judged would be more profitable than running a law office.

His first book was a work of non-fiction titled *Cetywayo and His White Neighbours*. The book was only published by Trubner & Co. in an edition of 750 copies if Haggard would pay them fifty pounds, in advance. Haggard paid the money. The book got positive reviews but only managed to sell 154 copies. It was reissued later when Haggard was a popular writer, and still didn't sell.

His second book was the novel *Dawn*, which had been rejected and rewritten several times before being accepted by Hurst & Blackett. Sales were slow but steady. His third book was another novel titled *The Witch's Head*. Haggard tried selling it as a serial novel to many of the popular weekly story papers of the day, but after being turned down seven times, he sent it to Hurst & Blackett who published it in 1885. Sales were much stronger than with *Dawn*, and turned Haggard a profit of fifty pounds in royalty payments.

According to legend Haggard wrote *King Solomon's Mines* because of a five-shilling bet with his brother that he could not write a novel "even half as good as Robert Louis Stevenson's *Treasure Island*."

Haggard wrote the story rapidly. It was finished by the end of April, 1885. He sent the manuscript to Hurst & Blackett, his regular publisher, who promptly rejected it as being too fantastic. Haggard sent it to several other companies who rejected it for the same reason. He finally found a publisher in Cassell & Company, who offered him a flat fee of 100 pounds for all rights to the novel, or a 10% royalty. 100 pounds was an enormous sum for the time, well more than Haggard had every earned before. However, sensing that his story was going to have long literary legs, Haggard opted for the 10% royalty instead, which turned out to be a very wise choice.

Cassells prepared for the publication by plastering the fences and walls of London with posters and placards breathlessly hyping the novel as "The Most Amazing Book Ever Written!". The company also sent enthusiastic advance

In September 1885, Cassells & Company issued a brand new novel by H. Ryder Haggard, titled *King Solomon's Mines*. It became an instant hit, a best selling novel that also immediately catapulted Haggard into literary fame and changed the course of his life.

Henry Ryder Haggard, born in 1856, was the eighth child of a family of ten children. His father was a barrister, his mother wrote novels and poetry. His education was uneven.

He attempted to become a British army officer, but failed his entrance exam. He passed his exam to become part of the British Foreign Office, but never took a position there. His father finally arranged for him to go to southern Africa in 1875 as the unpaid assistant to the secretary of Sir Henry Bulwer, the Lieutenant Governor of the colony of Natal. He soon obtained a staff position with Sir Theophilus Stepstone, Special Commissioner for the Transvaal.

Ryder was impressed with Africa. He was impressed with its untapped mineral wealth, its rolling fertile farmlands, and its diverse peoples. He traveled the region extensively and was present during the Zulu War and the First Boer War. Ryder was also in Africa as its many amazing historical ruins were coming to light, particularly Great Zimbadwe, which was publicized in 1878.

In 1880 he married a friend of his sister, Mariaana Louisa Margitson. Back home in England in 1882 he studied law and passed the Bar in 1884. His practice of the law was not particularly enthusiastic. Instead he took up writing, which he publicity teasers to all of the rental libraries in England with a declaration that *King Solomon's Mines* would become their most profitable rental of the year.

When the book was released that September sales exploded. Even the publisher was surprised at how avidly the public accepted this new story of high adventure in deepest Africa. It was said that the printing presses were running on full overtime to keep up with the orders for the rest of that year. The novel became the best selling novel of the 1885, and certainly one of the most talked about.

King Solomon's Mines was an extraordinary story, one of the earliest novels set in black Africa. Haggard's hero, Allan Quartermain, was largely drawn from real life people Haggard had known back in Africa, particularly Frederick Selousa, a well-known white hunter and African explorer. He also drew from Joseph Thompson's book about his experiences among the Masai people in what later became known as Kenya.



The story told of Allan Quartermain, engaged by Sir Henry Curtis in a search for Curtis's brother, lost and unheard from after a dangerous trip into unexplored northern territory in a search for the legendary King Solomon's Mines. Curtis believes his brother might be still alive, and if not, he at least wants definite proof of his brother's death. Quartermain has an old map purporting to be a guide to the lost mines which he has always regarded as a fake. It's a hopeless trek, but Quartermain has led a full life, and despite believing that he and the entire party are headed toward their death, he accepts the commission.

What follows are a series of extraordinary adventures into totally unexplored territory, meeting strange peoples, stumbling into a lost land, discovering a fantastic hidden empire engaged in an explosive political situation, and discovering the fabulous lost King Solomon's Mines complete with a hoard of gems and precious metals. Their adventures and harrowing escape comprise a breathless thriller that kept readers engaged thru 320 pages and made it a book that has never been out of print from the day it was first published.

King Solomon's Mines made Haggard's fortune, and solidified his determination to become a full time author specializing in adventures with strong fantasy elements. With this volume he singlehandedly created the Lost Race and Hidden Empire fantasy motifs, and crowned this initial success with the publication of *She* the following year. He went on to feature his hero Allan Quartermain in eleven other novels and four short stories.

King Solomon's Mines has been reprinted in virtually every language on the planet. It has been adapted into every kind of media including movies, radio plays, comic books, graphic novels, and even opera. Inexpensive print copies are widely available everywhere, and it can be accessed on line at a number of web sites, including Project Guttenberg. It is an amazing story that can be read and reread and still thrill the reader every time, one of the most exciting and memorable fantasy adventure stories ever written, truly a story for the ages.

Bob Jennings has been involved in fandom since the late 1950s, and is one of the original founding members of comics fandom, founding the SFPA and publishing hundreds of fanzines. From 1979 to 2000, Bob ran a science fiction/comics/game store, which is now all mail order. He's currently at work to develop a device that will zap robo-callers and internet spammers.

Kallikanzaros (10 issues, edited by John Ayotte, 1967-1975)

At first glance it seems intellectual. It is.

It seems literary, with fiction and poetry and criticism. It definitely is.

It seems Sercon. It certainly is. It's also readable and well presented.

There is also a smattering of fannish oriented pieces. There's Jerry Kaufman on the first fanzines he read, Larry Smith on a theory of Worldcon business meetings. One of my favorites was in K6, Jack Gaughan starts: "It came as quite a shock to me when I discovered Kley." Jack had been a professional artist for years!

Egeo Sextarius - a Treatise upon Manners and Cultured Behaviour for the Benefit of Colonials Newly Come upon these Shores. A Collection of Essays "by Noted Authorities". Profusely Illustrated by Divers Hands. (August 1979)

It's exactly what the subtitle says - a bit of an immature, certainly irreverent, look at UK-US culture, mostly UK, and fannish behavior (properly spelled) that is often quite funny, intentionally and not, even after 45 years.

Since the last newsletter, in addition to the Margaret Middleton interview mentioned above, we had a fascinating panel discussion with some of the most important university archivists for science fiction.

Out of the Ghetto and Into the University: Science Fiction Fandom University Collections, with Phoenix Alexander, Peter Balestrieri, Susan Graham and Joe Siclari(m). This zoom session, now on YouTube in three parts, explores the details behind the creation and current state of some of the best known university archives of science fiction fan material. Phoenix Alexander is the Jay Kay and Doris Klein Science Fiction Librarian at the University of California, Riverside; Peter Balestrieri is the Curator of the Science Fiction and Popular Culture collection at the University of Iowa; and Susan Graham is the Special Collections Librarian at the University of Maryland, Baltimore County. Each of these Universities have received sizable collections from prominent fans of the period. As you can imagine, the questions from the audience were heavily geared towards what fans could do with their collections.

Bill Burns - Some notes on the origins and purpose of eFanzines.com

eFanzines was born out of circumstances in November 2000. On a fannish mail list, Marty Cantor was bemoaning the inefficiency of emailing multiple copies of the PDF edition of his fanzine, *No Award*. As I already had a webserver and the time and ability to run a new project, it made sense to set up a central site to host fanzines for editors who didn't have their



own on-line space. Marty was the first to sign up and others soon followed: the site now hosts several thousand issues of almost 150 titles. And from the beginning I also included links to the small number of current fanzines already on line elsewhere.

Initially, I thought it would just be a service to free up fanzine editors from having to worry about the mechanics of hosting PDF editions of their primarily paper fanzines. But almost immediately I was asked to host electronic-only fanzines, and I realized that eFanzines could also be a venue for fans who didn't want to deal with the costs of producing and mailing paper fanzines.

In the 1960s there was a fan-run service in the UK called PADS -- the Printing and Distribution Service, which for only the cost of materials and postage would take a fanzine editor's content, stencil, duplicate and collate it, and mail the finished fanzine. Logistically it was doomed to failure, but as an electronic successor to this service eFanzines works perfectly, and at no cost to fanzine editors.

Fans have always had ways to communicate with each other. In the early days of fandom, starting in the 1930s, they wrote to the prozines and eventually to each other;

they started local clubs; they organized conventions, they published fanzines. When electronic bulletin boards (BBSes) started up in the late 1970s, fans met there. In the early days of the internet, Usenet newsgroups were the place to hang out, and as email became widespread, SF and fannish themed e-lists were started. And then came blogs, and eventually social media, once the World Wide Web opened to the public in 1993.

It's now almost 25 years after I founded eFanzines, and there are many different ways to keep in touch with our friends around the world. One might ask if fanzines still have any relevance? Indeed, wouldn't it be a kindness to kill them off? Well, perhaps I'm old-fashioned, but I find most of the alternatives to be unsatisfactory in one way or another, the main problem being that they are all ephemeral or intangible in nature. By this I don't mean that they can't be permanent; rather that they have no specific form and no unity -- they are missing what is best described as the concept of the issue, which preserves a fanzine's content as published.

Fanzines, whether paper or electronic, embody the best features of other media. They have editorials, articles on every topic, artwork, and, most important, letters from readers commenting on previous issues or raising new topics. Each issue is designed by its editor as a cohesive whole and stands as a unit. Once published it becomes immutable, and it is the only form of all the ones I have mentioned of which this is true. This is the fanzine's most valuable attribute.

In running eFanzines I've had an opportunity to present material which would otherwise almost certainly never have been published. As well as encouraging new editors, some of whom have gone on to publish paper fanzines and become more involved in fandom, I've also had the privilege to work with fans of all generations who didn't have the resources to produce a paper fanzine (or could no longer afford to print and mail paper copies), and have enabled them to publish electronically.

As well as hosting current fanzine issues, eFanzines also has archives of a few historic titles, but those are not its main focus. For this we rely on FANAC.org, which has scanned and OCRd many thousands of fanzines dating all the way back to the 1930s, making them freely accessible and searchable at no charge. Between them, the two sites are an invaluable resource for both historians and readers.

Joe Siclari - What Shape Was Your Fanzine In?

I'm not talking about how good your fanzines are or were. I'm really talking about the shape in which your fanzine was printed. Was it rectangular, triangular or shaped like a tree? Could it fly like an airplane?

In North America, we are all used to vertical rectangular fanzines – usually 8.5x11 inch zines but we also have 8.5x14 and 5x8.5 and 3x5 and postcard and even 11x17 tabloid sizes. In the UK and Australia and Europe they are usually A4 or Quarto, but Foolscap, Broadsheet and even Atlas or Emperor and more were sort of known. Fans have often used whatever they could find to print on.

During WWII *Fido* (Futurian War Digest) was printed on various sized pages - sometimes the back of discarded office papers or the back of crud sheets that Forry Ackerman sent to Rosenblum. All of these are various standard-sized sheets of paper. They cover perhaps more than 99% of all fanzines (back when fanzines were printed of course.)

This mini-article is about the miniscule less than 1%.

First, let's talk about reduced size zines, still rectangular, of course. These ensmalled zines were an odd occurrence primarily in the 1950's. I'm not talking about zines like Donald Day's The *Fanscient* (1947-51) or the more modern *Fantoons* (1980s) from Edd Vick. Those are quarter sized (4.5x5.5) or even the UK *Yum* (1954-58) from John Roles which varied in size.

Some are no bigger than a quotecard. There was even an informal competition on who could create the smallest, postage stamp size zine. Ted White called it "The War of the Mitey". I don't know who won that competition, because I haven't seen but a few of them. The earliest entry, I believe, was Walter Coslet's *Molecule* (1947). Ted White was in the race. He believed his smallest, Smithereen (1954), was the winner. It's the smallest zine that I have at about one





inch high.

Can you imagine the work to process one of these zines? Typing what you want on the page in a small box for a page on a stencil then resetting the stencil for the next box (but not the next page) and then again and again and again. Well, that's not the hard part. You had to take another stencil and align it perfectly to start typing the back of each sheet (in reverse order so they would get on the back of the correct pages). Then print them on a mimeograph (which usually had no gripping equipment to keep the stencil in place except the level of the ink dispersed). Then you had to cut the pages into little squares (don't let them get mixed up!), and collate and staple as

usual. You might simplify this a bit if you could use a postcard mimeo.

I've linked these titles to FANAC.org. Other miniature zines to look for which we don't yet have on our site would include Larry Stark's *Droll* and Ted's *Splotch*.

There were also some real ONE-SHOT fanzines. Lee Hoffman teased me about an apa she was in that required each contributor to do their fanzine in an unusual manner. She thought there were only five members but, unfortunately, could not recall who they were – her fanzine was done with a pyrography pen (wood-burning)! Needless to say, there was only one distribution of this apa. Perhaps this is where Bruce Pelz got his fanzine printed on baloney. He kept it in his freezer until it turned black but never told me where he got it. He may have written it up in one of his many hundreds of apazines. LeeH also had a multi-page hand calligraphed tribute to her and *Quandry*. It's all hearsay, but I'd like to hear more from you ...

• Anderson, Taylor. Inferno's Shadow [Artillerymen #4]. Ace, 42.00 hc.

Snared in her terrible web, Inspector Bartholomew Sloan - her eternal nemesis - watches her wreak havoc in helpless horror, shackled by his own guilt and Venita's unrelenting wrath. Now the house has yet another new owner. This time it's Ronnie Mitchell, a grieving woman who buys the run-down place sight unseen.

• Qureshi, A. T. The Baby Dragon Cafe [The Baby Dragon #1]. Avon, 23.99 tp.

When Saphira opens her cafe welcoming pet baby dragons, she isn't expecting it to be quite so hard to keep the fires burning. But her young dragon patrons keep incinerating her furniture, which means selling coffee isn't covering all her

But something inexplicable has been happening to Raine, and whatever it is seems to be spreading.

• Ryan, Morgan. A Resistance of Witches. Viking, 39.99 hc.

With Hitler's army rampaging across Europe, the witches of Britain have joined the war effort, and Lydia Polk is key to the cause. She must use her magic to track down magical relics before Hitler and his sycophants can. In the heart of occupied France she finds allies in Rebecca Gagne - a fierce French resistance fighter chockful of secrets - and Henry Boudreaux - a handsome Haitian-American art historian with a little magic of his own.

• Sbrana, Analeigh. Lore of the Tides [Lore of the Wilds Duology #2]. Voyager, 37.00 hc.

Lore Alemeyu wakes up to discover she's on a ship in the middle of the ocean. Held prisoner and with no way to escape, she's faced with a dire set of circumstances...a crew that's distrustful of Lore's magic capabilities...her betrayal by a Fae she thought she could trust...a dangerous quest for the sun book, which, if placed in the wrong hands, will make the Alytherian Fae even more powerful.

• Scarrow, Simon. Revenge of Rome [Eagles of the Empire #23]. Headline, 19.99 tp.
