talk about what fear is. Now, at the risk of being cliqued in these kinds of videos, let's look at a definition so we all know what we're talking about. Now, a quick Google search reveals that Fear as a noun is "an unpleasant emotion caused by the belief that someone or something is dangerous, likely to cause pain, or a threat"; as a verb, it's to "be afraid of (someone or something) as likely to be dangerous, painful, or threatening". And, while we're at it, Fearlessness is simply "lack of fear". Okay, those are some reasonable definitions to work with.

What I gather from these definitions is that fear (and I mean healthy fear, of course) is instinctual. It's meant to be there. It keeps us safe or at the very least take precaution against things that could otherwise kill us. We'll always have fears because they're naturally part of us: they're ingrained into our very being. If someone is truly fearless, lacking a certain respect for things that could very well kill them, let's be real: they won't have a very long lifespan. Because of that, I would argue that fearlessness is akin to arrogance or recklessness, traits that are typically viewed as tragic flaws.

Let's look at the character of Apollo Creed from the *Rocky* franchise, a character I would describe as fearless. I like Apollo. I like how he went from being Rocky's rival to his friend and trainer. Though I argue that Apollo's death in *Rocky IV* backed future stories into a corner, it does exhibit Apollo's fatal flaw: his tendency to vastly underestimate his opponent. The guy underestimated Rocky... TWICE. So, when Drago comes around in *Rocky IV*, Apollo challenges him to a match, and he doesn't have a fear for a guy that pretty obviously has been 'roided up. Heck, even from the start, Apollo's entrance proves he's not taking it seriously, putting on a full-blown music video complete with James Brown! Still, it was one hell of a show. But Apollo wasn't afraid of Drago, and he damn well should have been! And he ultimately pays the price, dying during the fight. It was his arrogance, his ignoring Rocky's warnings about Drago, his fearlessness, that lead to his death.

Golden Mean

"Virtue is the golden mean between two vices, the one of excess and the other of deficiency." - Aristotle

Now I want to talk about something called the Golden Mean, which is an idea in Greek Philosophy about avoiding the extremes: excess is bad, deficiency is bad, the middle - golden. Let's do like Aristotle and look at something like courage: taken to one extreme, to an excess, courage can be recklessness, foolhardy, and on the other extreme, a lack of courage is cowardice. The right amount of courage, though, is virtuous.

The point I'm trying to make is that when developing heroes in stories, the Golden Mean applies. Heroes shouldn't be fearless (or, at least if they are, it's a flaw that they need to overcome), but they also shouldn't be cowering in a corner. The hero has justifiable fears but saddles up anyway because it's the right thing to do or they need to accomplish something.

Examples of Heroes Confronting Their Fear

Let me go back to *Rocky* for a moment because I was thinking of a scene between Rocky and his wife Adrian in Rocky III. The beautiful thing about their relationship is that Adrian looks out for Rocky and she's the one that keeps him grounded. In *Rocky III*, Rocky is training to fight Clubber Lang (who I still argue killed Mickey, but that's beside the

point), and Rocky's heart clearly isn't in the training since Mickey's death. Apollo, now his trainer, begins to lose faith in him, so Adrian confronts Rocky about what's bothering him and Rocky reveals something.

Rocky: I'm afraid. For the first time in my life, I'm afraid.

Adrian: I'm afraid too. There's nothing wrong with being afraid.

That's right: Rocky Balboa, one of the prime examples of masculinity in American pop culture, is afraid. He explains that before (ie: in the first movie), if he lost, he was the only one that suffered. But now, he's got a wife and a kid. He's got a nice house and a nice pile of cash. There are people depending on him, and he doesn't want to lose everything and let everyone down. He's afraid that, because Mickey selected his opponents after he became heavyweight champion, all the fights he fought since then were just set-ups, that he's not really the fighter or the man he thinks he is. Rocky Balboa is human! It's Adrian who reminds him that there's nothing wrong with being afraid, that anything he loses can be replaced... AND DON'T YOU DARE BRING UP *ROCKY V...* She grounds him in this scene, telling him that he's the one that has to confront his fears and guilt that he's carrying to fight Clubber or it'll bother him the rest of his life. She even says that even if he loses, he loses with no excuses or fear. And Rocky does overcome this: he fights Clubber, and he triumphs in the end in what is arguably the best *Rocky* sequel.

But enough about Rocky: let's head off into the Sci-fi realm. Luke Skywalker! The quintessential hero's journey! And, of course, I'm talking about his arc in the original trilogy because I'm not a fan of what they did with him in the sequel trilogy. But if you recall *The Empire Strikes Back*, Luke seeks out Yoda to train him as a Jedi, but Yoda is a tad resistant to the idea, even getting into a ghost argument with Ben! I swear, Yoda's pulling out all the stops, even going as far to say Luke's too old! Why don't say you won't train him because you don't like his haircut while you're at it! Yoda warns Luke about the commitment he's about to make and the chance of failure, but in for a credit, in for a... whatever the *Star Wars* equivalent of a pound is, Luke commits to training, saying he's not afraid, to which Yoda eerily responds, "You will be... YOU WILL BE." And you know what? Yoda was right. Luke isn't fearless and does indeed develop fears from this point on. The fear of confronting his own father. The fear of falling to the Dark Side. The fear of what he might become. It's those fears that he has to confront in order to defeat the Emperor, to restore the Jedi Order, to bring peace to the galaxy, even to save his own father. Did having those fears make Luke any less of a hero? Of course not! It makes him human and relatable! But it was facing his fears and staying on the Light Side even though he could die, that makes him a hero.

Heck, there are countless examples of the hero overcoming fears to do what is right. Adrian Monk overcomes his multitude of fears to solve crimes on *Monk*. Dorothy in *The Wizard of Oz* embarks on a scary journey to get the Wicked Witch's shoes so she could return home. Heck, even Spongebob Squarepants got over his fear of going outside to save Sandy and Patrick from a Gorilla! EVEN SPONGEBOB HAS A HERO'S ARC!

Conclusion

But all of this is to say that heroes should have fears: it's a part of human nature and makes them relatable. But it's not the absence of fear that makes a hero, but rather the struggle to overcome them to do what needs to be done. And I think this line from *The Princess Diaries* really captures this idea.

"Courage is not the absence of fear, but rather the judgment that something else is more important that fear."

Silvercon Lives Again! (Sort of..) Mindy Hunt

Convention experiences are different for everyone. Some look forward to the big name guests while others are out to support a local with a booth in artist's alley. Or maybe you're hoping to find that Funko Pop that will complete the collection. One thing for sure is that the guests enjoy being surrounded by others who enjoy some sort of fandom as much as they do. One thing that they don't focus on is all the effort that's put in to create these events. If they're curious enough, usually on the convention's website there's a story on how the event came to be.

This past October a new convention had its debut in Las Vegas: Son of Silvercon. Sound familiar? It is the brainchild of Kevin Trainor, also known as Chief Wombat for Friends of Fission-chan. They're an organization devoted to promoting nuclear power and the ongoing clean efforts in Nevada at the Nevada National Security Site (formerly the Nevada Test Site). Plus, they love science fiction.

When Chief Wombat moved to the Las Vegas are, he found several fandom groups and the occasional large convention but nothing focused on science fiction along the lines of Liberty Con. There was Silvercon back in the early 90's but they were no longer around. So he and the group decided to put together Son of Silvercon, which they described as "Like Liberty Con, but it is not Liberty Con."

As I was adding Son of Silvercon to our grandmaster convention list over on SciFi4Me.com, I read through the Friends of Fission-chan's website and got some good chuckles from the blog. This is not Kevin's first con-deo (can I make that a word?). He was part of starting up Anime Detour in Minneapolis in 2003 – but with more help. The blog details serious issues that come with starting a convention (money, guests, money, location, money, bad info on flyers, and, of course, money). However, the attitude is, "I'm putting together this convention. It's not an easy thing, I've got a sense of humor about it – roll with the punches and bring on more."

And Friends of Fission-chan pulled it off.

The planning started in March 2023, and Son of Silvercon debuted October 13 through the 15th 2023. They state that it's for "you, Me, Hoyt's Huns, Monster Hunter Nation, libertarians, conservatives, and other malcontents & wrong thinkers." Their guests included artist, author, cartoonist and all-around nice lady M.C.A. Hogarth. They had Sarah Hoyt and Daniel Hoyt. She blogs and writes science-fiction, and he's the author of *9th Euclid's Prince*. They also had author, cartoonist, and YouTube dude, Jon Del Arroz.

They had 25 attend with 4 supporting paid members. Programming was a guideline, or as stated in the blog "Much like the cake, the programming schedule is a lie." Guests supported the consuite with the InterMountain Cookie Conspiracy ("borrowed" from Disclave where people donated baked goods and other tasty concoctions. So, Son of Silvercon upped the ante: \$5 worth of congoer's recharging goods and you receive credit for next year's membership AND a snazzy button...or something). Small issue with the Dealers' Bedroom (don't worry, logistics not sticky fingers).

But their main goal was a success.

"Everybody seems happy with the way the convention went and wants to come back next year. All we need to do now is convince everyone to bring half a dozen of their close personal friends to the con..."


And as guest D.J. Butler pointed out to Kevin, they made it happen and that was the important thing. That is truth.

Plus, with a smaller size, it's more intimate and can be more tailored. Plus it gives everyone a chance to really connect with other fans and maybe find a new fandom to dive into.

Over the last weekend of October, Kansas City hosted the 48th Annual World Fantasy Convention, where the 2023 World Fantasy Award winners were announced to recognize works published in 2022. In addition, the convention presented two Life Achievement Awards for outstanding service to the fantasy field. Winners are marked in red.

Lifetime Achievement

- John R. Douglas

Crowther is the co-founder of PS Publishing and a British journalist, novelist, editor, short story writer, and anthologist. Among his many accolades are a Best Anthology nomination in

the 1993 World Fantasy Award for *Narrow Houses*, a 2000 British Fantasy Award in the Best Collection category for *Lonesome Roads*, a 2009 BFA in the Best Magazine/Periodical category for *Postscripts*, along with several additional nominations in several categories for both World Fantasy Awards and BFA's.

Douglas, who passed away August 3, was an influential editor for several decades, working at Berkley as well as Avon Books, Pocket Books/Simon & Schuster, and HarperCollins. Over those years he was responsible for acquiring and editing hundreds of genre titles. Douglas was also a journalist and editor of *Science Fiction Chronicle* from 2002 to 2005, and he was among the fans who founded the Ontario Science Fiction Club in 1966. He's survived by his wife of 48 years, Ginjer Buchanan.

Rollin' With Some Punchy Cosplay Mindy Hunt

This past October, Jason and I had a chance to work with Walkin' & Rollin' Costumes again, producing a livestream for a recent multi-reveal event. We've filmed a couple of events for them and helped them live stream in the past, and it's a joy to do because everyone who involved has the biggest grin on their faces: the participants and the people who work behind-the-scenes, regardless of their stress level.



What is Walkin' & Rollin' Costumes, you ask? They are a nonprofit organization that creates costume for kids in walkers and wheelchairs with the help of volunteers and donations from the public.

In 2005, Lon Davis' son Reese was born with cancer. A tumor crushed his spinal cord leaving him with limited mobility in his legs. He got his first wheelchair three years later. For Halloween, Lon made Reese a Wall-E costume that would fit around his wheelchair. It was an instant hit.

After that Reese would challenge Lon each year with a different costume idea, becoming larger and more elaborate. They drew the attention of the media and started receiving requests for other kids to enjoy their creations. With the help of volunteers, they work with different teams from all over the United States

to build and then present to the kids their requested costume. The volunteer teams range from high school to community members to corporate build teams. Lon and Reese have traveled to several conventions to do their reveals.





Through their hard work and effort, they've shown that a walker or a wheelchair does not limit a child from becoming the superhero or character they want to be for Halloween. Really when you look at it, it's an extra accessory to enhance their love for whichever fandom they into at moment. (We know how this can constantly change for kids.) What is Cinderella without her pumpkin carriage? Pilots need their airplanes and conductors need their train engine. And Disneyland's Splash Mountain needs riders on the ride – this is probably my favorite.

When they are up on stage presenting the costumes to the kids and their families, it's hard to not have the biggest grin on your face because of the excitement and love you see in the kids and their parents and siblings watching their children glow. The pride that is on the faces of the teams that have built them and the excitement in their voices as they explain some of the details that they have done to these costumes to make them better than what the kids and parents had hoped for.



Of this batch of costumes revealed during the livestream, my personal favorite is the Winnebago from *Spaceballs*. But even though I had my favorite, everybody is a winner and they all looked fabulous.
