
Official Organ of The National Fantasy Fan Federation (founded 1941)

Deadline for an issue is usually the 10th of the month previous, but these days, much of what is supposed to be, is not necessarily so. Publication months for TNFF are supposed to be February, April, June, August, October and December.

Under this constitution, the National Fantasy Fan Federation is established as an association of persons interested in promoting the progress of Science Fiction and Fantasy, and in furthering its enjoyment by themselves and others.

This issue of TNFF is deliberately not numbered because there is no telling when an issue that has been missed may still come out. The next issue of TNFF should see this problem resolved, and the numbering system re-instated which will then assign a number to this issue, a number not originally given to it. This will bollix the collectors. However, this issue becomes #344 in the Jahzine Press series.

Publishers' Editorial

I have nothing to apologize for, even though the February issue of TNFF is officially supposed to be out into the mail by February 10th. It was about that time when I agreed to do TNFF on the condition that the stencils be supplied already cut. This was done, except for a cover, roster, which is not bad. But, letters have been coming in which required corrections of the stencils already on hand. I would have had it out inside of a week, had the stencils, labels, roster, number of copies, all been decided on before hand. But, of course, due to the confusion surrounding the publishing of TNFF last year, this is not expressed as a complaint, just an excuse.

Now, you'dl note that Bullzine #52 is accompanying this issue, as a rider. Certainly convenient for me to be able to combine the two in one mailing, cuts down on the amount of work, but it is a rider, not an integral part of TNFF. Nothing in Bullzine is of an official nature. If you want the Bullzine coverage to be extensive and useful, see to it that those activities not currently covered, are covered. It is the current intent that there be a #53, which like #52, will contain reprint of #51, a repetitive system, but one I consider best for all concerned.

As of this moment, (February 21st., 1966) I haven't promised to do the April TNFF, tho' if none object, I may volunteer to do it under the same conditions as I requested for this issue, that most (if not all) of the stencils be already cut. That way, I won't be able to take the credit for the typos, except on those few stencils I do cut. TNFF & the Bullzine make the 5th & 6th publication this month, the previous four having gone out by last week-end. I think I've been moderately active this month, fanishly.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Sometimes my "reports" are windy, and I thought of labeling this as "Second Wind." Quite a few fans have found they can sustain fanactivity by keeping at it, and after a while they seem to get "second wind". One reason I did not so label this is that I'm thinking right now of Art Hayes who reluctantly said he would do this issue if stencils were provided. He is one fan who should be able to write on the phenomenon of "second wind" if anyone could. To get it, you have to sustain activity beyond what is usually considered sustainable. Both physical and mental second wind is involved in fandom, including NFFF. Or is this hot air?

Members, I know, are disappointed when clubzines don't appear. I've received complaints, and I agree with them that it is bad. The only remedy is to try other publishers when one is forced away from their mimeo by other things; sometimes second wind doesn't manifest itself. The over-active fan sometimes becomes the ex-fan for this reason--and it is a shame.

To get THE NATIONAL FANTASY FAN out takes cooperation, too. The President collects reports and prepares those in scattered form (in letters and cards) so as to include news and timely material as well as information for the newer members. The President doesn't have to have ghostwriting training but it might help at times! Of course the Bureau chiefs aren't usually trained in newswriting or publicity, either, so if the President or editor doesn't do some rewriting or summarizing on their own it may not be done as often as it should. The Bureau and other active members, after all, are busy in their other activities, and sometimes overlook the little matter of informing other members what's what.

What happened to December TNFF? I don't know. I've reports sent in to be published, and perhaps I should copy some of them. Of course I can include a lot of material in this report, and so can arrange it so if the issue does come out it won't be a direct duplication. I do want to put in other items too--notes from cards sent after the reports, for example. Like the need of a publisher by Ned Brooks, or at least fans able to type stencils from his copy with very few errors. Volunteers can write Ned (C.W.Brooks Jr., 911 Briarfield Rd., Newport News, Va. 23605.) Stencils would be for CB #4, which he wants out fairly soon.

Fans who publish include the N'APANS. All are invited to write ME if they would like to do either TIGHTBEAM or THE NATIONAL FANTASY FAN. Ever so often our official organ has a change of editor, and to get a steady one isn't always automatic. Even more so than our letterzine, the editor for TNFF must be able to do work that is clear and functional. It represents the club, and therefore care is needed to see it meets our needs. It has been suggested that perhaps it would pay to send issues out first class, to make sure they arrive sooner. Anything involving cost is in the "sphere of influence" of the Directorate, not the President, but members are free to discuss their views on this among themselves, in the letterzine, or by writing to me about it. Of course if you publish and write, how about considering volunteering to do TIGHTBEAM too? We need editors months in advance--and right now the editor after Greg Shaw is not known. So once again, you are free to send letters to TIGHTBEAM in care of me--address above.

An apology to one fan who did, though: James Sanders. I just found his 3-page letter here, so will send it to Greg pronto. One advantage of a long letter is it can be cut if parts are outdated. He says as he intends to stay in club he wants to volunteer to write criticism of fanzines, for TNFF. He says about half would probably be severely critical as his standards are high. Whoever send me material will have it passed on to editor.

I've a theory Sander's critical sense may have rubbed off of his alphabetical "neighbor" in the club, Leland Sapiro...Whether Sander is as exact as Sapiro, of course, can be told only if material is sent in for TNFF.

Carolyn Cross offered to do some work for the club, too. She's an artist--works in linoleum blocks and has a printing press. She teaches, too. I planned to try to get her into several activities, but will have to wait till I write her for more details.

As long as the Follow-Up Bureau isn't functioning I'll have to be available whenever members offer to work for the club, to serve as "middleman". Of course anyone can write directly to individual Bureau members, or to editors of the zines.

Every member of the Collector's Bureau, and many other Neffers, should find Jerry Page's fanzine Lore well worth their attention. No. 2 has a checklist of the Hall of Fame stories from STARTLING STORIES (prepared by Ed Wood) plus the serial reprints in CAPTAIN FUTURE magazine. Index material, and also biographical pages on Cordwainer Smith are included. William L. Chester, EESmith, and corrections and addenda for the Index to the Weird Fiction Magazines are included as well. In 10 pages (this time: first issue was 4) questions and other helpful and stimulating things for the SF-fantasy fan are to be found. Jerry's address is in the roster; I recommend you get this publication.

Without the December issue the election results may not have reached you yet. Results: Woolston for President again, with Meskys getting the most votes and subsequently being selected Chairman for 1966 of the Directorate; other Directors are Chalker, Hamlin, Ned Brooks and Don Miller. Newcomers to the Directorate (Ned and Don) are active, of course; in their own Bureaus; I believe a majority are in N'APA (as I am).

Treasurer's report for '65 mentions \$20 was set aside for the Story Contest. It will be used in 1966, as only a few members sent in letters. The reason? I would say lack of time for Clay to push this as he has done in the past. During the year a few mentions were made in TNFF, but not every issue came out, or out on time. So I have decided that this and other important items will be mentioned in each issue of the official organ, and you can now start writing (and rewriting) your stories. I know from experience that the best way to win is to take the contest seriously, improve your story using advice if you can get it, and rewriting after you set it aside for a week or so or after someone points out weak areas in plotting or handling. To win you will need to be classified as an amateur--with perhaps a couple of sales but no more--but your attitude can be pro. And, too, this means developing the story into more than a short-short-short; it takes a little space to develop fantasy or SF that might be purchased by a prozine. If Clay will not have enough spare time to do this he or Directorate or I will line up a replacement--someone with ability in the area of imaginative fiction, at least as far as being able to manage the contest.

The SF TITLE CHANGE publication of Don Franson and Michael Vignano has been published; Don will manage advertising and sales for the club. He has sent out review copies where they'll do the most good, and a price of \$1 is advertised too. Any profits will help us with other publications.

Janie Lamb has written to members who haven't renewed--something close to "gallantry beyond the call of duty". Many members need to be reminded when it is time to renew; I know some find Christmas drains their funds temporarily. So it pays when you remind a member in your letters. Even with Janie's reminder one by you might help get someone back in the club--and I suggest you write. Write them or me...and maybe volunteer!

Additionally, I commented on about a hundred stories, and either returned them direct to the author or passed them over to one more Exchanger for comment. Some answers were delayed somewhat as this is a part-time unpaid effort and everyone has personal concerns & so do I; but most went out again in 24 hours, and all were answered that I know of.

In general the work has been pleasant and easy for me and apparently for the others. Part-time authors are not very productive, and our list continues to be short. I sincerely hope that it doesn't grow any faster than I can handle! However, a loose arrangement is roomier and all are welcome. I have written to any new members who indicated an interest in writing, to remind them of the availability of this service.

Art Hayes and David Vanderwerf very kindly ran me off some copies of a description-and-advice page that answers most inquiries as a printed form and has thus saved me untold hours of repetitive clerical work. Thanks! A postcard will get one of these sent to anyone.

For benefit of new members who don't know me, I'll be sixty this year and brag like anything about it. I wrote Answering Service, IF, Jan. '65 and sold another this year, Castles in Space. Ten years' worth of teaching experience; educational background Radcliffe, Harvard, Boston U. Sch.Ed., English major. COLLECTOR'S BUREAU

C. W. Brooks, Jr.

The NFFF Collector's Bureau is intended to bring together the members of the club who collect one thing or another in the science-fiction and fantasy fields. This includes collectors of books, magazines, fanzines, comics, or movie material.

The Collector's Bureau publishes an irregular zine, COLLECTOR'S BULLETIN, which carries listings of the membership and of the dealers in the various fields. We try not to include any dealers that have been found to be dishonest, so if anyone has had trouble with a dealer we want to know about it. The zine, called CB for short, also provides a means for members to tout their favorite projects and ask for help in completing indexes or checklists. Note that I say "completing". I can't see any use in asking for help on a list that hasn't even been started. The best procedure is to write me about the project and if it hasn't already been done, send me as much of it as you have been able to do from your own collection. And keep a copy for yourself! The USPOD has been known to lose things. Then when other members express interest I will circulate my copy to them.

To join the Collector's Bureau one need only be a member of the NFFF. If you are interested, write me, giving as much detail as possible about your collecting interests. There are no more copies of COLLECTOR'S BULLETIN Numbers 1 or 2, but there are a few left of the fractional issues $2\frac{1}{2}$ and $2\frac{3}{4}$. CB Number 3 is probably ready for you when you read this.

WELCOMMITTEE

Ann Chamberlain

Impossible as it may seem to me, every now and then someone asks, "What is Welcommittee?" The first chairman (when I came back to N3F in '58) was Honey Wood. Then Art Hayes kept it in good running order for several years. In quick succession it was passed from hand to hand--with David Locke, Dave Hulan and maybe others in charge--then to me.

The Welcommittee is a door through which new members gets first impressions of N3F, its various activities, and acts almost like a chamber of commerce. The "International SF Convention" was reported on by Lyell Crane--it occurred at the White Horse Tavern in London, May 1951.

An article by Bill Vehable on "Science-Fantasy Fiction and Comics" told of the new field. Look at it now!

President Rick Sheary reports to the membership, and reminds us to run for office in the coming election.

"Welcommittee" report by Eva Firestone, was as usual a fine bit of reporting on various departments and news, both U.S. and England. It announced the 1950 Fan Directory by Len Moffatt and Stan Woolston (printed) was announced at 25¢ a copy--information about fans from many countries. British Welcommittee was organized by Bert High. UTOPLAN fanzine goes out FREE to Military fans; was published by R.J. Banks Jr. And Walt Willis announced he would send a free SLANT to N3Fers in Europe.

Roy Lavender, Chairman, reports on work of Directorate.

At that time the "Nefforum" included letters in TNFF--five this time.

FANSPEAK, a glossary of fanslang, phrases and names, was written by Art Rapp. Just a post card brought you a copy, free to members. (And do you remember what postcards cost then?)

An article by G.M. Carr "...Comes the Revolution!" concerns politics, and tells how the government gets its fingers into everything. (Just as timely in 1966 as when it was written in 1951.)

"Over Here" by F.J. Robinson reports on the London Convention and English Fandom. One paragraph sums it up very nicely: "This was undoubtedly the biggest thing that has yet happened to British Fandom. There probably will be many more conventions here in the future, but never will another be quite like this one--the FIRST international Science Fiction Convention."

The issue was dedicated to EVA FIRESTONE; "Eva is one of the hardest working officers NFFF has today, and we reward her with this honor... CONGRATULATIONS FOR WORK WELL DONE."

Fanzine Review covers eight zines this issue, written by Ray Higgs, our Editor of TNFF.

P.B.L. CHECKLIST by Bob Troetschel and Ev Winne: About 20 fan collectors are acting as co-compilers from U.S., Australia, Britain and Canada. "When the project was first started we expected to dig out about 200 titles of fan interest. Ha! At the present time the list has grown and grown to over 500 items;" they say.

An ad for OPERATION FANTAST by Captain K.F. Slater of England says subscriptions were 6 for 60¢, postpaid.

MANUSCRIPT BUREAU, with Ken J. Krueger as Chairman, asks members to send in material such as artwork, articles, poetry, fiction etc.

Many inside illos were done by William Rotsler, Venable and Higgs.
