Dear Mrs. Hunt:

Today is a good day indeed to be a fan. With a slightly slow work day leading up to the holiday weekend—Martin Luther King Jr. Day is Monday—I spent part of the morning organizing N3F back issues I've received as PDFs over the years. While eating an early afternoon lunch of homemade tomato soup, a grilled cheese sandwich, and an orange, our mail was delivered. Today's mail included the January issue of *Locus*, this month's LASFAPA mailing, and a copy of *Operation: Phantasy—The Best from The Phantagraph* (Phantagraph, 1967), edited by Donald A. Wollheim, that I'd ordered. Besides, I have a new issue of *Fanactivity Gazette* to read—the first of the new year.

I've fallen out of the practice of writing letters of comment to the Nefzines, but going through the PDF back issues available through the club, as well as the Fanac Fan History Project, I'm feeling closer to the club than I have in some time—and somewhat distant and removed at the same time. I also took some time to organize my personal N3F files online, and it struck me that I'm nowhere near as plugged in as I once was as a member of the directorate, editor of *The National Fantasy Fan*, and otherwise active member who, well, did stuff. The solution, of course, is fanac.

So I turned to the pages of *Fanactivity Gazette* Vol. 4 #8 to see what's going on—and how I might get more involved in the club—and fandom around the world. After all, fanac is the lifeblood of fandom—as well as organized fandom and clubs such as ours. Thank you very much for continuing to edit and publish this Nefzine so consistently.

What kind of snack biscuits do you prefer? At work, a colleague bought local co-workers an assortment of Trader Joe's Belgian Cookie Collection, which offers "12 delicious varieties." Between the two of us, he and I ate perhaps a fourth of the cookies that involved chocolate. My wife and I didn't bake Christmas cookies this year, but in recent days, we've benefited from creme wafers purchased as a shared snack for a *Dungeons & Dragons* game session that was rescheduled because of the fires in southern California. (My family is safe and healthy, and the firefighting efforts seem to be heading in the right direction after a week of citywide tension.) We've done okeh in terms of projects so far this year. In mid-January, we hired workers to clean our attic and replace our insulation, and by the end of the month, we'll have replaced our furnace with a new unit that can accommodate air conditioning—which we currently don't have—and added new ductwork in order to heat my wife's home office, which is currently an unheated addition. Both will be excellent improvements to our home.

Thank you for publishing the call for submissions for my fanzine, *The Stf Amateur*! Personally, I'd prefer that Neffers contribute to *Fanactivity Gazette* and other clubzines—I know I haven't been recently—but I appreciate the camaraderie and support. (I also appreciate the N3F's inclusion of the *Amateur* in the FrankinZine.) If I receive any contributions I think are better suited for one of the Nefzines, I'll let folks know.

Of the forthcoming movies, nothing really piqued my interest—initially. My wife saw *Nosferatu* (2024) over the holidays and thought it was a bit much. And I've been intrigued by *The Substance* and *The End* but have yet to see either. Most recently, I watched *Akira* again in honor of Anime LA before reading the first two volumes of the manga. I had forgotten how good *Akira* is—and enjoyed the manga (my first time reading it!) even more. I look forward to reading the remainder of the series. So perhaps the upcoming *Cowboy Bebop* movie—a theatrical re-release of the 2001 anime feature—will help scratch that itch.

Given the new *Nosferatu* film, Bob Jennings's "*Dracula*: In Living Black & White" resonated with me. As a child, I saw a stage production of *Dracula*, and the actor who portrayed the vampire even bit my program with his plastic fangs. You can't do much better than Bram Stoker's novel and the Universal movie in terms of classic representations of vampires. In the Los Angeles area late last year, the LA Opera Orchestra performed a newly commissioned score to accompany a screening of the Spanish *Dracula*, which was filmed by a different crew with a different cast. I wasn't able to attend any of the Halloween performances, but Neffers might also be interested in the Spanish version of the movie, which was contemporary with Tod Browning's, though directed by George Melford.

Between Yvonne and Lloyd Penney's pubnites schedule and the new release list from White Dwarf Books, our Canadian contingency is well represented. (I met the Penneys in person for the first time at Loscon late last year!) Of the forthcoming books, David Dalglish's *Level: Unknown* struck me as Edgar Rice Burroughs for the LitRPG set, Cory Doctorow's *The Bezzle* is sure to be great—I picked up a copy this morning, oddly enough—Tananarive Due's *The Reformatory* is reported to be horrific, Nnedi Okorafor's *Death of the Author* looks intriguing, and I also took note of the titles by Nisi Shawl, Charles Stross, Erika Swyler, and Edward Underhill. A team member at work cannot wait for the release of Rebecca Yarros's *Onyx Storm*, which she plans to start—and finish—as soon as she can get her hands on it.

I was relieved that Jason P. Hunt continues to maintain the Science Fiction Pro and Fan Birthdays list. I need to remember to refer to this more often—perhaps daily! Today, for example, is the birth anniversary of Nevil Shute, an English novelist and aeronautical engineer whose 1957 novel *On the Beach* might be his best-known work. It was adapted as a movie in 1959. Perhaps I'll scan the shelves of our home library to see if I have a copy readily at hand! (Tonight, however, we'll likely watch David Lynch's *Inland Empire*, in honor of the director's recent death.)

What an impressive and world-spanning con calendar! I'll be participating in and volunteering for Gallifrey One, our local *Doctor Who* con, in mid-February. This issue of *Fanactivity Gazette* is a veritable checklist of ways to get involved with other fen. Regardless of whether Neffers write a letter of comment, contribute to a fanzine, watch a movie, read a book, go to a con, or otherwise reach out to other fen to share ideas and experiences—there are plenty of opportunities to take advantage of. Like they used to say about Boston's infamous Scollay Square, there's always something doing.



A Deep Dive Into 20,000 Leagues Under the Seas Bob Jennings



The March, 1869 issue of Julies Hetzel's *Magasin d'éducation et de récréation*, (The Education and Recreation Magazine) began serializing Jules Verne's newest novel, *Twenty Thousand Leagues Under the Seas*. Public response was enthusiastic.

In November 1870, after the serial was complete, Hetzel published the entire work in a handsome deluxe hardback edition that included 110 full page illustrations by noted artists Alphonse de Neuville and Edouard Riou. The book became a national best seller and went thru several printings even tho Hetzel also offered two cheaper hardback editions, one with plain covers without any illustrations aimed for the popular market, and a smaller hardback with a few illustrations aimed at the rental and popular library markets. This book, like most of Hetzel's published titles was timed for release just before the Christmas season.

Within two years the book had been translated into English, followed by German, Italian, Russian, and Greek language editions which also became best sellers. Within twelve years the book had been translated into twenty-five different languages, and more were added to the total as the years rolled by, making it one of the most popular works of early science fiction ever written.

20,000 Leagues is a science fiction adventure depicting the wonders and perils experienced by three unwilling passengers aboard a super-submarine known as the Nautilus, captained by a morose renegade with an abiding hatred of imperialism and the governments who practiced it. He is self named Nemo, which is the Latin word for No Man, the same name Odysseus used in The Odyssey in his encounter with the giant Cycloptians,

clearly a deliberate choice on the part of Verne. The submarine itself was named *Nautilus* in honor of American inventor Robert Fulton's early submarine of the same name built in 1800.

The book has been celebrated not only as a rollicking adventure, but also as a science fiction work that accurately predicted a number of scientific advancements in the development of undersea exploration.

The four main protagonists of the story are Prof. Pierre Aronnax, a French naturalist, who relates the story, Conseil, the Professor's faithful servant, Ned Land, a Canadian harpooner, the best at his trade, and Captain Nemo, builder and master of the submarine *Nautilus*.

The submarine has been seen in the Pacific and is initially regarded as a new and potentially dangerous large sea monster. The US government commissions an expedition to locate the creature and kill it before it does serious damage to oceangoing commerce. Professor Aronnax, in New York on a visit, receives a last minute invitation to join the expedition. After sailing around the Cape into the Pacific, and after months of searching, the naval frigate finally encounters the "monster" which damages the ship's rudder. The Professor and Land are tossed overboard. Conseil leaps in after them to save his master. After being washed away and in dire danger of drowning, they finally find temporary safety by climbing on the back of the "monster" which they later discover is a submarine, operated by a mysterious scientist calling himself Captain Nemo.

He explains that his electric submarine has features far in advance of anything the world now knows of submersibles, and that to protect his secret, the three men must remain his "guests" for the rest of their lives.

There follow many fantastic adventures as Nemo tours the waters of the planet and makes numerous scientific observations, while displaying his many scientific advances in submarine design including diving suits with self-contained oxygen packs that allow humans to walk along the bottom of the sea. The diving suits also include unique high intensity

electric lamps that penetrate the deep ocean darkness with ease.

As the story unfolds we learn that Nemo is the sole survivor of some tragedy, an attack or expedition of conquest by some imperialistic nation that has resulted in the death of his wife and all his family. He has decided to shun the world and devote himself to scientific research, but later, after many adventures, Nemo spots a naval vessel belonging to the nation that has destroyed his family and he declares he will have revenge. To the horror of his unwilling passengers, he rams the Nautilus into the side of the warship, sinking it and killing all its sailors.

After this attack Nemo seems to sink into deep depression. The submarine wanders about almost aimlessly. The crew are undisciplined, regular watches are not even being kept. Prof. Aronnax is worried that Nemo is losing his mind and the submarine will be destroyed.

A plan for escape if the opportunity ever arises is concocted, and a few weeks later, land is sighted. This is their one chance for escape, and the Professor with Land and Conseil take the chance. Stealing away in the Nautilus' skiff, they see that the submarine has inadvertently blundered into the Moskstraumen, a large dangerous whirlpool off the coast of Norway. The Nautilus is swept into the maelstrom and its fate is unknown, at least until Verne wrote *The* Mysterious Island which was published in 1874.


In 1872 the book was first translated into English by Rev. Lewis Page Mercer, an unfortunate choice, since he did a sloppy job of translating, including cutting about a fourth of the text, and heavily editing the political undertones of the volume because they ran counter to his belief in and support for British imperialism and its goals. Probably his two most famous translation errors were in changing the book's title from *Under the Seas* to *Under the Sea*, singular. Verne

originally meant that title literally. The *Nautilus* sails over 20,000 leagues submerged while visiting every ocean and major sea on the planet, equivalent to circling the globe twice.

The second notable error was when Mercer apparently refused to believe that diving bells or diving equipment with self-contained tanks could possibly exist, even the French prototypes had been developed in 1865, a fact Verne was well aware of. Instead he translated the suits as "cork jackets", which made no sense at all in the context of the story plot.

There were hundreds of other translation errors and edits, yet despite that, the Mercer edition became the standard English language edition for over a hundred years. It wasn't until the 1960s when scholars and book publishers began to look back at the original French editions and made adjustments.

Anthony Bonner published his new translation which was presented in the 1962 Bantam Classics paperback book edition. This was followed in 1966 by a new translation by James Miller, published by Washington Square Press. That edition specifically mentioned many of the problems with the Mercer text. Miller continued to work on the novel, with annotated editions coming out in 1976 and a completely new translation made with Vernian Fredrick Paul Walter in 1993. Interestingly, the Walter translation was not copyrighted, which led Project Guttenberg to post it on their website, where it can still be read.



Further translations using the original manuscript which contains many of the edits and suggestions of publisher Hetzel were produced in 1998. Still newer translations have continued to be published, each claiming to be even more complete or true to the original Verne manuscript. Many of these newer editions are available in affordable paperback or ebook formats.

This novel has become a perennial best seller. The story has never been out of print since the day it was published, and in addition to being published in almost every language known on the planet, in zillions of different editions, it was adapted to stage plays, film, radio, television, animated cartoons and audio books hundreds of times.

If you have never read the book, or only read the inferior Mercer translation, you should update your reading list by trying one of the new translations, several of which are available on Project Guttenberg. 20,000 Leagues Under the Seas is a book for the ages, as interesting and exciting today as when it was originally published back in 1869.



Bob Jennings has been involved in fandom since the late 1950s, and is one of the original founding members of comics fandom, founding the SFPA and publishing hundreds of fanzines. From 1979 to 2000, Bob ran a science fiction/comics/game store, which is now all mail order. He's currently at work to develop a device that will zap robo-callers and internet spammers.

Arden, Katherine. The Warm Hands of Ghosts. Del Rey, 25.99 tp.

January 1918. Laura Iven was a revered field nurse until she was wounded and discharged from the medical corps, leaving behind a brother still fighting in Flanders. Now home in Halifax she receives word of Freddie's death in combat, along with his personal effects - but something doesn't make sense. Determined to uncover the truth, Laura returns to Belgium as a volunteer at a private hospital. Soon after arriving, she hears whispers about haunted trenches, and a strange hotelier whose wine gives soldiers the gift of oblivion.

• Ashton, Edward. Mal Goes to War. Griffin, 25.00 tp.

As a free A.I., Mal has no interest in the war between the modded and augmented Federals and the puritanical Humanists. But he's not above scouting the battlefield for salvage, and when the Humanists abruptly cut off access to infospace he finds himself trapped in the body of a cyborg mercenary, and responsible for the safety of the modded girl she died protecting.

• Ballantine, Phillippa. Alien: Seventh Circle. Titan, 24.99 tp.

When a family of scavengers recover the amnesiac Mae Hendricks amongst the wreckage of an unidentified ship, they bring a world of pain down on themselves and the civilians of Guelph Station. Mae doesn't know where she is from or her true nature, nor that she is being hunted by vicious adversaries. Mae's past could reveal the conspiracy that is tearing the galaxy apart, but may well unleash a tide of snarling terrors...

Bechard, Deni. We Are Dreams in the Eternal Machine. Spiderline, 25.99 tp.

Charged initially with a single task - "to never harm humans and to protect them" - an experimental AI overrides its programming and determines that the best way to accomplish its purpose is to isolate all of the Earth's remaining seven billion humans in controlled environments. And to present them with vivid, tactile, imagined worlds - some realistic, others entirely fantastical - in which all desires are fulfilled. With the help of the machine, a group of compelling characters unpacks traumatic memories of the past - one rife with violence after a military coup and second civil war in America.

• Becker, Elizabeth. *The Moonlight Healers*. Graydon House, 37.00 hc.

For generations, the Winston women have possessed an unspoken magical gift. They can heal with the touch of a hand. It's a tradition they've always had to practice in secret, in the moonlight hours, when the fireflies dance and the whippoorwill birds sing. But not every healer has rightfully passed on this knowledge to her descendants, and for young Louise Winston, the discovery of her abilities comes in less-than-ideal circumstances. She brings her best friend back from death following an accident, the day after he professed his long-held feelings for her, five days before she's supposed to move away.

• Bishop, Anne. The Lady in Glass and Other Stories. Ace, 25.99 TP.

Stories old and new, spanning all of Anne Bishop's fantasy worlds.

• Blake, Olivie. The Atlas Complex [Atlas #3]. Tor, 24.99 tp.

Until the day Hedrek Zennor dies. Violet thinks she's free - then she learns that her father planned to send her into the Darklands, where the Leech Lords reign. Where Violet's still-born brother was taken years ago.
