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Dracula: In Living Black & White Bob Jennings



In February 1931 Universal Pictures released *Dracula*, a sound film based on the classic vampire novel written by Bram Stoker in 1897. This picture, the first American sound version based on the novel, was a monster hit with theater audiences when it was originally released, and has gone on to become a cornerstone in the annals of modern horror movie making.

There is a wealth of background information known about this film because it was such a pivotal part of cinematic history. The first major motion picture treatment of the Dracula novel had been an unauthorized adaptation in 1922, the experimental German silent film *Nosferatu* made by Prana Films.

That silent movie changed and added additional parts to the story in order to disguise the fact that the film had swiped the material from Bram Stoker's novel. This did not fool anybody, especially Stoker's widow, who promptly sued for copyright violation and plagiarism. After a protracted court battle, she won a settlement against both film maker F. W. Murnau and Prana Films, which just as promptly declared bankruptcy after losing the case.

In 1924 Stoker's widow authorized a stage play loosely based on the story. She needed the royalty money from the play to continue her lawsuit again Parana Studios. The play had a very successful run in the UK, and was revised in 1927 for American audiences. The revised play opened on Broadway in New York at the Fulton Theater with Bela Lugosi as the star, his first major English-speaking role.

The success of the Dracula play caught the attention of Universal's chief operational executive Carl Lammle Jr. who saw real potential in a film that featured a strong supernatural story

with no laughs and no gimmicks to explain away the horror premise at the end. He optioned both the original novel and the stage play to prevent any other studio from undercutting Universal's production.

The studio originally hired popular novelist Louis Bromfield to adapt the novel, but the result was disjoined and confusing. Garret Ford was hired to rework the script and he turned to the 1927 stage play as his inspiration. The play had dropped most of the material from the novel to focus on the character of the vampire and his relationship with a young woman who has come under his influence.

The Dracula character of the novel was a rough, mustached, gray haired, brutal feudal lord, in keeping with the gothic themes popular in 17th century literature, whereas the play stressed the strong sexual undertones of a venerable naïve young woman and the suave sophisticated vampire predator determined to turn her into a vampire so she can become his bride. The play had starred handsome foreign born actor Bela Lugosi in the role. Ford decided to merge the play's focus with enuf of the original novel's background setup to produce a viable movie plot. Even then the script went thru multiple minor revisions up to and even during the actual filming.

Lammle engaged Tod Browning to direct the picture and signed Lon Chaney to star as both Dracula and Prof. Von Helsing. Browning was a meticulous director who was recognized as an expert in crafting suspense and horror material into silent pictures with ten solid horror genre successes to his credit. Unfortunately, before the production got under way Lon Chaney died from inoperable throat cancer, and his friend Browning was less than enthusiastic about going forward on the project without Chaney in the lead.

Originally nobody at the studio was interested in Bela Lugosi as the star of the film even tho he had headed the successful Broadway play based on the novel. By a stroke of luck Lugosi was with the national stage touring company in

Los Angeles when Universal was talking to a number of big name stars for the part. Lammle Jr. particularly liked John Wray who had a sophisticated and vaguely exotic appearance and had proved to be an able actor in silent movies, stage roles and sound movies already.

With the help of friends Lugosi lobbied hard for the part. The fact that he agreed to work for a paltry five hundred dollars a week was the final factor that got him the role. Lugosi's accent added the touch of outré eeriness to the part that was needed, because he certainly did not look like a deathless vampire monster.

The somewhat disjointed feel of the film has often been attributed to the fact that it mostly adapted the stage play, but some of it may simply have been Tod Browning's unfamiliarity and unease handling sound movies. According to interviews with the actors, Browning left most of the actual set shooting to his cinematographer Karl Freund. Browning was a master of the silent film, but he was never comfortable with sound and only made six additional sound films after this, retiring from the business completely in 1939. Interestingly enuf three of his final films were in the horror genre, and

one of them, Mark of the Vampire, featured Lugosi reprising his

role as a vampire.

Students of cinema have done extensive interviews with cast and crew members over the years and report that the filming of Dracula was chaotic, with scenes changes, sets changes, dialogue changes, and the production running longer than the studio or anybody else had ever envisioned. Lugosi got an extra week or so of work out of the chaos, but all total he was only paid \$3,500 for the seven weeks it took to make the movie.

Despite everything the picture came in slightly under budget at \$341,191, equivalent to six and a half million 1924 dollars.

When the film was finally released the studio was so worried about the possible public response that it planted a number of fake newspaper stories about audience members fainting away during the movie. They need not have worried. Depression weary Americans were ready for some true escapism. The film opened at the Roxy in New York City which sold out all performances, including the extra showings that were added. It has been reported that *Dracula* was seen by 50,000 viewers nationwide in the first two days of its release.

The initial release generated \$700,000 profit for the studio, the best showing of any of their films that year. The astonishing success of Dracula immediately changed the direction of Universal Pictures. From that point onward horror and suspense movies would become the studio's primary focus.



When the Film Production Code was enacted, censors insisted on several changes being made before the movie could be re-released in 1936. Most notable was the final closing scene where Dr. Van Helsing directly addresses the movie audience and warns them that there really are vampires out and about in the world. Dracula's death groans and Renfield's shrieks as he is killed were shortened to the point of being almost completely eliminated. Those elements have been restored to the DVD copies, but the original epilogue is presumed to be lost forever.

Remarkable for a movie this popular, original movie posters and lobby cards from the film are extremely rare. Actor Nicholas Cage's copy of the movie poster used for this article sold at auction in 2009 for \$310,700. The much less impressive "A" version poster is even rarer, probably because most movie theaters found it unappealing as a sales tool promoting a horror movie spectacular. A copy of that poster sold in 2017 for \$525,000, at the time the highest price ever paid for a movie poster.

This movie and the Universal Studios sequels that followed were responsible for creating many of the myths about vampires that were never part of the original novel, nor were ever part of the original folklore legends about undead vampires. The idea of vampires being killed by sunlight, that a vampire drinking blood from a living person somehow turns the victim into a vampire himself, or the idea that only a sharpened wooden stake thru the heart can slay a vampire,

or that vampires cast no reflection in a mirror are just a few of the myths about vampires that the movies invented to move the plots along.

Over the years *Dracula* has been remade hundreds of times for film and television. At last count over 800 visual adaptations of the Dracula character have been completed, and more are in the offing. The influence of the Bram Stoker novel was considerable and long lasting, but it was this 1931 Universal motion picture that established Dracula forever as the ultimate version of the empirical supernatural villain.

• Avery, Amy. The Longest Autumn. Flatiron, 24.99 tp.

The god Autumn and his human companion, Tirne, become trapped in the mortal world. As the endless autumn stretches on, crops begin to fail and the threat of starvation looms. And Autumn's extended stay in the human realm turns him ever more mortal and vulnerable, stirring a new, forbidden attraction to Tirne. Tirne finds an unlikely ally - or enemy - in the enigmatic sorcerer and master of poisons, Sidriel.

• Barker, Susan et al. Of The Flesh: 18 Stories of Modern Horror. The Borough, 24.99 tp.

A collection of 18 stories of modern horror.

• Bear, Lauren J. A. Mother of Rome. Ace, 39.99 hc.

Beautiful, royal, rich: Rhea has it all - until her father loses his kingdom in a treacherous coup, and she is sent to the order of the Vestal Virgins to ensure she will never produce an heir. Corland, Mai. Four Ruined Realms [Five Broken Blades #2]. Entangled: Red Tower, 39.99 hc.

Bonded by a common enemy, then divided by deceit, the blades must rely on their skills to pull off King Joon's pursuit or risk his legendary wrath. A foreign rule of law stands between them and Quilimar, the Queen of Khitan. Now they have one month to steal the powerful Golden Ring of the Dragon Lord. the next decade of his life. Martin has made his most dangerous mistake yet: trespassed into the playgrounds of the ultrawealthy and spoiled their fun.

• Due, Tananarive. The Reformatory. Saga, 26.99 tp.

Gracetown, Florida: June 1950. 12 year old Robbie is sentenced to six months at the Gracetown School for Boys, a reformatory, for kicking the son of the largest landowner in town in defense of his older sister, Gloria. • Sager, Riley. *Home Before Dark*. Vintage, 20.99 tp.

25 years ago, Maggie Holt and her parents moved into Baneberry Hall, the site of her father's memoir called House of Horrors. His story of supernatural happenings and malevolent spirits became a worldwide phenomenon. Maggie doesn't believe in ghosts - or her father's story. When she inherits Baneberry Hall after his death and returns to renovate the place and sell it, she will have the opportunity to test her beliefs against the house.

• Salvatore, R. A. Pinquickle's Folly [Demonwars: The Buccaneers #1]. Saga, 26.99 tp.

In the free sea outside of the control of the usurping Xoconai empire, the dwarven Powrie pirates and merchants sail. But the golden-skinned Xoconai have begun to encroach upon these waters behind the rapacious attacks of the frigate Crocodile, helmed by Captain Aketz. When forced to submit, these sailors choose to live, free to do as they please, without some fool or another pretending to hold power over them.

• Sbrana, Analeigh. Lore of the Wilds. Voyager, 23.99 tp.

In a land ruled by ruthless Fae, 21-year-old Lore Alemeyu's village is trapped in a forested prison. When her village is threatened, Lore makes a desperate deal with a Fae lord. She will leave her home to catalog/organize an enchanted library that hasn't been touched in a thousand years. No Fae may enter the library, but there is a chance a human might be able to breach the cursed doors.

• Selene, Lyra. A Crown So Silver [Fair Folk #2]. Orbit, 25.99 tp.

After her sacrifice on the Ember Moon, Fia is flush with powerful magic and eager to rush into battle against her murderous sister, Eala. However, Fia's new husband Irian suggests they bide their time and retreat to the Silver Isle, a snowy island at the edge of the fae world ruled by a cunning smith-king. There Fia and Irian become embroiled in the Tournament of Kings, competing for a magical forging of immense power.

• Shawl, Nisi. Kinning [Everfair#2]. Tor, 24.99 tp.

As Tink and his sister Bee-Lung spread the spores of a mysterious empathy-generating fungus from their aircanoe, hoping to build bonds between people and help spread revolutionary sentiments of socialism and equality, the children of the abdicated King Mwenda vie for the throne. But their mother, Queen Josina, manipulates them both from behind the scenes, while also pitting Europe's influenza-weakened political powers against one another as these countries fight to regain control of their rebellious colonies.

• Stross, Charles. A Conventional Boy [Laundry Files #13]. Tor.com, 38.99 hc.

In 1984, teenage Derek Reilly was just another mid-England dungeon master. But then a secret government agency tasked with suppressing magical intrusions received a tip-off. Decades later Derek is now middle-aged and institutionalized at a center for deprogramming captured Elder God cultists. He decides to escape to attend what he thinks is a LARP game at a nearby D&D convention. It is instead, however, a dread ritual designed to summon a great evil into our world.

• Summers, Georgia. The City of Stardust. Redhook, 25.99 tp.

For centuries, the Everlys have seen their best and brightest disappear, taken as punishment for a crime no one remembers, for a purpose no one understands. Their tormentor, a woman named Penelope, never ages, never grows sick - and never forgives a debt. Violet Everly was a child when her mother left on a stormy night, determined to break the curse. When Marianne never returns, Penelope issues an ultimatum: Violet has ten years to find her mother, or she will take her place.

• Swyler, Erika. We Lived on the Horizon. Atria, 38.99 hc.

The walled city of Bulwark was founded on a system where sacrifice is rewarded by the AI that runs the city. Saint Enita Malovis, long accustomed to luxury, feels the end of her life and decades of work as a bio-prosthetist approaching and decides to create a physical being, called Nix, filled with her knowledge and experience. In the midst of her project, a fellow Sainted is brutally murdered and the city AI inexplicably erases the event from its data.

• Tan, Sue Lynn. *Immortal*. Voyager, 39.50 hc.

The young heir to a mortal crown, Liyen ascends a precarious throne when her grandfather dies, vowing to end her kingdom's obligation to the immortals and take vengeance against those she feels responsible for his death. When she is

summoned to the Immortal Realm, she seizes the opportunity to learn their secrets and to form a tenuous alliance to safeguard her people, all with the one she should fear and mistrust the most: the ruthless God of War.

• Tchaikovsky, Adrian. Alien Clay. Tor UK, 24.99 tp.

Professor Arton Daghdev, xeno-ecologist and political dissident has taken that one way trip to the Mandate's prison colony Kiln. Soon after arrival he discovers that humanity is not the first intelligent life to set foot there. In the midst of a ravenous, chaotic ecosystem are the ruins of a civilization, but who were the vanished builders and where did they go?

• Underhill, Edward. The In-Between Bookstore. Avon, 24.99 tp.

Now unemployed, Darby moves back to the small Illinois town he left behind. But the only familiar thing there is In Between Books, where he worked while in high school. When he walks into the bookstore now, Darby feels an eerie sense of deja vu - everything is exactly the same. Even the newspapers are dated 2009. And behind the register is a teen who looks a lot like Darby did at sixteen...

• Webb, A. S. Daughter of Chaos [Dark Pantheon #1]. Mira, 24.99 tp.

In ancient Greece, mortals suffer under the tyranny of the gods--forced to sacrifice the food they depend on, their worldly possessions and even each other at the whims of the Twelve. But an ancient prophecy speaks of hope, of one who will set humankind free. On the island of Naxos, Danae, a fisherman's daughter, develops strange powers tied to a mysterious tree bearing golden fruit. Driven from her home, she seeks guidance from the oracle but finds only more questions...

• Weber, David. To Challenge Heaven [Out of the Dark #3]. Tor, 26.99 tp.

It may turn out to be possible to turn the Shongairi, the aliens who attacked Earth, into our allies against the Hegemony. There's just the small matter of the Shongairi honour code, which makes bushido look like a child's game. We might be able to make them our friends - if we can crush their planetary defenses in the greatest battle we, or they, have ever seen...

• Whitten, Hannah. The Hemlock Queen [The Nightshade Crown #2]. Orbit, 25.99 tp.

Prince Bastian has seized the throne and raised Lore - a necromancer and former smuggler - to his right-hand side. But with Bastian's coronation fast approaching and enemies whispering on all sides, Lore must figure out how to protect herself, her prince, and her country before they all come crumbling down and whatever dark power has been creeping through the catacombs is unleashed.

• Winton, Tim. Juice. Picador, 26.99 tp.

Two fugitives, a man and a child, drive across a stony desert. As dawn breaks, they roll into an abandoned mine site. They're exhausted, traumatized, desperate now, and this is a forsaken place, but as a refuge it's the most promising they've seen. The child peers at the field of desolation. The man thinks to himself, this could work. The only problem is, they're not alone...

• Wragg, David. The Company of the Wolf [Tales of the Plains #2]. Voyager, 36.99 hc.

When Ree and Javani stumble across a lone traveller under bandit attack, they make the mistake of lending a hand. Forced to take refuge in the traveller's village, they quickly find allies among the lush, wooded hills. But then the true nature of the bandits is revealed. With winter approaching and a vengeful company of mercenaries circling like wolves, Ree and Javani must uncover the secrets of this peaceful valley ... or risk the ruin of it all.

• Wright, Suzanne. The Nightmare in Him. Piatkus, 19.99 tp.

At the heart of a conflict between two groups of powerful immortals stands Wynter Dellavale. Wynter is a witch who sought safe haven for herself and her coven in Devil's Cradle. Founded by seven Ancient beings, the Home of Monsters provides protection, shelter, and will never give you up to outsiders - providing you pay the substantial fee. Wynter

already wears the brand of Cain - the mark that says she is in his service and that her soul partly belongs to him. But as their relationship deepens, Wynter has to make a choice from which there's no turning back.

• Yamamoto, Makana. Hammajang Luck. Voyager, 24.99 tp.

After her friend Angel sold her out, Edie was shipped off to the icy prison planet spinning far below the soaring skybridges and neon catacombs of Kepler space station - of home - to spend the best part of a decade alone. Early parole puts Edie in the pallid sunlight to find none other than Angel waiting - and she has an offer. One last job. One last deal. One last target. The trillionaire tech god they failed to bring down last time. There's just one thing Edie needs to do - trust Angel again - which also happens to be the last thing Edie wants to do.

• Yambao, Samantha Sotto. Water Moon. Del Rey, 38.99 hc.

On a backstreet in Tokyo lies a pawnshop where you can sell your regrets, but not everyone can find it. Hana Ishikawa wakes on her first morning as the pawnshop's new owner to find it ransacked, the shop's most precious acquisition stolen, and her father missing. Together with a charming stranger, Hana must journey through a mystical world to find her father and the stolen choice - by way of rain puddles, rides on paper cranes, the bridge between midnight and morning, and a night market in the clouds.

• Yarros, Rebecca. Onyx Storm [Empyrean #3]. Entangled: Red Tower, 39.99 hc.

After nearly eighteen months at Basgiath War College, Violet Sorrengail knows there's no more time for lessons. Now she must journey beyond the failing Aretian wards to seek allies from unfamiliar lands to stand with Navarre. They need an army. They need power. They need magic. And they need the one thing only Violet can find--the truth. But a storm is coming... and not everyone can survive its wrath.

• Yeong-Gwang, You. The Rainfall Market. Ace, 25.99 tp.

On the outskirts of Rainbow Town, there is an old, abandoned house. They say that if you send a letter detailing your misfortunes there, you could receive a ticket. If you bring this ticket to the house on the first day of the rainy season, you'll be granted entrance into the mysterious Rainfall Market - where you can choose to completely change your life. No one is more surprised than Serin when she receives a ticket.


New! New! New! Server! Software! Features!

As of late August, FANAC.org has migrated to a new, dedicated server, with enough room for growth. There were surprisingly few migration pains, and so we moved on to a more important and more difficult migration.

In early November, the management of the fanzine archive portion of FANAC.org moved off our original hoary REXX code, and onto spanking new code developed by Mark Olson. There are still a few bugs in the system, so be patient with us as Mark and Edie play whack-a-mole with them.

You'll notice that on fanzine index pages that have been updated, for example, *Apparatchik*, the listed editors are now hotlinked to their Fancyclopedia bios. For complete runs of fanzines, that will now be marked on their index page as well as on the Classic List. Clubzine pages will include the club name in their index page too. The magic only happens when we update the fanzine index page, so if you are looking at an old page, these features won't be there. We'll get to them. But, pretty cool, right?

There's a remaining problem with the statistics on the alphabetic and the chronological list. We know about it and are working to resolve it. But, if you spot anything else awry, please send a note to fanac@fanac.org. Hooray for Mark!

We don't mind if your zines are on another site. We want to be as comprehensive as we can, not exclusive!

FANAC International: The FANAC archive is the product of many hands, not all of them in the United States. Read on for Rob Hansen's piece on scanning for FANAC.org.

Rob Hansen - on scanning for FANAC.org

Those of you that follow the updates know that Rob has been providing some truly rare and intriguing fanzines for the archive. How does he do that? Read on...



Having a large collection of old UK fanzines going back to the 1930s, the logical thing to do for **fanac.org** - with a few exceptions - was to start by scanning the oldest first, which is what I did. Having exhausted all the earlier fanzines I'm now onto the 1950s, an era when Mike Moorcock produced his first zines, notably *Burroughsania* and *Jazz Fan / The Rambler*. As the titles suggest, the former was devoted to the works of Edgar Rice Burroughs while the latter was about music and in my opinion is the more historically interesting of the two. Give them a look and see if you agree.

I inherited this collection from the late Vince Clarke and I'm still finding things in it that surprise me. Most recently this was a run of the first iteration of Ken Slater's *Operation Fantast*. Dating from the late 1940s. this was filed separately from the later, better known version of that publication. Although always Ken's own zine, *Operation Fantast* volume #1 was affiliated with the British Fantasy Library (see https://fancyclopedia.org/British_Fantasy_Library) and carried some of its departments. It was an odd arrangement, but it made sense in the feeble UK fandom of

the immediate post war years, and Ken is credited with helping that fandom get back on its feet again. When things started to pick up, Ken broke *Operation Fantast's* ties with the BFS and relaunched it as the official organ of Operation Fantast, the trading and book selling organisation that eventually morphed into his Fantast (Medway) Ltd business (https://fancyclopedia.org/Fantast_(Medway)).



FANAC at the Glasgow Worldcon

FANAC had two tables with power close to a main door at the Glasgow Worldcon. Staffed by Mark Olson, Perry Middlemiss, Edie and Joe, we were well represented. We connected with fans from Europe to China, with a heavy representation of UK fans.

Some wonderful fanzines were brought for scanning, as well as some digital scans themselves. Glasgow Fan Guest of Honor Mark Plummer brought 9 issues of J. Michael Rosenblum's *Futurian War Digest* from the early '40s. If you haven't read these, you might want to take a look. They are evocative, and speak of fannish culture surviving under wartime conditions, coping with paper and supply shortages, and persisting despite all challenges. The staples in these copies were half solid, half rust. Later that same convention, Rosenblum's granddaughter, Michelle, gave us a thumb drive of already scanned fanzines from her grandfather's collection, including a number of issues of Olon Wiggins' *The Science Fiction Fan* from the 1930s and early 40s.

A complete surprise came from Susie Haynes, daughter of Ken Slater. She brought 4 handmade wooden "Soggy on Dragonback" toys from the 60s, kitted out for racing. These were based Terry Jeeves' character of Soggy which appeared in his fanzine *Erg*. The Soggys were indeed mounted on dragonback, and each had a long string connected to a pencil via a hole in the middle of the pencil. The idea was that a fan would wind the string around the pencil, thereby making the toy move along the floor. You know what happened next.




On Monday at 11, we started racing in the Fan Lounge. Thanks to España Sheriff, Fan Lounge manager, a group of eager fans recreated the ritual of the Soggy race. Soon enough, fannish knees being what they are, the fans were replaced by younger kids. It was glorious.

The first fanzine title I want to talk about is a bit of an oddity. Archie Mercer published a fanzine usually called *Archive*, except when it wasn't. Sometimes it was *Archive Between Meals* and other times it was a bit difficult to figure out the title. Mark Plummer has been working on this for a while trying to figure out the names and the numbers

and the publication dates (or at least the publication order) of the online issues of *Archive*. You can see the results in his write-up on Fancyclopedia.

The British Fanzine Bibliography, meticulously updated by Rob Hansen (https://www.fiawol.org.uk/Fanstuff/biblio/index.htm) includes a listing for *Archive*. It's not completely in agreement with what Mark has discerned from the zines themselves. That's part of the puzzle in deciphering fanzines. You'd think names and dates would be easier. But that's only part of the *Archive* strangeness. Archie Mercer would occasionally go off onto a strange little tangent. For example, look at the 'Great Irish Rift Expedition'. It is a part of several different issues of *Archive*, but it doesn't always go in order. There's also a Rift in the fanzine, a physical Rift, although the paper is not actually torn.



For those of you who feel that a rift is objectionable in a fanzine, you could read *The Wall*. It's a continuous long wall over several different fanzines with some entertaining corners. It was constructed over months by a multitude of people.



Many of you will know about the Tower to the Moon. That was possibly the most entertaining construction in fannish history, and there is also some entertainment in reading about its origins. The structure was built by the great Berkeley Bhoys - Carr, Graham, Ellik, Rike, Stewart and even the immortal Brandon.

Fanzines are not the only place where you can learn about fannish constructions.

For the 1992 Worldcon in Orlando, quite a few of us were involved in building a miniature golf course in less than 24 hours. It included a reconstruction of

the Irish Tower of True Fandom with the actual Enchanted Duplicator installed on top.

Those of you who really would like to know the actual history of Science Fiction fandom should take a stroll through our newszines. We have some newszines going back to 1935, almost before fannish history began. There are over 4,500 newszines on FANAC.org, including complete runs of *Fantasy Fiction Field*, *Focal Point*, and *Skyrack*. You can actually meander through FANAC.org's newszines from 1935 to 2024, and this doesn't include the many clubzines that have also published lots of news.

Remember though, the newszines tell the news, but to see how truly creative fans can be, you have to read the fanzines.

In these recordings, their group dynamics and the interactions that created *Plokta* are on full display. It's great fun to watch, and it is clear it was great fun to live.

Beginning with his birth in Hobart to his chairmanship of Australia's first World Science Fiction Convention, this interview explores the fannish history of Robin Johnson, not only one of the best known Australian fans, but also one of the best loved.
